GRAIN MARKETS AGAIN SHOW STRNGTH IN N. W.

Grain markets strengthened ma-terially during the past week and at the principal markets, a good part of the previous loss was regained. Reports of continued heavy export commitments and large purchases by the Commoditly Credit Corporation were important strengthening in-fluences Domestic demand was not fluences. Domestic demand was not active, but there was sufficient buyactive, but there was sufficient buy-ing to assorb current offerings, which dropped off following the sharp price decline. Wheat prices were about back to above the support level in central western markets. Cash wheat at Portland advanced 4c per bushel on ordinary export types of wheat and closed at the types of wheat and closed at the loan value of \$2.19 per bushel. Hard red winter of a high milling grade was quoted 6 cents higher than a week ago at \$2.26, all basis No. 1 grade, coast delivery, 15-day ship-ment. Advances in other markets, continued light offerings and steady Commodity Credit Corporation buy-ing were the principal strengthening factors. Demand from millers con-tinued slow with the absence of any important flour business and feed manufacturers were still limitwas quoted 6 cents higher than a

feed manufacturers were still limiting purchases to minimum requirements. Commodity Credit Corpor-ation purchases totaled 645,500 bushels for the week and provided the main support to the market. Marketings were only moderate but slightings were only moderate but sight-ly improved over a week ago. Ac-cording to trade reports, producer liquidation was attributed to the higher values, also to the present outlook of storage difficulties for the 1949 crop. Receipts of wheat at Columbia river terminals totaled 229 cars and


at Puget Sound terminals 250 cars, compared with 191 and 212, respec-

tively, a week earlier. On February 1 there were 47,491,-548 bushels of Pacific Northwest wheat under government loans and purchase agreements, according to purchase agreements, according to reports from state Production and Marketing administration offices. Of this total, Oregon has 12,390,717 bushels under loan and purchase agreements; Washington 31,925,377 and the 10 northern counties of Ida-ho 3,175,442 bushels under the sup-nort price port price.

Marketings of wheat during the week were of light volume and arrivals at the principal terminals torivals at the principal terminals to-taled a little less than 3,500,000 bushels. Purchases by the Commod-ity Credit Corporation totaled near-ly 5,900,000 bushels and included takings from terminal stocks at Minneapolis and Duluth, and wheat for delivery at Duluth by the open-ing of navigation. At the close of the week No. 2 hard winter was quoted at Chicago at \$2.24½, with quoted at Chicago at  $$2.24\frac{1}{2}$ , with red winter wheat selling at the same price.

price. The Commodity Credit Corpor-ation purchased 4,631,454 bushels of wheat; 1,133,914 bushels of corn; 200,000 bussels of grain sorghums; 200,000 bussels of rye; 817,800 bush-els of barley and 300,000 bushels of oats during the past week. No flour purchases were made during this period. Wheat purchases consisted of 1,913,373 bushels through Kansas City; 925,000 through Minneapolis; 1000 through Minneapolis;


We have credited the lime and the neutralization of the soil with working wonders, but we have not **realized** that liming by itself was helping exhaust our soil fertility more rapidly," he points out. "It is essential," concludes Dr. Al-

brecht, "to remember that we need potash to make the carbohydrates in the growing plant before we can convert them into protein."

#### **Sturdy Roots Required For Top Crop Output**

No crop can do a better crop producing job than the roots that nourish it. To get strong, healthy, bushel-boosting growth above the ground, you have to have a sturdy root development below the surface. Roots need plenty of "living

room" to stretch out for moisture,




mir and plant nutrients. They need that room not only in the plow layer, but also in the subsoil below.

It takes plenty of organic matter to keep a clay or loam soil roomy, well drained and ventilated. Part of that organic matter is burned up every year in producing crops. If it is not replaced, then your soil packs down. It becomes "stuffy" and hard to cultivate. It loses its sponginess, or porosity. Roots cannot grow readily, top growth suffers and lower crop yields result.

Several steps are necessary to get good catches of legumes. Liming, based on soil tests, is important. So is the application of fertilizer carrysing phosphate and potash.

To round out a balanced soil management program and add to the organic matter supply, animal manure and crop residues should be **returned** to the soil.



This two-wheeled farm trailer has an all-steel frame on which any type of body can be placed. #### Johnson Grass Control Termed Community Job

Johnson grass control is a community job because it requires the attention of everyone in the neighborhood, according to Purdue university. Watch for new bunches of Johnson grass that start in clean fields. Kill them by pulling or hoeing before deep roots are formed. The grass spreads both by seeds fand root parts and is scattered by water, in hay, by cultivator or wind.
