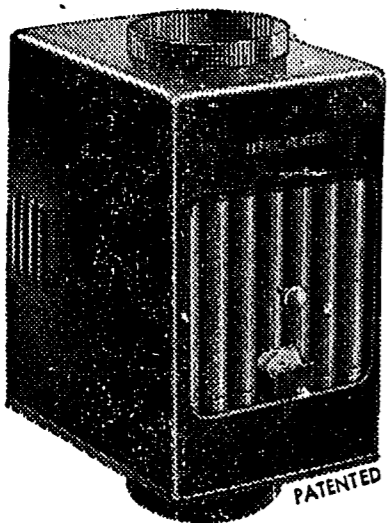

ECONOMIC HIGHLIGHTS

All of the criticism of President Truman's policies does not come from the formal opposition. Much of it has taken place within his own official family. The most striking example was the recent resignation of Dr. Edwin Nourse, who was the president's chief economic advisor for three years, following a blunt speech in which he strongly criticized the Administration's economic ideas.

"I am not happy," Dr. Nourse said, when I see the government slipping back into deficits as a way of life. He urged that the government put its fiscal house in order, and then said: "If we are to maintain the march of economic progress, we must — individually and as groups, in private business and in politics — display industry, prudence and self-discipline, recognize that we can't get more out of the economic system than we put in. . . . Monetary and fiscal tricks have no power of magic but are a slippery road to misery." In the course of his address Dr. Nourse also criticized the three-day week in the coal mines ordered by John L. Lewis, the effect of the steel workers to reduce the working day, and the pricing policies of some industries.

This would not be particularly newsworthy if Dr. Nourse were a conservative business economist. But he has always been regarded as a man of liberal views, and he has favored many New Deal and Fair Deal theories. The point seems to be that he, in company with many others, has become convinced that Mr. Truman's policies, and the enormous cost they involve, endanger our financial security as a nation. It is obvious to anyone that if the government must operate on a deficit basis in good times, when the national income is very high and tax revenues reflect this condition, the situation would become critical if business slackened and the economic machine slowed down.

This problem is underlined by the current labor situation. Secretary of Commerce Sawyer is the authority for the statement that if the steel and coal strikes continue until December, 5,000,000 men will be out of work. The grim effect of that on the economy is easily imagined. Men who are not working cannot buy. Merchants, landlords and others cannot collect their accounts, so they too cannot buy. The cycle thus started spreads until every enterprise and every section of the country is affected. Wages and earnings drop and so do the government's revenues. And even when a great strike ends, it takes a long, long time to make up the lost ground.

In any event, Mr. Truman undoubtedly faces stormy days ahead. He has shown no disposition to give ground on any policy, but the opposition to his economic policy is growing. — Industrial News-Review.

Okanogan Resident Says PUD's Not Beneficial

To the Editor of the Spokesman-Review: I write of public utility districts voted in by a minority group who possibly were unaware of the tragic step they were taking.

If government ownership of electric power is not socialism, then it would not be socialistic for us to have public ownership of the oil fields and refineries or the coal industry. Are not they too a power-producing operation?

As users of such power now furnished by PUD No. 1 of Okanogan county, have we experienced any of the benefits we were told we would? Are power rates cheaper? Does our county lose or gain more revenue through taxation of the power company? Has the service been greatly improved, or is it worse? The majority can now testify, and that majority includes most of that minority which voted PUD in, that this form of socialism in particular has become a chronic illness to which they wished they had never been exposed.

Too Late for Cure

The pathetic part is that there is no cure once it takes hold. The bonded indebtedness of PUD No. 1 of Okanogan county is now so heavy that no one can conceive of any inducement for a private power company to come back in and take over. Having no funds, PUD has paid the way with bond issues. Having no funds, when they have selected to expand their service or building program more bonds were sold, and having no funds, when flood damage was suffered it became necessary either to another bond issue, increase in rates or, that which now exists, the 10 per cent surcharge.

Anything which is undertaken or any loss suffered, is passed along to the power consumer who also has to pay the interest on the bonds. It is a disease which not only has no cure but which becomes progressively worse.

We of the Okanogan country cannot rid ourselves of this tumor, but we can perhaps gain some comfort in saving those people not already victims by telling them, pleading with them, to steer clear of any attempts made by socialistic groups to push PUD down their throats.
