Swimming Pool Now Ready
Monday of this week saw the Area Living Water Memorial Swimming Pool being filled with water for the second time, following a shut-down for scrubbing and completion of repairs from Thursday until Monday.

It was believed, at the time of opening, a week ago last Sunday, that all the frozen and burst pipes and other winter damage had been repaired, but when the circulation system was put into steady use, a number of other leaks showed up and included was one in the "back-flushing" system of the filter, and another in the chlorinator. The pump motor, at first though undamaged, also burned out as a result of its winter's immersion in water, and the pumps also gave way — while they were shut down, a new motor and two new rotary pumps were installed, plus a new chlorinator and new filter screens.

No accurate figures are available, as yet, but it is estimated that the winter's damage will cost \$1,000.00 to repair.

Nobody missed the pool while it was shut down, however, as it was too cool to enjoy a swim most of the time.

Buy's Blooded Horse
Alvin Welchman, Juliaetta, paid the top price at the Appaloosa horse sale conducted at Roundup park, Lewiston, Saturday, part of the second annual Appaloosa horse show.

He purchased Princess Pat, a mare consigned by Jesse Heffel of Kendrick, for \$500.00.

Twenty-one of 65 animals consigned to the sale were sold, the remainder were withdrawn, low prices paid for the first animals offered being the cause. Other prices paid ranged from \$285.00 to \$100.00.

Re-decking Sperry Bridge

The bridge at the foot of Sperry grade is receiving a complete re-decking at the hands of a joint crew from Nez Perce County and the Kendrick Highway District. This has necessitated closing the bridge for a considerable period of time each day, forcing farmers to use the longer way round down Wauncher Gulch.

The re-decking, however, is badly needed, and has been for some time. The cost of the Kendrick side of the operation is being shared by the Kendrick Highway District and Village of Kendrick.

FORMER GAZETTE EDITOR WRITES OREGON HISTORY

The new kind of history, written sentimentally and in the spirit of literature, has been applied to Oregon; it is the first important book on the state in the fresh and welcomed trend; it sets such a high standard that it might well become a regional classic.

The book is "Oregon Pioneers," by the late Rollien Dickerson. It has a sub-title: "A presentation of some little known facts and portraits in the Oregon of yesterday, the twilight of the pioneer." It was published this spring by Wallace Hebbard, Santa Barbara, Calif.

The period covered is from 1890 into the 1920s. The book consists of 34 historical sketches, with such titles as "The Silence of the Mountains Did It," "The Strange Case of White Woman Versus Chinaman," "Superintendent of Schools in a Sage Brush County," "Editor in an Oregon Cattle Country," "Doorbell Missionaries of Yesterday."

In these are narrative and drama and suspense; conflict and humor and folk philosophy; in them is no smugness, no patronizing. They definitely rank among the best literary essays written about Oregon in over a century of writing.

This is the way he describes the Snake River gorge in the chapter called "The Philosophy of a Cattleman":

"After staying overnight with a prospector at the bottom of the deepest chasm on earth, I climbed wearily up the western slope leading my horse. On arriving, at a point near the top I mounted and turned north, following a cow trail in the shadow of the rimrock. Thirty miles I traveled without seeing a human being or a house, indeed without seeing any life at all except range cattle, an eagle, a skulking coyote and a couple of rattlers sunning themselves on the rocks. I was not lonely though, for all about me ageless creation marched. The Seven Devils, snowcapped and huge, pointed their jagged peaks heavenward straight across the gorge. The boiling, raging Snake, far below, rushed on. To my left rose perpendicular rimrock and to my right a vast precipice dropped. All day I plodded on, hushed in wonderment."

Mr. Dickerson died on May 10, 1949, shortly after his book was published. He was born in Douglas county, and was a member of the last class of the old Drain Normal School. He later graduated from the University of Oregon, becoming successively principal of the University high school, head of the history department in Felix Adler's school in New York and publisher of the Kendrick Gazette at Kendrick, Ida.

From 1890 to the time of his death he lived at Santa Barbara, Calif. He left the manuscript of a historical novel dealing with the time of Jesus. He dedicated "Oregon Pioneers" to the late Dr. H. D. Sheldon, dean for many years of the school of education at the university, who recognized and encouraged Mr. Dickerson's talent for literature. As the quality of the book becomes known, it can be expected to find a place in libraries, school collections, and widely in the hands of individuals interested in Oregon literature at its best. — Alfred Powers (Oregon Journal).

Rain Is Badly Needed
A brief shower Thursday night went a little way toward washing the dust out of the air, following a real old-fashioned dust storm — but that is about all it did, and rain, a good "soaker" is badly needed by both spring and fall grains.

Spring grain, almost without exception, is yellow in color, and short, and rain would give it the boost that it needs. Fall grain needs moisture for head filling, as well as to prevent premature ripening. Clover also would be benefited.

Those with hay down would not welcome the rain, but those who have not yet cut would greatly appreciate it, as it would put life into stems which are now having a tendency to "toughen" rather than grow. Beans would also "enjoy" the moisture, as would garden and melon raisers.

Hold Signs Of Tragedy
Evidence of what might have been a disaster to someone shooting the treacherous white water rapids of the Salmon river has been discovered nine miles southeast of its mouth and 50 miles south of Lewiston.

Jim Farrington, Kendrick, reported at the Nez Perce county sheriff's office Tuesday morning that while fishing along the boulder strewn banks of the stream on Sunday he found the steering apparatus for a scow, a new mattress and a fresh sack of flour washed onto the north bank. There was no sign of a scow or any life. Farrington told officers.

No recent expeditions through the Salmon river canyon to the stream's mouth by raft or scow have been reported.

A rumor that the gear might have belonged to a party of nine led by former U. S. Senator Henry Dworkshak, Burley, was scotched last night. The Dworkshak party did not leave Salmon until Sunday, the day the wreckage was sighted by Farrington, the sheriff's office said. — Lewiston Tribune.


Have Moved To New Home

Prof. Everett L. Ellis of the college of forestry will serve as manager of the camp. Assisting him will be William L. Pengelly, instructor in wildlife management.


Forestry summer camp is required for all graduates in forestry. The eight-week course is usually taken between the sophomore and junior years.
