

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

Double-Decker Flying-Boat To Cover World in 90 Hours

Around the world in 90 hours in a double-decker flying boat - that's the prospect in store for passengers aboard Britain's future 140-ton Saunders-Rce seaplanes.

Three of these giant flying-boats, known as S-R 45, are now taking shape in a hangar at East Cowes. These first three pressurized flyingboats-biggest commercial planes ever built in Britain-are costing five million pounds (20 million dollars). The first S-R 45 off the stocks is expected to fly at the end of this year, or early in 1949.

On short hops the flying-boat will have room for 140 passengers. It will be able to ferry 100 passengers non-stop between London and New York in 131/2 hours . . . breakfast on one side of the Atlantic, dinner on the other.

The mammoth flying-boats are to be powered by 10 propellor turbine engines, each of 3,500 horse-power. These will enable the S-R 45 to cross the Atlantic in the face of continuous headwinds up to 90 miles a hour.

Designed principally for long distance flights, the S-R 45 will be capable of operating a round-the-world service in 90 hours, carrying 85 passengers, with private sleeping cabins

Dangers of Brain Surgery **Now Considerably Reduced**

Surgical removal of brain tumors. once considered extremely dangerous, has been improved to the point where this type of operation is as successful as major surgery elsewhere in the body.

This is the statement of Dr Howard C. Naffziger, professor of neurosurgery in the University of California medical school, and Dr. Edwin B. Boldrey, assistant clinical professor of neurosurgery, in an article in the journal of the American Medical association.

"Since the end of World War I impressive advances have been made in our knowledge of the biologic characteristics, modes of early diagnosis, and treatment of tumors affecting the nervous system," the physicians write.

"It is now recognized that these tumors, once considered rare, constitute two per cent of all cancers. The early diagnosis of the group has been materially aided by improvement in the knowledge of the physiology of the nervous system as well as by technical developments."

Among these developments the physicians included the effective X-ray examination of the brain, blood vessels and spinal cord; and electroencephalography, the use of electrical currents from the brain as indicators of abnormal conditions.

Ear Trouble in Dogs

imple irritations of the ear canal. Dogs with floppy ears are particularly susceptible to such infections. Because mild inflammation can be treated more effectively and will heal faster, owners should make it a practice to inspect their dogs' ears at regular intervals, in order to detect early signs of disease. Infection may develop readily if burs, twigs, seeds and water find their way into the ear canal. It is a mistake to think of all canine ear troubles as canker, or to delay having infections treated until they reach the canker stage. Usually, gentle cleansing of the ears will remove wax and foreign material which, if allowed to remain, may cause severe inflammation. Ether or an oily preparation should be used for routine cleansing and should be applied with a wooden applicator wound softly and thickly with cotton, care being taken not to exert pressure on the tender tissues.

Antarctica, Frozen Continent

The Antarctic is the one entirely unexploited continent on earth. Up to this time there has been no economic temptation in its frozen wastes; no gold or slaves or spices have lured men down there. Only coal has been found in bulk so far, and its potential value has been considerably lessened by the difficulties and expense of getting it out. The ice cap which covers most of the continent confines prospectors to the coastal fringe. Nevertheless, there has been a scramble by various nations for a foothold on what until now has been considered the most useless land mass on our planet. Potentialities of Antarctica as a source of minerals is one factor, and the acquisition of bases to guard vital southern lifelines is another.

Radar in Cotton Research


Radai equipment, same as that used to send waves to the moon and employed with such success by the army and navy during World War II, is being used in cotton and cottonseed research at the University of Texas. Scientists at the university are using the equipment in a two-fold research project which may be of great benefit in combating cotton plant disease and in the pres ervation of cottonseed. The radar equipment has been converted for use in experiments to determine whether cotton plant disease can be destroyed by sterilization. By the use of high frequency apparatus converted from radar equipment, the research men tope to reduce the formation of acids which decrease oil value of the seed.



Automatic Mixers Available on Farm **Electricity Cuts Down** On Farm Labor Costs

By Bob Wilson Feed mixing, like an increasing number of other farm chores, now is being placed on practically an automatic basis and coordinated with related activities. In this case, mixing is coordinated with cribbing and grinding operations.

Generally, mixers are located either adjacent to the grinder or in the barn mow almost directly above the mill. The two-ton mixer, shown in the accompanying illustration, is in the mow of a Midwestern farm. When processing operations begin, shelled corn, which has been blown

into a bin to the right of the mixer, drops through a chute to the grinder on the floor below. The blower pipe is shown at the right of the mixer.


After grinding has been completed, the ground grain is blown into the mixer and necessary supplements added. The thoroughly mixed grain then flows out of the mixer and down a chute to be loaded into a feed cart on the first floor.

The only manual work required is dumping the sacked supplement into the mixer. A conventional type blower cribs the whole grain automatically, while the blower attachment on the electrically powered grinder returns the ground grain to the mixer.

