


#### Phenothiazine-Salt Mixture for Sheep

#### **Reduction of Worms** And Heavier Lambs

Tests have been carried on for four successive seasons at the Texas substation, Sonora, to determine whether continued licking of phenothiazine-salt mixtures is toxic to sheep, and also whether this practice will control infestations of stomach and other roundworms of sheep (without drenching animals individually). The pheno-salt mixture was kept before sheep on pasture all the

There were no harmful results; in fact, the lamb crops were 3 per cent heavier than during three previous seasons when salt alone was kept in the troughs.

Use of the phenothiazine-salt mixture also resulted in reduction and checking of worms. The sheep were heavily infested at the beginning in ewes, 1,180 worm eggs per gram of feces; in lambs, 1,700 eggs per

gram. In the fourth season, the worm egg count was down to 60 for ewes and 30 for lambs.

On the strength of these figures, Dr. I. B. Boughton, who did the work, concludes: "The mixture eliminated the need for individual treatment in the control of stomach and other roundworm infestation." Also, he says: "There was no ill effect on the health of either the ewes or the lambs."

#### Salt Speeds Gains In Hog Feeding Tests

Hogs receiving some salt in their daily rations can gain two and onehalf times faster than those without it. tests at Purdue university indicate. Average daily gain of hogs which received salt was 1.71 pounds, while those receiving none gained only .67 pounds daily. For each pound of salt consumed there were 45 extra pounds of gain. Each pound of salt saved \$5.60 worth of feed consumed by hogs.

#### Alarm on Freezer



The symphony of the American farm, its cow bells, dinner bells and hog calling, soon will be joined by another sound, a distinct and notto-be-mistaken alarm which is being added to the home freezer.

An extensive series of tests conducted by the USDA has resulted in the Brown instrument company developing an audible signal which will warn if home freezers cease operating. Electronic potentiometers record temperatures instantaneously and constantly at 16 points within each freezer.

Improved . construction of the freezer and the warning signal will result in better food protection.

#### Reenforce 2, 4-D

The mixture of ammonium salt of 2, 4-D at the rate of .15 per cent with 2.8 urea and fermate at the rate of 2 pounds per 100 gallons for small grains and grass is proving effective.

#### Plow Down Cover Grop To Conserve Moisture

To save soil moisture, cover crops should be plowed down as early as possible. Cover crops, especially rye and vetch, grow fast and use a lot of soil moisture during warm days, Iowa State agronomists point out. If plants are allowed to grow too late they will take so much moisture that, without additional rain, there won't be enough to germinate newly planted crops. Nitrogen also will be added to soil.



#### Precautions for Dipping Sheep Are Suggested

Among rules to be followed when dipping sheep are: Fast the sheep several hours before dipping. Don't dip sheep immediately on arrival at the bath if they have become heated. Don't dip sheep in an arsenical bath if they have open wounds. Don't put the sheep in the bath head first. Prepare the bath strictly in accordance with instructions on the package and mix thoroughly.

#### Young Cockleburs Are Poisonous for Swine

Young cocklebur seedlings will poison pigs, according to veterinarians at Iowa State college. The danger of cocklebur poisoning is greater this year because of short pastures. With grass short, pigs will be tempted to eat young cockleburs in search of green feed. Best remedy is to keep hogs out of flelds containing cocklebur seedlings until they are eliminated.

#### Less Than Third of Farms Made Agricultural Record

American agriculture's production record during the war and since was accomplished largely by less than a third of the nation's 5.9 million farms with a third of the farm population.

This is shown in a department of agriculture study of farms by total value of production. The survey breaks down farms into seven broad classifications, running from largescale operations such as cattle ranches or big mechanized grain farms down to groups classed as nominal units representing mostly residential homes or places where elderly farmers have retired. The figures are based on the 1945 census of agriculture.

The study shows that approximately 1.7 million farms, representing 29 per cent of the total number of farms turned out 76 per cent of the gross value of farm production in 1945. This means that 4.2 million farms contributed only 24 per cent of the gross value of farm production in that year. Products raised and consumed on the farm are not included.

The group that made the biggest single contribution to supplying food and fiber for the nation and to help feed a hungry world since the war is the medium family farms. There were approximately 1.2 million of these in 1945 with a population of around 51/2 million, or nearly a fifth of the total farm population. They raised 30 per cent of the total gross value of farm production.

