HISTORY OF SOUTHWICK

The following "History of Southwick" was written by the Seventh grade history class of the Southwick school: Diane Cantril, Margie Kazda, James Finke and Darrell Hanks, who have the following to say: "We have tried to be exact in our dates and names, but some errors may have occurred.'

One of the first pioneer sto settle in the area was Stephen R. Southwick. He located on a farm 12 miles of Mr. and Mrs. G. F. Cridlebaugh east of Kendrick in 1889. The first merchantile store was owned by Walter E. Daggett, and he became the second postmaster of Southwick. Coming from Ralon, New Mexico. on Sept. 16, 1901, was Wm. McClelland, who became the first school teacher in 1902. He later asked the directors to build an addition to the school and secure the services of another teacher. After much discussion the directors decided to employ two teachers, and told Mr. McClelland that he could choose the other teacher. He chose Miss Fay Pierce, who was very fond of music and an excellent director of activities for the school girls. At a supper in the school house Mrs. McClelland was told that they were short of milk. "Big" Walker said, "I'll fix that," and he poured water in until the mixture remained barely white. But it is said: "It went down fine." The school gave entertainments during the year 1902 to buy an organ, and their goal attained, the purchase was made by Mr. McClelland. In 1906, residents wanted a new school and also a high school. Some wanted to divide the district. Some wanted it further west, some further east and some further south. It was finally agreed to build where the present school stands. There were a number of carpenters wanting the contract, but Chas. Lettenmaier got the job and built a strong school house, much like a grain warehouse, but had trouble with the chimneys, as they were not built tall enough. Southwick suffered its first major fire in the year of 1902, which destroyed most of the town. A few years later, another major fire was suffered, which burned practically all of the town including the new portion, erected after the 1902 fire.






