CONTRACT FOR THE RE-BUILDING OF BRADY GULCH

Low bids totaling \$40,611.50 were received by the state highway department at Boise Friday on two highway jobs in the north central Idaho district, the Associated Press reports. Nearly half a million dollars worth of bids were received on highway work in seven counties. All were below engineers' estimates.

Wilson & Dodge of Mountain Home submitted low bid of \$31,742.50 for reconditioning flood damage on 2,993 miles of the Brady Gulch section of the Troy-Kendrick road (adjoining Kendrick) in Latah county. Engineer's estimate was \$33,230.00.

Low bid for cleaning channel and placing rip-rap on the banks of Lapwai creek adjacent to 3.314 miles of the North & South highway between Jacques Spur and Sweetwater in Nez Perce county was submitted by Karl Woodall, Mountain Home, on a bid of \$8,869. The engineer's estimate was \$12,950.00.

J. J. McCreedy, district highway engineer, said Friday night that the successful bidders have two weeks to start operations. He said they would probably begin at once.

The Brady Gulch job includes moving the road into the hillside in two or three places where the bed was severely damaged by floods. — Lewiston Tribune.

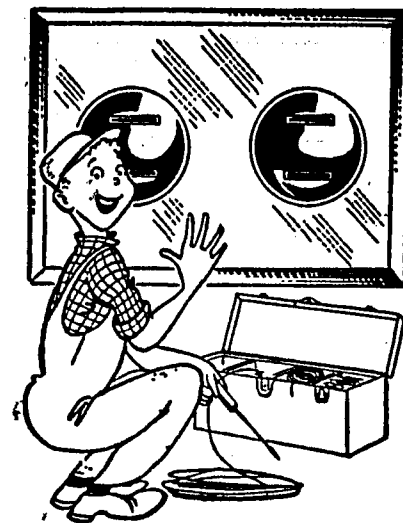

Vote Judicial Ballot Carefully

In 1933 the Legislature provided for a separate ballot, non-partisan in nature, for the election of Judges. The law provides that any candidate receiving a majority of the votes cast at the primary election is elected. In the event that none receives a majority, a number of candidates equal to twice those to be elected are again voted on at the general election.

The Clearwater Bar Association, comprising lawyers of the Counties of Clearwater, Idaho, Latah, Lewis and Nez Perce, are attempting by a campaign of publicity to bring to the attention of the voters the non-partisan selection of judicial officers. It has been a common experience of many election officials that the judicial ballot received by the voter very frequently is ignored and the ballots found on the floor of the voting booth.

Says the Clearwater Bar Association: "There are no contests for District Judge in the Second and Tenth Districts. There are seven candidates for the two positions on the Supreme Court. Some of the candidates are much better qualified than others, and the attention of the voters should be directed towards the importance of selecting the best qualified individuals as our Supreme Court Justices."

"The Bar of the State have at various times urged the appointment and election of judges from different sections of the state so that the court would have the benefit of judges experienced in the different type of problems resulting from the diversity of occupations of different sections of the state. There is now one judge from the north, one from the southeast, one from the southcentral, and until the resignation of Judge Holden, there was another from the southeast portion of the state."

In selecting candidates for the various political offices, there is always plenty of discussion, and the average voter generally has his mind made up for whom to cast his ballot before entering the polls. It should be the same with the Judicial candidates. They are even more important at the Primary poll.

Food Supplies Plentiful

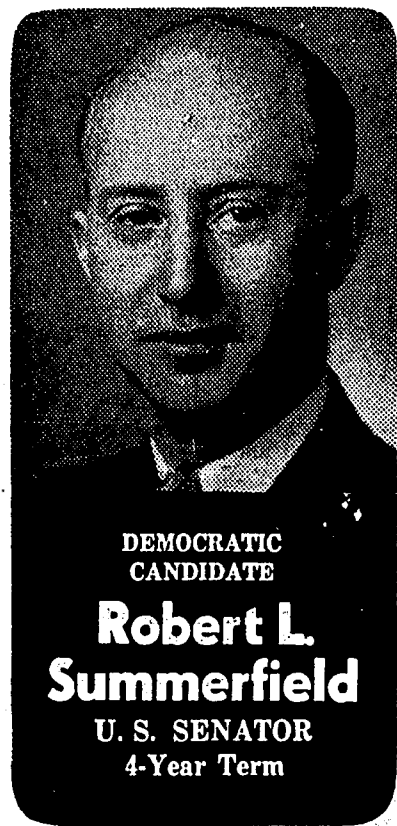
A prediction that the general agricultural picture will be less affected by the Korean situation than some other lines of activity was made this week by economists of the University of Idaho extension service. Prices of most farm products will go up, but farm price increases will probably be smaller than for types of goods the farmer buys. In a summary for "Economic Facts," a digest of conditions for Idaho farmers, Robert Wilcox and Virgil Kennedy said "the squeeze on net farm income is expected to stay with us."

"The farm outlook is completely changed by the war in Korea," they said. "With regard to supplies for now our agricultural surpluses that seemed such a burden look like valuable stockpiles. Agriculture will share in the boom, but probably not as much as some other industries."

With reference to Idaho crop production, the economists said the potato yield was forecast at 37,500,000 bushels, eight percent larger than last year. Sugar beets are expected to yield 1,335,000 tons, an increase of 25 percent over 1949. Dry peas, at 742,000 bags, are 20 percent under last year.

Total wheat production in Idaho this year is expected to be about five percent below last year's production. Winter wheat acreage dropped about 10 percent. Spring wheat acreage was unchanged. Stocks of wheat, corn and barley on Idaho farms July 1 were lower than on the same date a year ago. The carry-over of oats is greater, but below the 10-year average.

The summary predicted higher prices for all soft fruits because of small crops. Peaches are very short, and apricots in Idaho and several other states were a near failure because of weather. Apples are expected to be about average.