Checks Soil Losses

Good soil management pays dividends in making heavy crops per acre, building organic matter in the soil and at the same time checking



erosion. The results shown above summarize tests at the University of Illinois Elizabethtown experiment field since 1918.

Manure, lime and phosphate made the difference between the two plots. The soil was already rich in potash.

The heavy crops of alfalfa-clover and small grains protected the soil from beating rains. The soil of the treated plot with its 16 tons of organic matter per acre could soak up more water faster than the soil of the untreated plot with only five tons. Less water was left to run off and carry soil with it.

For erosion control on longer slopes a crop rotation that includes more years in soil protecting crops such as legume grass mixtures is advised. Full fields on a 12 per cent slope such as was in this field would need a rotation of corn, winter grain and two or three years of legumegrass mixtures for best results. Contour farming, strip cropping and terracing would help, too, to slow down the water so that more would have a chance to soak into the

Three Major Problems Face Pork Producers

The pork producer faces three problems as he makes plans for 1948, say Michigan State college specialists. A short corn crop, a relatively narrow corn-hog ratio and a stressed feed conservation program are the problems to be met. The danger is that too few sows will be bred for spring pigs and there may not be enough hogs to consume the corn crop produced



Internal Parasites Cut Yield of Wool Year-Round Control Program Advocated

Most of the emphasis on parasite control in sheep has been tied up with faster gains, better lamb carcasses and prevention of damage to the intestinal walls of the animal. Attention of sheepmen now is being directed to the effect of internal



parasites on the yield of wool. Michigan State college is urging flock owners in that state to treat animals with phenothiazine to keep them in good condition and to get a heavier growth of wool. Phenothiazine is administered as a drench or in pellets, or mixed with salt and kept before the flock all the time. A dependable year-round program calls for individual treatment of all animals in fall and spring, and use of the phenothiazine-salt mixture throughout the pasture season. This is the program being followed by progressive sheepmen to keep parasites in check.

Soil Needs Nitrogen


How lime, clover and crop residues increase the soil's nitrogen and organic matter supply and thus boost crop yields, is shown by the chart below. This drawing summarizes results of tests at the Dixon soil experiment field by University; of Illinois agronomists. All three plots in the tests were limed and the crop rotation on each included corn, oats and wheat. One plot had! no clover. The small grain straw was removed and the cornstalks were burned. This plot produced a four-year average of 57 bushels per acre. The second plot had the same



treatment, except that sweet clover was seeded in the wheat and plowed under as a green manure crop for corn. The increased nitrogen and organic matter from the clover boosted the corn yield 24 bushels. On the third plot, sweet clover was grown and in addition the cornstalks, oats straw and wheat straw were returned to the soil. The extra organic matter, nitrogen and other plant foods thus saved and returned in the crop residues gave the soil "what it takes" to yield 88 bushels of corn per acre.

High Milk Producers Required for Profit

The size of the milk wells is a true measure of the size of the milk veins. This diagram of the udder structure by Clemson Agricultural college shows the udder structure in detail. If the end of the vein is forked, two or three milk wells



often may be found on either side. A good mammary system is indicated by a large udder, which gets its capacity in length and width rather than excessive depth, extending well up behind and forward.

New Seed Disinfectant Suggested for Cotton

Ceresan M seed disinfectant is being recommended for use against numerous seed-borne and soil-borne crop diseases, including seed-borne anthracnose, angular leafspot, seed decay and seedling damping-off of cotton. The active ingredient of this new material is ethyl mercury p-toluene sulfonanilide, which has been successfully tested by colleges over a period of years under the designation of No. 1452-F.



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

Lice Inflict Heavy Damage on Cattle **DDT** Treatment Cuts High Winter Losses

Lice are injurious to all types of cattle. Animals produce less meat and milk if lice are unchecked. Young animals and poorly-nourished old animals suffer most from

The winter season is the time lice are bad on cattle. The louse population builds up then. Dr. Harold Gunderson, extension entomologist at Iowa State college, says one louse unchecked in fall means 1,000 the following March.


For lice control on cattle, DDT is being used successfully. Early in fall, before cold weather arrives, it is mixed with water and sprayed on the animals. After cold weather comes, a DDT dust is recommended. Farmers are being advised to use a dust containing 10 per cent DDT. Some of the powdered louse killers on the market contain less than 10 per cent DDT, but have other ef-fective insecticides combined with

The rotenone dusts recommended for cattle grub control can be used for lice control. Usually they are diluted for lice, to cover greater area and reduce the cost. For instance, one pound of a cattle grub dust containing 1½ per cent rotenone can be mixed with two pounds of flour to make an effective louse

In the Wood street yards of the Chicago and Northwestern railroad.




an average of 20,000 carloads of potatoes are handled annually. Many thousands of tons of other vegetables also pass through this yard.

The yard is the central market ing point for potatoes, which come in from virtually every state in the union. The Wood street yard is a far cry from the wooden platform which served as a terminal years ago.

