To Tour North Idaho

The Idaho fish and game commission will tour northern Idaho to get first-hand information about wildlife habitat during its summer meeting beginning July 6 at Lewiston, R. G. Cole, chairman, announced this week. Four days will be spent inspecting department hatcheries, bird farms and other installations, and traveling several areas frequented by fishermen and hunters.

In addition to the field trips through the two northern districts, Cole said, the commission would conduct a public hearing in Lewiston relative to the upland bird situation. Hunting dates for birds will be determined at the session.

Clare Wellman of Lewiston, commission secretary, is making arrangements for trips through the north-central district July 6 and 7. The

commission will return to Lewiston for the open meeting July 8, at which time recommendations from individuals and groups will be heard. Then the group will move to the Panhandle district for two more days of grass-roots education. George Moody of Calder, first district commissioner, will outline the tour of his area. Cole said there would be opportunity for sportsmen's clubs or other organizations to arrange meetings with the commission while going through either district.

"It is important," the chairman said, "that we not only see as much of the fish and game country as possible, but that we have the benefit of the personal knowledge of people familiar with the problems through years of experience. It takes a great deal of information to develop a solid game management program. We cannot afford to overlook any assistance. All ideas are welcome."

If more time is required for completion of routine business, the commission will return to Lewiston on July 11. The two major matters of business are setting upland bird seasons for 1949 and consideration of a long-range policy for development and management of each of the several divisions, including big game, fish, fur, upland birds, migratory waterfowl and law enforcement.

Eighty-one Arrests In May

Conservation officers of the Idaho fish and game department arrested 81 persons for violations of game laws during May. T. B. Murray, department director, reported this week.

More than half the arrests were for violations of fishing laws, with 43 persons paying fines for unlawful fishing. Failure to make trapper's reports accounted for 23 arrests. Other arrests for improper hunting and purchase of wrong class licenses numbered 15.

Franklin county had 13 arrests during the month, the largest total in the state. Clearwater county had one, Latah and Nez Perce counties none.

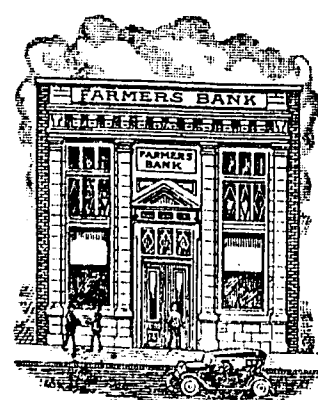

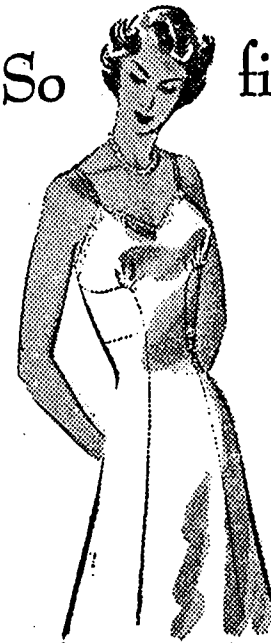
