### Suggestions On Winter Wheat

Wheat ranchers in the Palouse  
having a lot of trouble with dwarf  
smut this year better turn to the  
smut resistant and higher yielding  
Rex variety of winter wheat.

W. K. Pope, research agronomist  
at the University of Idaho, says that  
Idaho doesn't have a good wheat  
variety that will meet all conditions,  
but Rex comes the closest so far.  
Because this variety is winter-hardy  
it stands up well in the field. Its  
only drawback is its poor milling  
quality which at times brings a  
lower market price.

Other soft white winter wheat  
varieties grown in the Palouse in-  
clude Golden or Fortyfold, Elgin and  
Orfed.

Golden's quality is better than  
that of Rex, the agronomist says.  
It produces a fair straw and yields  
well. However, its shortcomings are  
that it shatters, it is not smut res-  
istant, and is not as winter hardy  
as Rex.

Pope says that Elgin is a higher  
producer than most wheat varieties.  
Millers are pleased with its quality  
and its winter hardiness compares  
favorably with Rex. Unfortunately,  
the short, stiff-strawed variety is  
not resistant to smut. When planted  
too early on fertile soils, Elgin has  
a tendency to lodge severely the fol-  
lowing spring.

Resistant to most types of com-  
mon smut found in the Palouse, but  
not to dwarf smut, Orfed will yield  
well. Orfed is not as winter hardy  
as Rex. The best time to plant Orfed  
is late in the fall.

Southern Idaho wheat growers  
have two outstanding varieties, Pope  
points out. Lemhl, a good yielding,  
soft white spring wheat will do well  
in irrigated areas. For the dryland  
area, the recommended variety is

Wasatch. Wasatch is a hard red  
winter wheat that's resistant to  
dwarf smut, the most serious hazard  
to wheat in the dryland area.

**Watch Electric Fences**  
The fellow who said that jelly fish were made of ocean currents may or may not have had something. But the farmer who uses dangerous currents in his electric fences is taking a chance.  
William H. Knight, farm electrification project director at the University of Idaho, says it's a rare occasion when a farmer builds an electric fence that's safe to use on the farm. There's danger in its steady flow of current and in the high voltage that it may have. Accidents to farm people and livestock from this source are not scarce, and many of them are painful, costly and occasionally fatal.  
Knight says he's all for the electric fence on the farm. It has a place in the farm program if the owner uses the right kind of fence and takes the proper safety measures.  
The engineer says every electric fence should have alternate "on and off" periods. Then it's possible for the man or animal to get loose from the fence in case he is unable to let go when the current is on. Commercially made outfits have this "on-off" mechanism and rarely cause accidents. It is important that the electric fence be approved and stamped by the Underwriter laboratories. Taking chances with homemade fence controllers may lead to serious trouble.

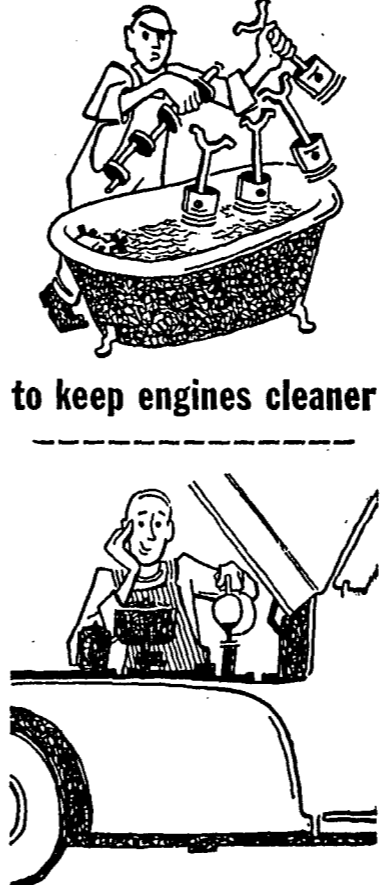

### How To Reduce Erosion

"Leaving land in the rough after late season plowing reduces the danger of erosion," declares K. H. Klages, agronomist at the University of Idaho. "Excessively working the land pulverizes the soil and causes great losses to Idaho's valuable top soil."

The agronomist points out that the much-needed moisture gets in rough surface soil much easier than in smooth, finer ground. Getting the powdery type of ground wet not only causes erosion losses, but makes such land harder to work.

Klages suggests farming on the contour is much as possible. Working and seeding fields up and down slopes only encourages the downhill flow of water and the loss of fertile soils.

### Rye For Better Pastures

Value of fall wheat or rye for fall pasture was called to the attention of dairy farmers and cattle raisers this week by G. C. Anderson, University of Idaho extension dairyman. Although not much rye is grown for grain, it can be pastured in the spring and followed by another crop such as beans or late potatoes.

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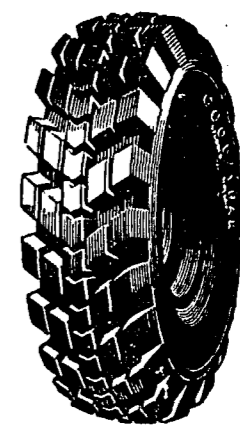
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