#### U. S. Makes Strong Effort To Control Cattle Disease

Prevalence of foot and mouth disease in Mexico has brought about intensive efforts to keep the disease out of this country. The bureau of animal husbandry maintains a strict quarantine against all livestock and meat products from Mexico. It also is cooperating with Mexican authorities in efforts to stamp out the disease in that country.

Carefully selected range riders and inspectors, traveling by horse or truck, patrol the border to prevent importation of livestock into this country. When Mexican livestock cross the Rio Grande and come out on American soil, the patrolmen promptly seize and destroy the animals. Fences have been built along some stretches of the river by private interests to prevent stock from entering this country. Sometimes attempts are made to smuggle animals and meat across the border, and the patrol seizes and destroys the animals

Not only is the border patrolled by men in motor vehicles or on horses, but also airplanes are used to inspect the border area. When an aerial observer detects a livestock movement other signs on the Mexican side of the border that bear watching, he quickly notifies the ground patrol.

#### Fish As A Brain Food?

"Eat fish and grow smart" is an old, old saying, but scientists say that it's all he bunk. The Ohio division of conservation says: "Science does not recognize any one food as more beneficial to the brain than another. What food is good for the whole body is also good for the brain. Fish meat is considered rich in phosphorous and a German scientist of the nineteenth century started the idea, 'No phosphorus, no thought.' As a matter of fact, the human brain attains almost its full adult size during the first six years of a child's life and during the time when its chief article of diet is milk. The flesh of fish is lighter and more easily digested than most of the flesh meats and therefore it is a suitable and desirable food for so-called brain workers or persons engaged in occupations involving little physical exertion and much mental labor."

#### Early American Gangster

A noted thief and daring burglar, Sile Doty not only led a gang of counterfeiters, horse thieves and burglars of the New England, Middle and Western states but also was the terror of Mexico during 1849. Doty was an expert mechanic and tool maker who would make handcuffs, sell them to a sheriff and then keep a duplicate key in the sole of his shoe. Fighting in the Mexican war, he stole a blooded charger from one of the grandees south of the Rio Grande and presented it to Gen. Winfield Scott.

#### Polish Coal Estimates

Polish coal resources are estimated by Polish experts at anywhere from 75 billion to 80 billion tons. Ten per cent of the deposits are in the western territories-the lands Poland absorbed from eastern Germany. Poland's hard coal resources have been estimated at 10,500,000,000 tons by a special commission of mining experts. The commission stated that this includes only definitely ascertained deposits in mining claims to a depth of about 3,300 feet.

#### Goat Replaces Horse

The horse, driven from the roads by the automobile, lost its place in the garment factory to the smelly goat; for it is a goathair fabric that is now used in suit linings. It is a cloth made by conventional weaving methods, in which goathair is used as the filling yarn in a warp of cotton, wool or rayon. It differs from the old horsehair fabric in that the goathair is blended with wool or rayon and spun into yarn so that it goes into the loom as a strong, continuous thread.

### Storage of Surplus Fowl Is Profitable Poultry Held in Locker

For Sale at Price Peak To assure that poultry of various classifications is properly held in locker plants or freezers, it is advisable that the fowl be wrapped in water-proof, moisture-proof paper.

Latest scientific methods call for enclosing the fowl in a strong mesh fabric, known as stockinet, which keeps the prepared locker paper tightly pressed around the chicken, thus eliminating all air pockets inside the wrapping and preventing the paper from becoming loose at any time.

profitable to place some of the birds, as well as game fowl, in storage for their own consumption as well as for sale to local markets when prices become higher.

Considerable demand has been found for ducks, geese and turkeys as well as for chickens.

During the past few years some poultry raisers have found an excellent market for smoked fowl and a most satisfactory market price.

Only quality fowls should be so stored and handled, and then only when proper wrapping material is utilized and proper storage facilities are available.

#### Modern Agronomists Debunk Copybook Line

"Hay is dried grass." That line invariably appeared in copybooks handed out to pupils in old-time writing classes, but agronomists at Ohio State university claim the copybook publishers apparently knew considerably more about, teaching pupils to write than they did about haymaking.

Some dried grass is excellent livestock feed but other cured grass is just fair quality bedding, agrono-


mists insist. The best time for cutting hay is, when plants have made almost their greatest growth in weight but still contain a high percentage of protein. For red clover, the recommended cutting time is when the plants are in the half bloom stage. The most hay of high quality will be hauled from the alfalfa field if cutting is started before the half bloom period.

