Some notices have returned unclaimed, change of address or address unknown. Others have not been returned due, no doubt, to carelessness. If you are the owner of a brand and have not received your notice to renew, notify the state brand inspector's office at once.
A livestock brand is a cowman's symbol, his emblem, his coat of arms, and his evidence in court when he needs it. Preserve it by having it recorded in the state and county offices.

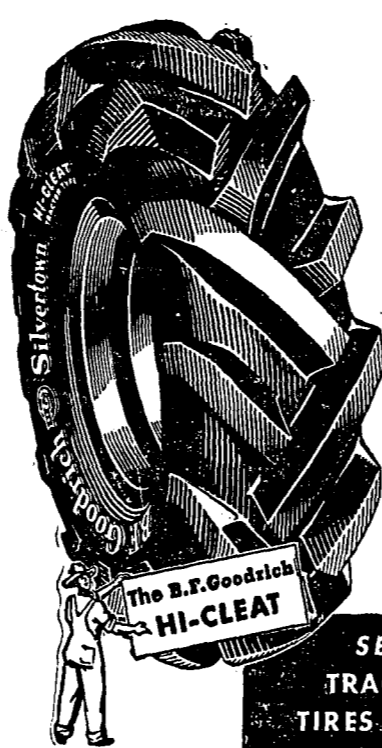
