Idaho big game hunters killed Lieutenant was awarded posthum-more deer and fewer elk this year ously, effective Feb. 16, 1944. fish and game department big game sisters, Mrs. Sam Lange, Prescott,

in the Lochsa and Selway areas. Hunters checking into the Selway elk area numbered 10,983, of which 25 percent were snuccessful in bag-

ging elk. Last year 15,929 hunters checked in and killed 3,675 elk, for a 23 percent success ratio. Total elk kili last year was 5,944.

Deer hunters killed 22,279 deer during the 1949 season, a slight increase over the 21,924 deer shot in 1948. Northern Idaho counties dropped nearly 50 percent in deer kill this year, but sharp increases in the southwestern and southeastern sections boosted the state total.

Bear hunting netted 462 bear this year, compared with 531 bruins kill-

Antelope kill was down, with 419 killed in 1948, compared with 385 this fall. The special moose hunt yielded 27 bulls out of 30 permits both years.

No season was held on mountain goat or bighorn sheep. McDermott said no indication of going into the winter would be available until fieldmen can check on migration to winter range.
