LOCAL H. S. BAND TO TAKE PART IN MUSIC FESTIVAL

Musicians from the local high school will be helping raise the roof at the annual Prairie Music Festival, which will be held in Grangeville on Saturday, March 25, when an estimated 300 music-makers from 10 area schools will meet to fill not only the day, but the night, with individual and massed harmony. Three music directors of importance will present written criticism of individual bands, choruses and ensembles. These are Jack Snodgrass, Caldwell supervisor of music, whose work with high school bands is much admired; Paul Preus, head of the music department, Northern Idaho College of Education, who has recently returned from a state tour with this a capella choir, and Kermit Hosh, band director, University of Idaho, who has studied with symphonic musicians and has won attention as a clarinetist.

On Saturday morning, individual bands, choruses and ensembles will be heard; in the afternoon Grangeville's Main street will be filled with an all-schools, all-band parade that will be followed by band and chorus rehearsals for the evening concert. This will begin at 7:30, in the school gymnasium, and is the only event for which there is an admission charge. In addition to the massed band and chorus numbers, Mr. Hosh will be heard in clarinet solos. To make it possible for musicians to eat fast, eat well, and eat at moderate prices, noon lunch will be served by women of the Federated church, and the evening dinner by the Grangeville Parent-Teacher association. A Chamber of Commerce dinner at the high school home economics department will honor music directors.

Morning session will be held in the high school auditorium and Senior study hall, about three blocks south from Main street. The special lunch and dinner will be in buildings only a short distance away. Don McKinley, head of the music department at Grangeville, is festival chairman. Burke Sower, music instructor in the Kendrick schools, will be in charge of the Kendrick delegation, which will include the boys and girls' choral groups.

Dr. W. B. VanWert Passes On — Grangeville, March 11 — Dr. Ward B. VanWert, 73, a Grangeville veterinarian for a number of years, died yesterday at the General hospital after a heart attack suffered Monday.

Dr. Van Wert was born Nov. 17, 1876, at Valesia, Iowa. He married after moving to Grangeville. His wife, Jennie Van Horn VanWert died in 1915.

In 1925 Dr. VanWert, daughter Geneva and son Fred moved from Grangeville to Kendrick, locating on a farm some two miles east of town, where they made their home until about 1937, when they moved back to Grangeville.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Geneva, Niewinter of Salt Lake City, a sister living at Provo, Utah and a brother in California. Both are unknown in Grangeville. One son, Fred, preceded him in death.

Funeral services were held at the Ailor chapel Friday afternoon at 2:00 with the Rev. J. N. Urdike, pastor of the Grangeville Christian church bringing the message. Burial was in Prairie View cemetery. Pallbearers were Ernest King, Jim Atwood, William Frel, Floyd Cannon, Jack Keller and Dave Cummings.

Road Work Be Resumed

We understand that work has been resumed by the DeAtley Construction Co., on the mile link they are building between Kendrick and Juliaetta — and it's certain that local residents would appreciate the early completion of this job — for the detour provided is, without a doubt, one of the worst, if not the worst, stretch of road in the Idaho state highway system. If the detour is negotiated by anyone in a car without scraping and banging, it is considered quite a feat, and the driver is to be congratulated.

Last week we were visited by a salesman from Portland, Ore., who told us that he had traveled more than 4,000 miles since the middle of January, and that this piece of road was by long odds the worst — even including detours around slides on the Columbia river highway.

Many times a few hours work with a No. 2 shovel would have done much toward improving this section — but apparently there was (or is) no one who understands the operation of such a "complicated" piece of equipment!

NINETEEN ATTEND REGULAR COMMERCIAL CLUB MEETING

Nineteen interested business men and farmers sat down to dinner Wednesday evening, March 8, at dinner in the Kendrick Cafe, to be joined by two others for the 7:30 business session in the city hall.

First matter of interest taken up following the reading of the minutes, was that of roads. Tom Long of the Highway Committee stated that road repairs by the Kendrick Highway district were making steady progress, although several slides had plagued them. He also reported that the DeAtley Construction Co. was making a new crusher set on the ball park, and that state surveying crews were now working between Juliaetta and Kendrick — evidently on a preliminary survey.

Adding to the report, George F. Brocke, who had just returned from Boise, stated that he had talked with Mr. McKinley, commissioner of Public Works, and with James Reed of the state highway department. Both men informed him that a dust clogging problem would be carried out this spring between Juliaetta and Kendrick — and that as yet no definite set-up had been formed for the new road between the towns, as such plans and work take time to prepare.

Adding still more to the report, Gerald Ingle, who also had just returned from Boise, said that he had held a brief conversation with Mr. Reed, who told him that the road would be built within the next two years.

A round-table discussion of the terrible road conditions between Kendrick and Juliaetta followed. George F. Brocke stated that he had investigated the situation, and that the DeAtley Construction Co. had a total of 150 working days from the start of the contract, and of these there remained 38! He added that this contract was dated July 14!

Reporting for the Fish and Game committee W. A. Watts stated that big game and game birds had apparently wintered well — but he could add nothing about fish, as everyone knew there were no fish worth mentioning in this district.

Mr. Watts report was supplemented by George F. Brocke, who said that the game department income amounted to about \$1,363,000. This came from the sale of licenses, fish and fish spawn, beaver pelts, etc.

