To Enjoy Christmas Trees

Navy forces stationed on Guam, Samoa, Kwajalein and other bases in the South Pacific will have a green Christmas this year. Silver-tipped red fir trees cut months in advance in the high Sierras and coated for preservation with a liquid plastic are now en route to naval installations west of the Hawaiian Islands. Trees coated with a preservative material are required by the navy for this vast area because it was necessary to ship the trees from Oakland, Calif., between October 25 and November 15.

The trees were cut, treated and delivered to the navy by a contracting firm, who conduct their operations 8,000 feet high in the Lake Tahoe region. The silver-tipped red firs were sprayed with the liquid plastic within 48 hours after cutting, and then moved to the naval supply center at Oakland for trans-shipment.

The liquid vinyl plastic forms a transparent coating over the trees, sealing in the moisture present in boughs and needles. It may also be used as a spray or dip for wreaths, holly and other cut Christmas ever-green decorations.

New Potato Being Tested

Tests of the Yampa, a new kind of potato, will be made next season to determine its adaptability to Idaho conditions. Robert Pelkey, potato specialist of the U. of I. extension service, said this week.

Yampa is a disease-resistant potato, developed and introduced cooperatively by the U. S. department of agriculture and the Colorado experiment station as a result of nine years of breeding and selection. It is a medium-early, round, white, smooth skinned variety that shows resistance to scab, leaf roll, mild mosaic and early blight, as well as some tuber resistance to late blight in the high plains area. It is well-adapted to light, sandy soils, the U. S. D. A. said, but shows a tendency to crack when spaced too far in the rows in heavy soils.

Yields up to 879 bushels per acre were obtained from Yampa in Colorado.

To Pay Huge Tax Bill
The Washington Water Power Co. will make its first half payment of 1949 property taxes to Latah and eight other counties tomorrow (Friday, Dec. 16). Total payment for 1949 will be \$412,929.84, an increase of more than 13 percent over the previous year.
Edna M. Theriault, Latah county tax collector, will receive the tax check for \$19,738.97 from V. S. Casebolt, W. W. P. Co. manager. This amount represents the first half payment, Casebolt said, and disclosed the total for the year would be \$39,477.93, a 15 percent increase over last year.
Mr. Casebolt said the total 1949 tax is the largest paid to date for the company's Idaho taxes. He explained that major portions of the increase were due generally to increases in property valuation and additional levies.

Following is the amount of property tax to be paid tomorrow to eight other Idaho counties: Benewah, \$9,144.13; Bonner, \$1,657.06; Clearwater, \$9,368.96; Idaho, \$13,545.51; Kootenai, \$86,887.93; Lewis, \$5,266.31; Nez Perce, \$53,772.22, and Shoshone, \$24,879.06.
Our Note: Public power advocates should bear in mind that should a CVA program to be forced upon the people, checks like these will not be coming in. This money will have to come from some other source!

Give Those Cows A Rest
Cows need a rest, too. In order to produce a sturdy calf and a satisfactory supply of milk during her next lactation, a dairy cow should have six to eight weeks of loafing, according to G. C. Anderson, dairyman of the extension service, University of Idaho.
Good feed during the dry period is a number one consideration he said. If pasture isn't available, hay and silage should be fed liberally. Anderson said that many Idaho dairymen are wisely building up the reserve for the extra responsibilities of the dry period by particular attention to feed during the latter part of the lactation, so the cow can take it easy when she needs additional strength.

The Power Grab
It was bound to happen. TVA started out with the 40,000 square miles in the Tennessee water shed, then extended its so-called service area another 40,000 square miles, is now reaching out for the Cumberland valley, which is being developed by the army engineers.
The excuse is that TVA needs more power. Most of its good hydro sites on the Tennessee and its tributaries have been developed. And while the congress has approved a start on the new \$54,000,000 New Johnsonville steam plant, that won't be enough to take care of the increased demands of the atomic energy commission's expanded program at Oak Ridge, or the proposed new U. S. air force experiment station and supersonic wind tunnel. So the logical thing is to grab the Cumberland valley where the corps of engineers are working on 12 flood control projects that will eventually produce 850,000 kilowatts of power and control floods on the Cumberland.
TVA is already getting some power from the Cumberland which parallels the Tennessee in part. Under the law, the engineers are supposed to turn over the power to the department of interior for marketing. As TVA is the department of interior's designated marketing agency, power from Dale Hollow and other army hydro plants is delivered to TVA at the bus bar. And a good part of the Cumberland valley is already labeled TVA service area.
But that isn't enough. TVA wants to take over the whole show, including the army engineer's program for the comprehensive development of the Cumberland. And Senator Kefauver and Representative J. Percy Priest of Tennessee are obliging by introducing legislation to incorporate the Cumberland under TVA.
This isn't the first time that TVA has taken over corps of engineers' programs for the comprehensive development of river basins. It took over the army program for development of the Tennessee lock, stock and barrel, put a TVA label on it and went ahead, crowding the army engineers out of that valley. Now it would do the same in the Cumberland. And if a CVA were established, it would simply take over the corps of engineers' program for the comprehensive development of the Columbia, put a CVA label on it and go ahead.

Asked by a representative of The Journal last spring about rumors that TVA might try to embrace the Cumberland basin, Gordon R. Clapp, chairman of the TVA board, said: "TVA has no program for expanding its power service area and we have no desire to 'enroach' on territory now served by private utility companies." He added that TVA doesn't extend its power service area unless it is asked to do so.
But that was last spring.

Trick On Rats And Mice
An old shoe box gives the boot to mice in the hen house. Poultrymen of Franklin county are having such success with this simple method of mouse and rat control that Reid Merrill, extension poultryman of the University of Idaho, believes their ideas should be passed on to the rest of the state.
"They took an ordinary shoe box," he said, "cut a hole in each end large enough for a mouse or rat to get through, but too small for chickens, and placed a fish can baited with poisoned wheat inside the box. Results were good. There were a lot of dead mice and rats. The chickens suffered no casualties."
Permanent control of the rat tribe, Merrill said, requires more than a poison campaign. Hen house construction is the main thing. Cement instead of wood flooring is a good proposition, because most nesting occurs under wood flooring. If shavings or sawdust are used for insulation, the poultryman suggested that chicken farmers be careful that they do not become rat runs.
In applying the shoe box stunt, poultrymen were advised to place the boxes under roosts and behind wire so chickens cannot get at the dead pests.