Milk Testing Traced To Michigan Farmers

Forty years ago a few progressive dairy farmers in Michigan organized the first cow-testing association in the United States. They wanted to improve the profitableness of their herds. They hired a tester to weigh

and test the milk of each cow and to keep a record of her feed cost and income. They wanted that information so they could cull the low producers from their herds and feed the rest more economically.

In the first four years of their pioneer effort, these Michigan farmers doubled the average profit per cow. Since then thousands of other dairy farmers have followed their example with equally striking results.

New Chemical Utilized For Grasshopper Poison

Research men at various state colleges after trying benzene hexa-chloride, a chemical discovered in Europe and brought to this country for experimental use as a grasshopper poison, believe it is the best thing yet discovered for hog mange, as well as grasshopper control. The compound is a wettable powder that can be used as either a spray or dip for hogs and is sold under various trade names.

Bacteriological Warfare Termed Threat to Future

A greater threat to the future is posed by bacteriological warfare than by atomic warfare, according to Dr. Frank Holtman, head of University of Tennessee bacteriological department.

"While an atomic 'combing might kill and maim a goodly portion of the population in a city of 150,000, as well as destroy the major portion of the city itself," said Holtman, bacteriological warfare might very easily wipe out the entire population within a week. "Such warfare would leave build-

ings intact, making that one primary reason the enemy would use such a weapon. Then industries, buildings, military installations and supplies would be almost immediately available for enemy use. "It used to be said that bacteriological warfare was too risky for

a nation to use because it was uncontrollable but that is no longer the case. More is being learned all the time about the control of this weapon. In considering reports that Russia is well prepared in bac-teriological warfare, I don't think we need take a back seat. However, the developments we have are definitely military secrets and cannot be divulged.'

Cattle Grubs May Attack Horses, Veterinarian Finds

The heel fly or grub usually is considered only as a parasite of cattle, but new veterinary reports show that this trouble-maker also may infest horses.

Heel flies unable to find a cow sometimes will deposit their eggs on a horse. These eggs, usually laid in the hairs just above the hoof, hatch into larvae within a few days, bore into the skin and months later they emerge as grubs by way of the horse's back, just as they do in cattle. Horses so affected cannot be ridden, as pressure from the saddle crushes the grubs and causes severe inflammation.

"Parasitism of horses by cattle grubs is not common and probably is accidental," states a bulletin issued by veterinary authorities, "but it is nevertheless a threat that should be recognized by horse own-

Grubs found emerging from the skin should be removed, preferably by using a suction cup. Grubs also may be removed by gentle pressure, but care must be taken not to crush

Elimination of grubs in cattle by spraying them with rotenone preparations also serves to prevent the spread of these parasites to horses.

Malayan Federation


The Federation of Malaya, now virtually independent of Great 📗 Eritain, is a country whose wealth fore the war, British Malaya prois deep-set in tin and rubber. Beduced nearly half the world's rubber, mined almost two-fifths of its tin, and was wealthier than the rest of the British colonies put together. Today, rubber production in the southeast Asia peninsula is breaking prewar records, but tin shipments are down. The new Malayan federation, launched as a going concern by the British governor at Kuala Lumpur, includes all British Malay peninsula possessions and adjacent islands except Singapore, which will remain a crown colony. The bulk of the federation is in nine variously developed native sultanates — the small protectorates that fell one by one as the Japs swept through the jungles to Singapore in 1942.

Abandon Search for Flyers

After more than two years of intensive search in the wild jungles of India and Burma for the bodies of fliers and other American military personnel who perished there, the American graves registration service has abandoned further search. Many of the 1,636 men who failed to arrive at their destinations were air force crews believed to have crashed on inaccessible mountain reaks or in jungles seldom traversed by humans. The search was abandoned not only because of its futility but to prevent army personnel from subjecting themselves again to perilous missions which had previously failed.

Refrigerants Chief refrigerants, other than

ice, used for domestic refrigeration, are ammonia, dichlorodifluoromethane (Freon-12), dichlorotettrofluoroethane (Freon-114) ethyl chloride, methyl chloride and sulphur dioxide. The refrigerant, which is a necessary part of the refrigeration unit, may be considered safe as long as it remains in its proper place within the refrigerating system. Leaks are not common, but they sometimes occur. Most persons are familiar with the odor of ammonia and that of sulphur dioxide which is produced by sulphur matches. A small amount of either causes only temporary discomfort; however, the amount in a refrigerating system is large enough to cause serious injury. In the case of leakage of the refrigerant, food which has been exposed is probably fit for use unless spoilage is indicated by appearance, odor or taste. If there is doubt, it is safest to throw it away.

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

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TEAMWORK WILL HELP RE-GION IN POWER SHORTAGE

Much of the talk about a Pacific Northwest power shortage has been confusing. People say, "There has been plenty of rain. There must be plenty of water in the rivers. Why should there be a power shortage?"

There are two types of hydro-electric power shortages, caused by totally different conditions. One type of shortage is caused by a lack of water to turn power machinery. There is no such lack at present. This could occur only in a bad water year. The other type of shortage is caused by not having enough dams and generators to use the water. This is the condition our region is facing today.