Reporting for the Agricultural committee Gerald Ingle stated that arrangements were complete for the coming Wednesday Farmer's Institute. A free lunch of beans, sandwiches, coffee and a maple bar were to be served.

On conclusion of Mr. Ingle's report, Dr. D. A. Christensen, chairman, appointed him as local chairman for the institute meeting.

Reporting for the Boy Scout committee J. G. Travis stated that the Kendrick Grange had paid \$37.50 toward the local Boy Scout fund.

Gerald Ingle, reporting for the Education Committee, stated that the school was going well, although the basketball tournaments had cut into attendance the past two weeks.

Tom Keene of the Entertainment committee then introduced Martin Wilkerson of Juliaetta, a ventriloquist, and his dummy, "Elmer." Mr. Wilkerson entertained the gathering with songs and jokes.

G. F. Brocke, State Senator from Latah County, then gave the club a brief resume of appropriation and other matters taken up at the Special Session of the Idaho State Legislature. He said that consideration was given the proposed re-vamping of the state highway set-up, and that the six-man advisory board bill had been passed but not yet signed by the governor. He added that under the new fund distribution plan Latah county would receive approximately \$13,000 more than in 1949. The "upping" of license fees failed to pass, as did a withholding tax on the Idaho Income Tax plan, which would have caught many out-of-state laborers. Old age pensions also showed a heavy expenditure, and it is estimated Idaho school systems would be -1,276,000 in the red for a year.

The matter of business houses closing for Good Friday church services was taken up, and the club voted unanimously to ask all business firms to close between the hours of 12:00 noon and 3:00 on that day. A union service is scheduled during those hours.

L. A. Wallace then brought up the matter of road drainage near the Jasper Nutting home (probably better known at the Grant pond) and stated that when the river rose it forced water back through the drainage culvert rather than permitting surplus to flow into the river.

A committee consisting of W. A. Watts, Herman and Otto Schupfer was appointed by the chair to contact Elmo Eldridge, section foreman, and take the matter over.

Mr. Wallace next brought up the problem of Red Cross Swimming lessons for the area pool for the coming summer, stating that instructors capable of giving such lessons and issuing life guard cards would cost about \$150.00 more than was paid for a registered life guard the past summer, and he asked the club sentiment in the matter. On motion by Gerald Ingle, seconded by L. S. Thurber, the club endorsed the employment of such an instructor. An effort will be made to obtain Red Cross funds for this expense.

Burton L. French To Speak — U. of I., Moscow — A man who became noted as a speaker at the University of Idaho more than a half-century ago will return to the campus March 22 to give the annual Phi Beta Kappa address. He is Dr. Burton L. French, former United States congressman, and now professor of government, emeritus, at Miami university, Oxford, Ohio.

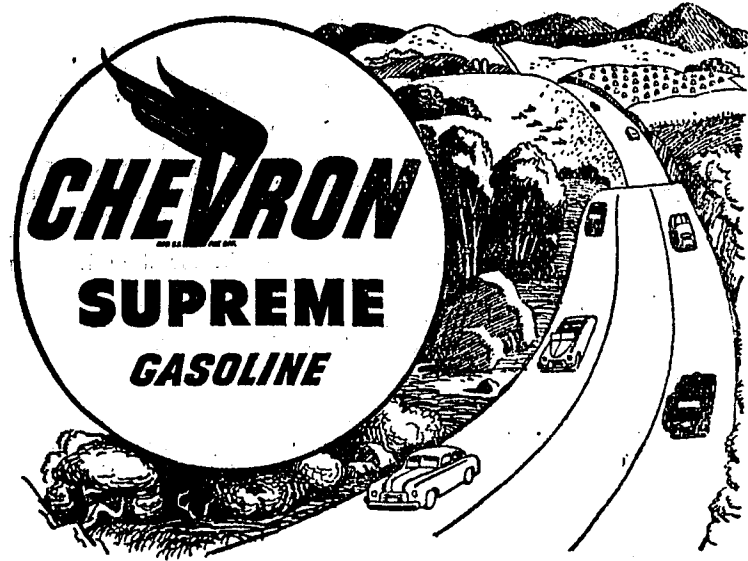

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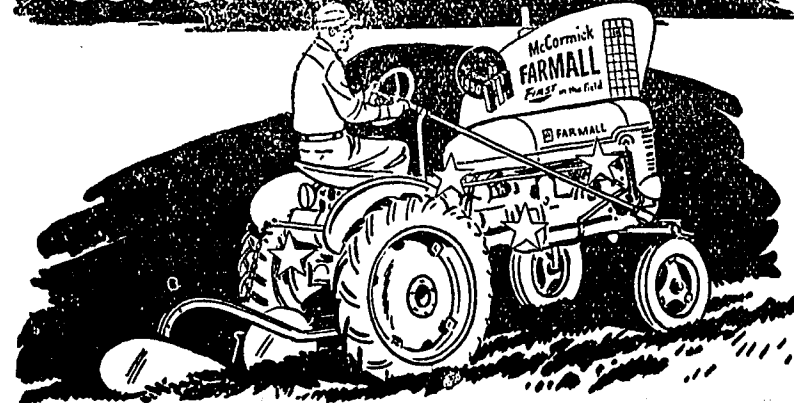
