"It has been a pleasure for us to receive the Gazette as a weekly visitor and bringing us the news from the far West, and it has been good news all the year through.

"Noticed from your paper that you had real hot days out west. Here in Iowa we have had the coolest summer ever, so that we had to even heat our homes. Such was yesterday, the 14th of August.

"The oats crop was very good here, as the weather was indeed favorable for the grain fields. On the other hand it has not been so good for the corn. The farmers have a wonderful stand of corn, but it is simply too cool for it to make real headway and the danger exists that we might even have an early frost. Of course as our farmers mostly feed all their corn, it would not be such a great loss, even if the corn did not fully mature.

"Read in the Gazette that the first wheat had been hauled to the elevator, but the yield per acre was not mentioned. Looking forward to that report in next week's paper."

Our Note: Greatest yield of which we have heard was a field of Elgin wheat on the Harley Eichner farm on American ridge, which made 70 bushels per acre. Local warehousemen report that hundreds of acres in this territory are going better than 50 bushels per acre, and 60 is not uncommon.

## SHORT NEWS ITEMS FROM OUR LOCAL SCHOOLHOUSE

### School May Be Held At Leland

A group of parents from Leland met with the School Board Wednesday evening and discussed the possibility of having school at Leland this coming term. The board had previously decided that due to the fact that a large number who had attended Leland the past two years wished to go to Juliaetta that it would not be practical or feasible to hold a one-teacher school there this year due to the expense involved. However, due to the keen interest expressed that school be maintained it was decided that a compromise plan be adopted providing a teacher can be secured.

If a teacher can be employed Grades One through Five will be maintained similar to the Gold Hill set-up. The bus routes will remain as set up earlier in the summer, which provides for ten routes rather than 11 and a new bus would not need to be purchased, as would be the case if another route existed.

Every effort is being exerted to find a suitable teacher to fill this vacancy and it is hoped that one will be available before the opening of school.

### High School Schedule

A tentative schedule is listed below for the High School, which is subject to change, but which may serve as a guide to help students plan their courses before they register. Required subjects for graduation are:

(a) Four years of English (speech or Vocabulary Building could substitute for one year).

(b) Two years of Science.

(c) Two years of Mathematics.

(d) Two years of Social Science, including American History and American Government.

(e) One year of Health.

Special attention has been given to Band and Chorus classes so that students desiring these classes will not encounter conflicts with required subjects.

More classes will be offered this year than before, and greater choice may be had, but as a result it follows that more conflicts may occur, so it may be impossible for students to get in all classes they desire, due to the said conflicts. We feel, however, that all students can get in their required subjects and enough electives to round out a creditable course.

Arithmetic (Optional to all Seniors. Required only for those Seniors who failed Algebra or Geometry).

Band — Optional.

World History — Optional.

Physics — Optional.

Bookkeeping — Optional.

Public Speaking — Optional.

2nd Period:

English III — Required.

Health — Required.

Geometry — Required.

American History — Required.

3rd Period:

Shorthand (Seniors) — Optional.

Art — Optional.

Typing I (Freshmen) Optional.

Chemistry — Optional.

Girls' Chorus M. W. F. — Optional.

Girls' P. E. T-Th. — Optional.

4th Period:

American Government — Required.

Biology — Optional.

Typing II (Seniors) — Optional.

English IV (Seniors) — Required.

English I (Fresh) — Required.

5th Period:

Advanced Math (Juniors and Seniors) — Optional.

General Science — Required.

Typing I (Juniors) — Optional.

English II (Sophs) — Required.

6th Period:

Home Economics.

Boys' Physical Education.

It should be noted that Biology is primarily for Sophomores; Chemistry for Juniors and Physics for Seniors. It is hoped that largely these classes will be thus composed.

However, some leeway will be granted so satisfactory schedules can be arranged. At least one of these subjects is required along with General Science to complete the Science requirement. Many students will take more than two Sciences and some will take all the science offered.

It will be noted that Algebra will not be offered Freshmen this year, but if desired, they may take typing in its place. They will have algebra next year.

A class is Advanced Mathematics is being offered and several Juniors and Seniors should make that a "must" as it is required by some schools and colleges of higher learning, and some students will definitely need it later.

Home Economics may be taken by any girl who does not have credit in that course.

At least 10 students should register in a class before we feel justified in holding the class, unless, possibly, it be Advanced Mathematics or Shorthand.
