





Cancer Research Going On A total of 348 major cancer research projects are being carried on at leading medical and scientific centers throughout the United States, Dr. Alfred M. Popma of Boise, ex-ecutive chairman of the Idaho Cancer Society, said this week. Dr. Popma, who is also a member

of the Board of Directors of the American Cancer Society, said a total of 9,615,886 had been allocated last year for cancer research.

"Nearly every large university, medical school and research center in the country is now engaged in studying some phase of the causes and new methods of controlling the disease," he said.

"The progress that has been made by men and women engaged in the scientific study of cancer with materials, equipment and knowledge de-rived from the development of the atomic bomb furnishes all of us an excellent reason to be optomistic about eventually solving the mysteries of the disease.

"Even though the hope of the future lies in research, we have at the present time the knowledge and facilities which will save the lives of a large percentage of the victims of the disease if the symptoms of cancer are recognized while still in their early stages and then given prompt medical treatment."

Twenty-five cents of every dollar contributed to the cancer society goes into research and is allocated to research projects by the committee on growth of the National Research Council, in cooperation with the American Cancer Society.

The plant grows about eight feet tall in three or four years. In later years it does not grow much higher or more than about six feet wide. The mass of thorny canes becomes denser each year, making a stronger ffence.

Where permanent fences are de-sired, multiflora rose provides the cheapest form of fencing available. Plants established 18 inches apart are hog-tight, after three years. In some sections, original plantings 12 inches apart are used to confine rab-hits and chickens. bits and chickens.

Maurice Lundy, upland bird super-visor of the fish and game depart-ment, reported that several test plots of multiflora rose are now being grown in Idaho. The plant takes hold well in Idaho soils, and grows favor-ably in most sections of the state having a suitable climate for agri-culture. The Idaho fish and game department and the University of Idaho are conducting eventionents Idaho are conducting experiments with the plant, and expect to have 50,000 bushes available for farmers next year. Demand for the plant is heavy. One mid-western state dis-tributed 3,000,000 bushes to its farm-

ers last year. What advantages does multiflora rose have over ordinary wire fences? The first investment is small, and the hedge requires no maintenance. It is useful in erosion control, contour tillage and for stopping pasture gullies. Helps control weeds, and aids insect control by harboring the birds that live on insects. It is excellent wildlife cover. It repels livestock, and is well suited for line, contour and irregular fencing. Your fence may be grown in two years with good soil and culture. Makes a **Siving barrier**, plantings 25 years old are still strong and vigorous. Does not require clipping, pruning, train-ing or support. It may serve as an effective low windbreak to reduce wind damage.

Is it easily removed? Yes. Treatment by 2,4-D, or mowing off with a heavy mower will remove the plant.

What does it cost? A cattle-proor fence requires 1,700 bushes to a mile of fence, at a cost of \$25.00. They are cheaper than wire fences, even






