## TIGERS DROP GAME BY ONE POINT TO GENEESE

The Kendrick Tigers dropped their final home game of the season to the Genesee Bulldogs by one point in an over-time period before a howling rooting capacity crowd Friday evening, the superior height of the Genesee players finally taking its toll.

During almost the first half of the game Genesee used a zone defense, but at the rest period in the second quarter, switched to man-to-man.

The first quarter ended 8 to 6 in favor of Genesee. The half ended 14-16 in favor of the Tigers. The third quarter saw the Tigers with an eight-point lead, the score board reading 19 to 27 for Kendrick.

In the final quarter, however, as play grew faster and faster, the Genesee Bulldogs whittled away at the Tiger lead and at the final horn the board read 38-37 for Genesee as the final second ticked away.

Genesee has easily the tallest team in this section, and this height counted heavily against the Tigers on back-board recovery. However, it was a hard-fought battle from start to finish, and both teams played real ball.

For Teddy Fey, Bob Ware, Luther Parks, Max Dammarell and Lee Walsh it was the last game on the local floor, as they are graduating this spring. They will, however, see action in the sub-district tournament, and possibly the district tournament, the sub-district beginning Wednesday night of this week.

In the B squad eye-opener the Tigers experienced no difficulty in subduing the Bull Pups of Genesee to the tune of 42-25 — Kendrick leading all the way, and Don Milhard, coach of the B squad, substituted freely, giving everyone of his charges in uniform a chance to play.

The score by quarters was: First, 18-3, Kendrick; half, 26-15, Kendrick; third, 33-22, Kendrick; final, 42-25, Kendrick.

During the intermission between the B squad and A squad games, entertainment was furnished by the Kendrick band and the Tiger Majorettes, with music and formation twirling, which brought rounds of applause.

At the half-time intermission in the A squad game, the Leland school girls Tap Dancing team entertained, and their precision and perfect timing brought round after round of applause — in fact, the audience would settle for nothing less than an encore, despite the fact that they were holding up the game. These girls, and their coach, Mrs. Frances Peters, Leland, are to be highly congratulated on their fine performance. All the girls were dressed in the same style, pastel colored skirts, white blouses and "pill box" hats matching the skirts — all of which added to the symmetry of their dancing.

Game schedules for three sub-district class B basketball tournaments within the second district were announced Wednesday of last week.

The double-elimination tests will decide sub-district representatives to the district tournament at Lewiston Feb. 27-March 4. Sub-districts playing elimination tournaments this week are the Valley, South Prairie and White Pine.

Winners and runners-up in sub-district trials will compete for the second district flag. A fourth sub-district — the River circuit — will send its conference winner and runner-up to the district meet.

Eight class B teams will go to the state test. Districts 1 and 2 will send district winners and runners-up and remaining districts will send winners. The right to send two teams from one district to state play rotates annually.

## FINAL RITES HELD FOR FRANK SPRAY, PIONEER

Final rites for William Franklin Spray, Juliaetta pioneer, were held in the Juliaetta Methodist church, Thursday morning, Feb. 9, with the Rev. Earl Gaskill bringing the message. Interment was at Palouse, Wash.

William Franklin Spray was born May 27, 1867, near Ruby Creek, Montana, and departed from this life February 5, 1950, at Lewiston, Idaho, at the age of 82 years, eight months and nine days.

As a young man he came to the Palouse country, and lived in Idaho and Washington the rest of his life.

He was united in marriage to Susie Bunch, January 18, 1898.

He leaves to mourn their loss his wife, Susie, at the family home in Juliaetta; one daughter, Mrs. Thelma Clink of Moses Lake, Wn., two grandchildren; three sisters; one brother, and a host of friends.

He was a member of the Methodist church, having joined that faith when but a boy.

Mr. Spray had enjoyed good health and was active physically until he suffered a fall on ice near his home some three weeks ago, breaking a hip. He was rushed to a Lewiston hospital, but failed to rally from the injury. He was a true friend, a fine neighbor, and he will be greatly missed. The filled church and lovely floral tributes attested to the high esteem in which he was held.

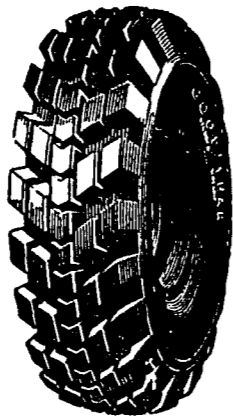

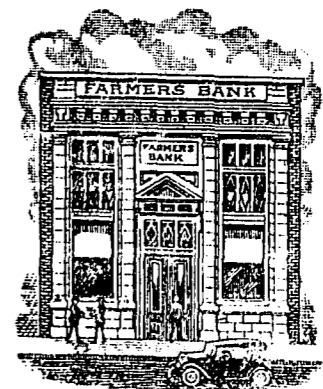

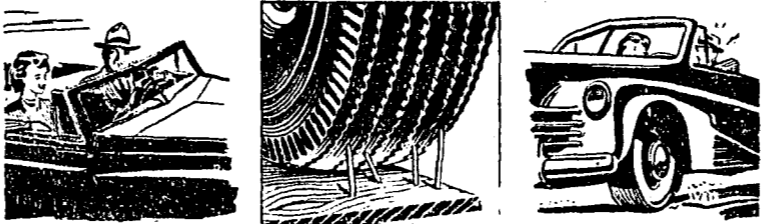

**Game Wintering Nicely**  
Winter game range conditions are favorable in the upper Lochsa river drainage, according to a report received from W. R. Moore, ranger for the district, after a recent nine-day trip in the region.

Moore reported all elk seen were strong and healthy. Not a single dead or weak animal was found in the area. Heavy snows during December and January had accumulated to a probable depth of six feet and forced the elk down along the Lochsa river. A mid-January thaw was recorded and snow settled to an average of 42-inches in depth, allowing the animals to move freely and obtain sufficient browse to fulfill their needs.

Milder temperatures this winter have also contributed to improved conditions for the game, the ranger said. Minimum temperature at the Powell ranger station was 17 below, compared with a low of 33 below last winter.

Victor P. Parent, Missoula District alternate ranger made the trip with Moore.

**Watch How You Feed Birds**  
"Don't make your feed station a death trap" the fish and game department warned this week. Many cooperative Idaho sportsmen have established pheasant feed stations in outlying areas and many farmers have been feeding birds on their places.

Feed stations established near roads will draw birds into the general area and out onto roads. Traffic kill is very heavy when birds are cold or wet and unable to react or move quickly.

Care should also be taken to place food for pheasants near some suitable cover, so that crows, cats, dogs or hawks cannot catch game birds out in open fields. Addition of clean sand or grit will aid the birds' digestion.
