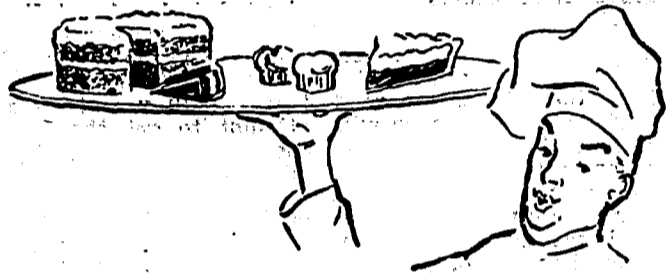

### Can No Longer Confiscate

Fishing tackle that gets back-lashed on the law still goes to court although the statute on confiscation of sporting gear was changed by the last Idaho legislature. T. B. Murray, director of the fish and game department, made it clear this week in response to numerous questions, that conservation officers are required to seize any tackle that may be required for evidence. After the hearing before a judge, the equipment is returned to the defendant, regardless of the outcome.

The director pointed out that the law still requires game officers to seize tackle and guns involved in infractions of the code. An amendment passed by the 1949 legislature put an end to confiscation of such equipment by the courts. In previous seasons the tackle could be confiscated on court order and either sold back to the defendant or turned over to the game department for auction. In most instances the gear was sold back to the original owner and the price fixed by the court thus became an addition to the fine.

Although defendants will not lose their tackle permanently as a result of an arrest, the department said, they must surrender the equipment to the officer at the time of arrest so it can become evidence before the court.

For example, it was explained, a man apprehended for fishing in a closed stream would be obliged to give up his rod to the officer until a judge determined guilt. Then the rod would be given back.

At no time, past or present, Director Murray declared, have conservation officers assessed fines or confiscated tackle. That is the pre-law the court may not confiscate regative of the courts. Under the lawful tackle or guns but may confiscate unlawful appliances such as dynamite, poisons and spears.

### Try-Out Camp Planned

Lewiston, Ida. — Tony Robello, well-known California baseball scout for the Browns, is certainly enthusiastic about the three-day try-out camp that will be held by the St. Louis organization at Bengal Field, Lewiston, beginning July 21.

Interest shown in the camp by young ball players in this area indicates a record attendance, and when Robello has a lot of boys to work with, his enthusiasm knows no bounds. Many boys who attended last year's camp will be back again to show what progress they have made. With another year tacked onto their age, pounds added to their weight and inches to their height, they will report to Robello with the idea they are ready to play professional baseball.

Boys will be coached in all the fundamentals of the game. Teams will also be formed so that players will have an opportunity to demonstrate their ability in actual contests. Each day's session will get under way at 11:00 a. m. and continue to 3:00 p. m. Tryout will be open free to all boys 17 to 23 years of age, but they must bring their own baseball shoes and gloves.

### Don't Build False Hopes

U. of I., Moscow — Farmers who see large numbers of bristly caterpillars chewing away on their Canada thistle patches shouldn't build false hopes that a friendly insect is about to eliminate the necessity of using chemicals or clean cultivation for the control of this weed.

"Although the caterpillars are feeding heavily on young thistle plants in many sections of the state this year, they probably will not be so abundant next year," explains William F. Barr, assistant entomologist with the U. of I. agricultural experiment station.

This caterpillar is the immature stage of the "Painted Lady" or "Thistle Butterfly," a common native insect. These butterflies are orange with black and white spots.

Apparently the butterfly, which comes in cycles, is at the peak of one of those cycles, for reports of caterpillars eating thistle plants have come to the entomology department from farming districts between Coeur d'Alene and eastern Idaho.

Dark-colored, with a yellowish stripe down the side, the inch and a half-long caterpillar which many farmers have hoped would eat up all of their Canada thistle, also feeds on lupine, nettle, a variety of weeds, and occasionally on cultivated crops.

"Caterpillars often kill a young thistle plant," Barr adds. "In most instances, however, the plant will recover after the caterpillars have changed into butterflies. In the butterfly stage, this insect lives on nectar. Being a native insect, this butterfly is preyed upon by a great many parasites and predators and kept in check during most of its cycle."

### Boy Scouts Lower Age Brackets

The National Council Boy Scouts of America, has taken formal action to lower the age brackets for all Scout groups, effective Sept. 1, according to J. Harry Lucas, council president of the Lewis-Clark Council. Mr. Lucas just returned from the National Council meeting at Boston, Mass.

Cub Scout age group will include boys in the 8, 9 and 10 year-old bracket; Boy Scouts will include 11, 12 and 13, and former Senior Scouts, now known as Explorer Scouts, will include ages 14, 15 and 16. A Scout reaching his 14th birthday will automatically be presented with his "Explorer Badge." He may then elect to become an Explorer Air Scout, Explorer Sea Scout, or may remain in the present Explorer program. He may also continue to remain active as a member of his regular Boy Scout troop should he elect to do so. Additional information will be available to all Scout units shortly.

