### **Duck Season Set**

The Idaho Fish and Game Commission announced federal approval of migratory waterfowl seasons and bag limits for the state. The duck and goose shooting days

have been extended ten days over the 1948 season. Bag and possession limits and shooting hours generally remain the same. In view of the increased supply of birds indicated for this year, it has been decided to lengthen the season rather than increase the bag limit.

The opening date of the first season in Idaho will be October 14 at noon, and continues until Nov. 2. The second season will start at noon of December 9 and run until Dec. 28. The bag limit on ducks will be five in one day and ten in possession; Canada geese, two in one day or in possession. Idaho has no open season on snow geese.

Daily shooting hours will be from one-half hour before sunrise to one hour before sunset. Regulations prohibiting the use of shotguns capable of holding more than three shells are still in effect.

During the week just past the CCC confirmed sales of 4,265,351 bushels of wheat (including wheat and flour) under the international wheat agreement. These sales included 203,577 hundred weight of commercial flour (474,336 bushels of wheat equivalent); 341,713 bushels of commercial wheat and 3,449,292 bushels of CCC wheat.

Trading continued light at Pacafic Northwestern wheat markets with light offerings tending to hold prices steady compared with a week ago. Demand remained narrow as a result of somewhat slower milling inquiry and feed manufacturers were using only small quantities of wheat with cheaper feed grain available. The CCC came into the local market during the week but their purchases for a nine-day period totaled only 246,666 bushels. These purchases represented the first buying by the CCC in that market since April 25, when they bought 20,000 bushels of wheat. From all appearances their buying policy is not aggressive. Har-vesting was practically finished as the week closed and selling pressure was not apparent. Growers continued Bobby, accompanied by Mrs. Harley and purchase agreements as current prices were still about 4c under the loan rate. At the close of the market ordinary type red or white wheat was quoted at \$2.11 per bushel, or 1/2c higher than a week ago. Hard red winter was nominal at \$2.14, or unchanged.

Receipts of wheat at Columbia river terminals were again smaller and arrivals totaled 502 cars and Puget Sound 466, compared with 685 and 584, respectively, a week ago, and 1,043 and 1,259 cars, respectively, during the corresponding period a year ago. Most of the receipts represented wheat for storage under the loan program as well as old crop supplies moving in for export for the account of the CCC \_\_ which left only light supplies for the cash market.

Barley prices at Portland were up about \$1.00 per ton compared with a week ago. Strength in the corn market, light offerings and a good demand were the principal factors making for a firmer tone. Prices of hoth feed and malting types advanc-

Trading continued quite slow in the oats market, but prices on Portland delivery for No. 2 white or gray oats advanced to \$50.00 per ton, mostly reflecting small offer-



Watch Electric Fences The fellow who said that jelly fish were made of ocean currents may or may not have had something. But the farmer who uses dangerous currents in his electric fences is tak-

ing a chance.

William H. Knight, farm electrification project director at the University of Idaho, says it's a rare occasion when a farmer builds an electric fence that's safe to use on the farm. There's danger in its steady flow of current and in the high voltage that it may have. Accidents to farm people and livestock from this

source are not scarce, and many of them are painful, costly and occasionally fatal.

Knight says he's all for the electric fence on the farm. It has a place in the farm program if the owner uses the right kind of fence and takes the proper safety measures.

The engineer says every electric fence should have alternate "on and off" periods. Then it's possible for the man or animal to get loose from CROCKER'S GUN SHOP the man or animal to get loose from the fence in case he is unable to let go when the current is on.