#### Thinning of Vegetables Assures Best Growth

Most gardeners make the mistake of not thinning their vegetable rows sufficiently. They hate to pull up part of their plantings and thus allow all of the seedlings to be crowded. Thinning should be done when the soil is moist and the seedlings are one to two inches tall. If taller than two inches, don't pull them up; cut them off at ground level for best results.

#### Interest in Jade Awakens As U. S. Enters Production

A few thousand years late, but with promise of abundance the United States has entered the production lists of one of the oldest and most glamorous of minera' -jade.

Recer' commercial development of jade deposits in Wyoming, California and Alaska-estimated to contain many thousands of tons of this gem stone-is stirring new currents in an industry long associated almost ex-clusively with the Orient.

China for untold centuries has been the outstanding center of jade carving and trade. The earliest Chinese character for the word "precious" included symbols or jade beads and utensils. Jade has been found in ancient Chin se weights and measures. Cut into various forms to give off sounds when struck, it was made into "musical stones" or chimes centuries before Christ.

It is an odd fact that although jade is known to have been used in strikingly similar ways by prehistoric peoples in both Old and New Worlds, the bulk sto has turned up in comparatively few places.

Archeological expeditions, such as those of the National Geographic society-Smithsonian institution to southern Mexico, have uncovered spectacular jade collections in ancient burial sites. But no jade mines yet have been discovered in that part of the world. The only local source of raw materials for such objects would appear to be jade pebbles or boulders found in the stream beds.

#### Doctors Say Bone Bank Has Great Possibilities

Bone preserved in a frozen state for weel's is of "definite value" in bone-grafting operations, Dr. Leonard F. Bush, Danville, Pa., and Dr. C. Zent Garber of New York report in the Journal of the American Medical

In an article entitled "The Bone Bank," the two doctors say that "if foods, serums and other perishable substances could be kept in a low temperature f. ezing cabinet, we debe used to preserve bone so that a for a term of two years; and three to serve for a term of four years. constant supply would be available

Experiments were undertaken and lit was found that human bone can be preserved apparently indefinitely in a freezer at minus 20 to 30 centi-

"Spinal fusions for scoliosis (abmormal curvature of the backbone) cysts and the replacement of defects in bone are a few of the common problems in which large quantities of bone are necessary," the doctors of bone are necessary," the doctors point out in their article.

The doctors, in their experiments, used large chinchilla rabbits. Control studies were made. Thirty-two bone transplantations were made by 28 operations on 19 animals. There were no casualties and in only one wound was there a superficial infection.

#### **Protecting Basements**

Precautions which home builders should take to insure dry basements including locating the house so that the ground falls away from the foundation in all directions, thus providing natural drainage. Gutters and downspouts should not only be sound and clean but large enough for a capacity downpour. Where there is danger from surface water, the foundation walls should be drained with foint draintile laid at or below the level of the footing to carry off excess water. When ground water is present near the level of the basement floor, moisture may enter by capillary action. Even solid concrete, First pub. April 7, 1949 properly used and thick enough to Last pub. April 21, 1949. withstand pressure, is not watertight without waterproofing. Some waterproofing materials are mixed with the concrete itself. Dampproof cement plaster may be applied either to interior or exterior walls, or both.

#### New Hope for Amputee Vets

New hope for the 17,000 war wounded in Britain who lost limbs has been raised by a remarkable artificial hand, just perfected. It has jointed fingers which enable an amputee to tie shoe laces, light cigarettes, shave, write and do dexterous manual work. It has just concluded long practical tests made by British veterans who lost limbs during World War II. The "hand" was invented by a young Irish architect. It is made of wood and metal, and weighs 17 ounces. The hand can get a firm grip by means of small rubber pads set on the inside of fingers and thumb. A larger pad of rubber sponge covers the palm. The controls are connected to a shoulder brace. The wearer has only to exert an almost imperceptible shrug of his shoulder or back to grasp any object he wants.

#### New Drugs for Nerves

Improved drugs for the relief of Prostbite, trench foot and other painful circulatory disorders caused by runaway nerves were described by Dr. Frederick Yonkman of Summit. N. J., at the first national medicinal chemistry symposium sponsored by the American Chemical society. Many scrious conditions result from overactivity of the so-called sympathetic nerves which construct blood vessels, increasing blood pressure locally and, in some cases, even cutting off the supply of blood to parts of the body, according to Dr. Yonkman, who explained that these nerves are stimu-Lated by the body chemical adrenalin.