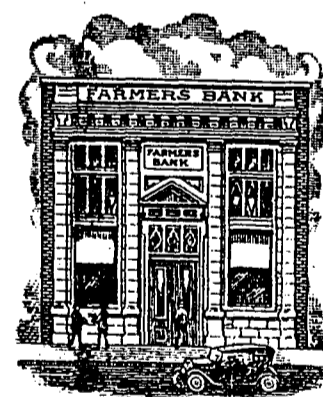

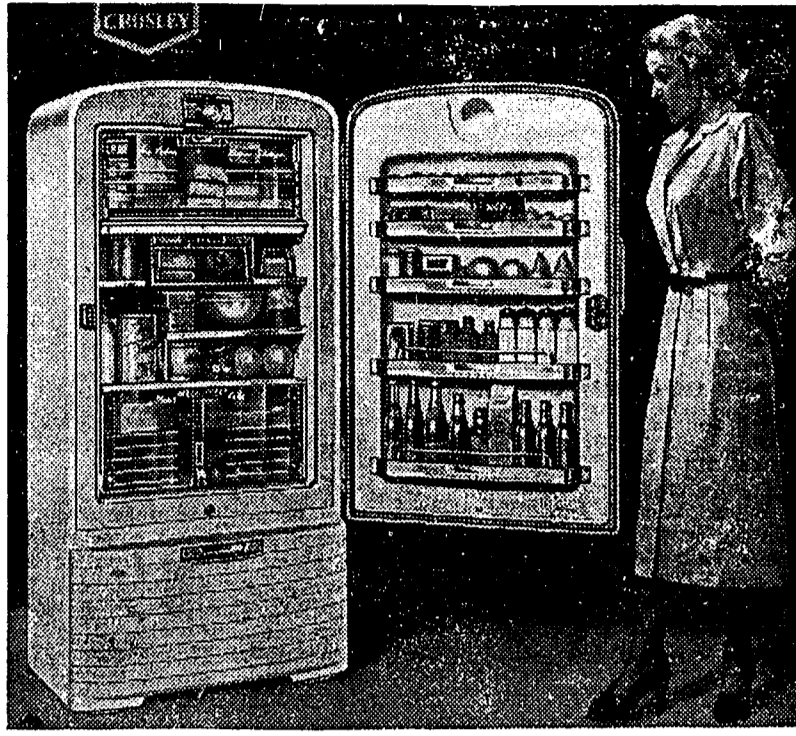

About Potato Costs

U. of I., Moscow — Want to know what it takes to produce the average sack of Russet potatoes on a southern Idaho irrigated farm? Roland Bevan, associate agricultural economist at the University of Idaho agricultural experiment station, has the answer.

This comprehensive potato production data came from a study of 84 southern Idaho farms — 29 in the Boise valley, 23 in the Twin Falls section, and 32 in the Idaho Falls district.

Here is how the average acre of southern Idaho potatoes appears to the statistician: Into this acre went 58.9 hours of man labor; 16.4 hours of tractor time; 14.8 miles of truck travel; 1,288 pounds of seed; 13.4 tons of manure; 300 pounds of commercial fertilizer; 18 pounds of DDT; 11.9 field sacks worn out and needing replacement every harvest, and 9.7 miles of truck travel hauling field workers.

To the above the grower will add local water costs, taxes, a rough estimate of machinery costs chargeable to the crop, and interest on the value of the land to secure the total cost of production.

Idaho's average acre of potatoes, incidentally, produced about 200 sacks (100-pounders) of potatoes. The data Prof. Bevan has accumulated on potatoes represents the first phase of a long-time research project to provide farmers in the irrigated districts with basic production requirements on all major crops.

Preliminary data has been collected but not yet tabulated on sugar beets, grains, hay crops, pastures and livestock.

Hoover Plan Would Help

Boise — Adoption by the U. S. Congress of the Hoover plan for government reorganization would save Idaho taxpayers millions of dollars each year, the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce declared this week.

"The present complicated system is ideal for the tax-eaters but not for the taxpayers," the State Chamber statement declared.

Pointing to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the chamber said there are nine field services at the county level, including Soil Conservation Service, Extension Service, Farmers Home Administration, Farm Credit Administration, Forest Service, Rural Electrification Administration, Bureau of Animal Industry and Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine.

There are now nine farm credit agencies which have loaned money and may loan again, the State Chamber stated, and added that better organization of these agencies might save \$36,000,000 a year over the nation, with Idaho having to pay less money into the national treasury.

Big Boost For Idaho

German publisher Otto Behrens likes Idaho — and he's telling both the Russian and American zones of Germany about the Gem State.

In an article entitled "Tourist Paradise in the U. S. A.," Behrens published a photograph of Hell's Canyon in Idaho and descriptive material, both provided him by the Idaho State Board of Publicity.

