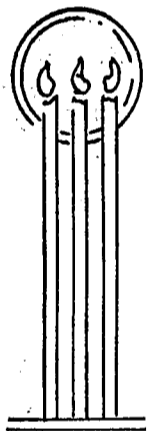

### Breeders' Short Course

Moscow — The third annual Breeder-Herdsmen Short Course will get under way on the University of Idaho campus January 23, according to an announcement made here by C. W. Hickman, head of the university's department of animal husbandry. The Short Course will last through January 25.

Hickman said the program will include discussions of feeding, breeding, management, and selling of registered beef cattle. There will be laboratory work in judging and fitting and showing of sale cattle.

Prominent Northwest livestock men who will appear on the 1950 program are Herb Chandler, Baker, Ore., T. B. Keith, University of Idaho animal nutritionist; Dr. L. H. Scrivner, University of Idaho station veterinarian; Dr. A. P. Schneider, Idaho State veterinarian; Herb Osland, Pullman, Wash.; John Burns, Lewiston, Idaho; John Matheson, Colburn, Idaho; W. J. Florence, University of Idaho herdsman, and E. F. Rinehart, extension animal husbandman.

### STATE FISH AND GAME DEPARTMENT WANTS MONEY

Members of the Idaho State Fish and Game Commission met in special session in Boise, Dec. 16. Commissioners George Moody, Calder; Paul Thomas, Twin Falls, and R. G. Cole, Boise, chairman, attended the conclave.

Chairman Cole called the meeting for the purpose of acting upon proposed acquisition of certain lands situated in the former Farragut Naval training base in north Idaho, and to consider other matters that might need commission action.

Actions taken by the commission included:

Authorizing the director to purchase at a price of \$49,985.00, approximately 95.5 acres of land, being a portion of the Farragut Naval Training Center.

Approved the application by the director for 3,816 acres of land together with all roads, the perimeter fence, 13 buildings, pumphouse No. 8 with equipment; and the underground utilities in the married-officers quarters area, made to the General Service Administration under the terms of Public Law No. 537, for fish and wildlife conservation purposes at the Farragut Naval Base. This acquisition does not involve payment or transfer of funds.

Asked that necessary steps be taken to obtain the withdrawal from and filing of mineral and other claims upon said lands through the U. S. Dept. of the Interior.

Approved the application for an increased allotment of funds for capital outlay in the amount of \$15,000 for the first quarter ending December 31, 1949.

Authorized the director to enter into preliminary plans, specifications and estimates for Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration Land Acquisition Projects on the Star Lake Management Area in Lincoln county for the purchase of approximately 360 acres, together with all water rights and improvements for the price of \$24,000 and the Boise River Elk and Deer Winter Range in Elmore County for the acquisition of 585 acres of ranch land and 2,326 acres of lease holdings at a total cost of \$20,000.

The commission authorized the director to request an increase in the appropriation for funds for the purpose of capital outlay expenditure at the coming special session of the Idaho Legislature to be held in February, 1950. Purpose of the request is to replace funds previously appropriated for the capital outlay from the Fish and Game Fund, and that would be expended upon purchase of these lands.

Our Note: Apparently unworthy of note to the commissioners was the resignation of Claire Wellman of Lewiston, representative of this district, from the State Fish and Game Commission. Mr. Wellman tendered his resignation as a protest over the very unequitable distribution and planting of fish — stating that this district, No. 2, was being ignored in favor of others throughout the state, principally southern Idaho.

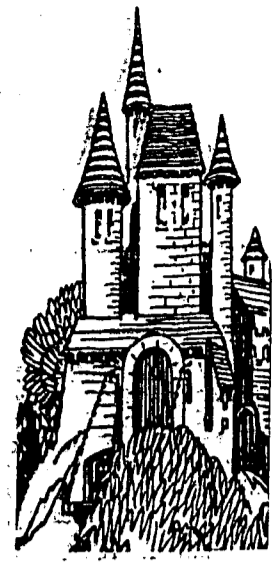
The State Fish and Game Commission also apparently ignores the fact that the more ground they buy (and they own plenty right now) the less there remains to bear the tax burden — for that which they control is also tax free! We also fail to see how their ownership of range and farm land, buildings and equipment thereon, would further one iota our game program. But then, perhaps southern Idaho will benefit!