Behrens, who resides at Jena, Soviet Zone, Germany, describes Hell's Canyon as a "mountain gorge on the Snake river in Idaho, the deepest on the North American continent. The canyon is 60 kilometers long and is surrounded by wild, romantic mountain worlds."

"Idaho is a cross-section of the playgrounds of the United States," wrote Behrens. "It has high mountains which can compete with the Swiss Alps, primitive forests with thousand-year-old trees, charming valleys and big rivers flowing majestically through an unspoiled paradise."

The city of Jena, about 150 miles southwest of Berlin, is the home of the Zeiss optical works. The Idaho State Board of Publicity recently provided the German author with photographs of Idaho winter sports activities for a forthcoming publication from the American zone.

History of County Interesting

Latah county has the distinction of having been formed, voted out of existence, and then created by an act of the national Congress. In 1864 when the Second Territorial Legislature met, an act was passed to create Lah Toh County. The governor signed the bill, but nothing was ever done about it. Three years later the legislature divided up Lan Toh county, giving part of it to old Kootenai county and part to Nez Perce county. Thus Lah Toh county passed out of existence. Meanwhile, William Ewing located in the Palouse valley in 1869, and A. A. Lieuallen took up a homestead east of the present Moscow in 1871, and a year later the postoffice of Lieuallen was established. Later it was moved to the new village of Paradise, which became the Moscow of today. In 1876 Stewart and Beach built a sawmill, and a year later Bart and Langdon brought in another by ox team from Utah. Other pioneers were miners, with a sprinkling of farmers and livestock men. The settler petitioned for years to get a county of their own, but without result. After three attempts, they went to Congress where a bill to create Latah county was introduced in 1887. In 1888 President Grover Cleveland approved the bill, and Moscow was designated the county seat. A part of the famous Palouse country, Latah county has varied industry, mining, lumbering, farming, livestock raising and manufacturing. Wheat is one of the important crops, but almost every kind of grain, field crop, vegetable and fruit is grown in the county. Great white

The forests provide timber for lumber mills. Mineral resources include copper, a little gold and silver, diatomaceous earth, and others. Forests, fields and streams provide hunting, some fishing, and recreation. The university of Idaho is located at Moscow. Noted industrial features are the big Potlatch Forests, Inc., mills at Peclatch, mills and brick plants at Moscow and Troy. Beans of many varieties are raised near Kendrick. — Idaho State Chamber of Commerce.

## History of Nez Perce County

Named for a tribe of Indians, Nez Perce is one of the seven counties of 1864, from which all the present 44 counties have been created. Nez Perce was created when the area, in 1861, was still a part of the Territory of Washington. The first territorial legislature of Idaho, in 1863, designated the boundaries of Nez Perce county, but later legislatures carved out new counties and greatly reduced its size. Lewiston, the first capital of Idaho Territory, has always been the county seat. Rich in history, Nez Perce county towns tell the story of the frontier in their names. Lewiston, of course, was named for Meriwether Lewis of the Lewis and Clark expedition. Spalding is reminiscent of the Rev. Henry H. Spalding and his wife, the missionaries. Lapwai tells the story of forts and missions. Culesdes reminds us of the French trappers and traders. Lewiston shipped out by pack trains almost all the supplies used in the early gold rush days of Idaho. Today the chief industries are agriculture and fruit growing, and most of the products are grains, hay, fruits and vegetables. Nez Perce has been noted for cherries, grapes, flax and unusual seed crops. In canning and quick-freeze processing, the county has made many advances in recent years. Dairy, stock raising (both sheep and cattle) and poultry are carried on in connection with the farming of the rich, deep soil of the area.

The white pine sawmill at Lewiston is the largest and most modern plant in the world devoted to the manufacturing of white pine products. Although over 75 percent of the county is in agriculture, there remains mountains, forests, streams, lakes and other scenic and recreational attractions. Salmon River Canyon, Snake River boat trips, Wah Lake and others, bring thousands of visitors to the county each year.

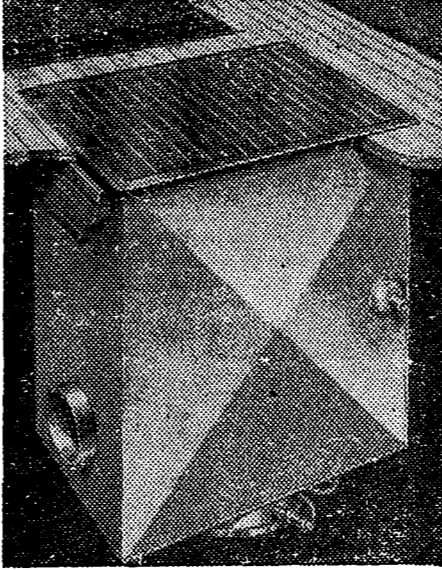