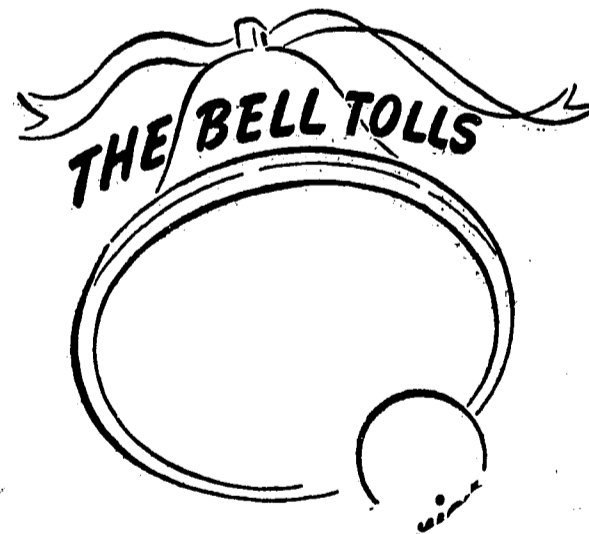

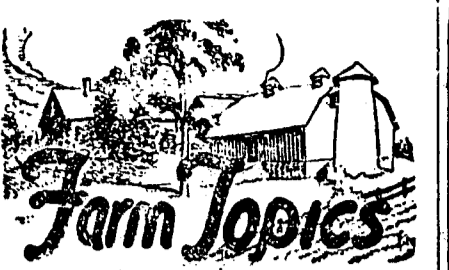

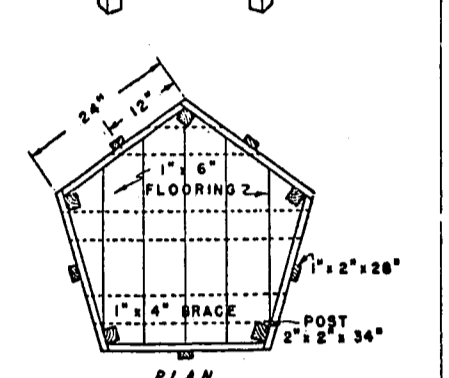

**Easily Built Trough Will Aid Sheepmen**  
 Designed to Cut Labor, Lumber, Space and Feed

An easily built grain or hay trough has proved to be a problem for many sheep growers, but this trough designed by H. M. Briggs, department of animal husbandry, Oklahoma agricultural experiment station, will provide the answer to that problem in many cases.



This trough will save lumber, space and feed for the sheep grower. As the drawings show, the trough can be built easily by any farm handy-man, if the plan is followed strictly. It should be noted that the trough has its own floor. If yearling rams are to be fed, the material should be slightly heavier than is shown in the plan. The center of the pen, according to Briggs, is the most desirable location for this trough. Or several can be placed in a lot or pen. If the trough is placed on a dirt floor or lot, dig a shallow hole under each leg so the trough cannot be pushed about. In a bedded pen, the legs will anchor in the bedding. The trough can be cleaned easily by tipping it up.

**Caution Urged In Use Of Chemicals, Sprays**  
 Dust sprays, gasses and other insecticides will do much to promote the healthy growth of fruits and vegetables is the gist of instruction being passed out now by county agents over the nation. However, these can often have just the opposite effect on people. Even though the container may not bear the skull and crossbones label, caution is necessary since many substances are harmful in some ways to man, despite the fact that they may not be definitely poisonous. The whole story of safety in use of insecticides, it was pointed out, is simply precaution.

**Technique Is Outlined For Reclaiming Leather**  
 One way to bring mildewed leather back into service in short order, say home management specialists, is to wipe it with a cloth wrung out in diluted alcohol. Use one cup of denatured alcohol to one cup of water. Then, if necessary, wash with thick suds of mild, neutral soap, or saddle soap; wipe with a damp cloth, and dry in an airy place. When dry polish with good wax dressing.

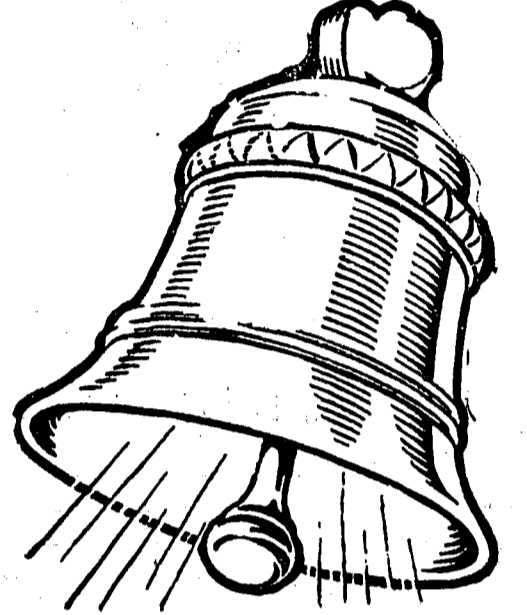

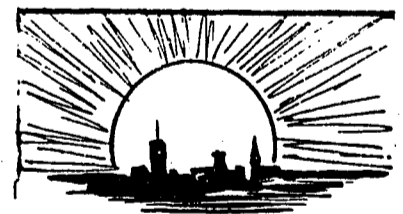
