### EIGHTEEN ATTEND COMMERCIAL CLUB WEDNESDAY

Eighteen interested business men and farmers attended the regular monthly meeting of the Kendrick Commercial Club Wednesday evening following the 6:30 dinner at White's Confectionery.

Tom Long, reporting for the Highway Committee, stated that the Brady Gulch road work was making slow progress, but that the improvement would be a big one when the project was completed.

Mr. Long added that the Kendrick Highway District had purchased 1,300 tons of crushed rock from the crusher below Juliaetta, and was busy getting all roads in shape for winter travel.

The Education Committee report was made by Gerald Ingle, who said that school was running smoothly, and that all bus routes seemed to be meeting schedules nicely.

W. L. McCreary, reporting for the Publicity Committee, stated that his committee was now engaged in the promotion of the Annual Sales Day.

For the Agricultural Committee, Gerald Ingle said that the Latah County Fair grounds at Moscow were proving too small, and a search was now underway for a more suitable location — possibly on a portion of the county farm. He added that fall work conditions were excellent and farm work making good progress.

Reporting for the Civic Improvement Committee Geo. F. Brock mentioned the newly oiled Kendrick streets. He added that the Lewis Sawmill was now shut down making a change-over from diesel to electric power, and that two new street lights were being put in by the W. W. P. Co. for the village — one on the street near the depot, the other on the school house hill near the Westendahl and Galloway homes.

A Fish and Game report was made by W. L. McCreary, who stated that bird hunting prospects were the poorest in years — due to the loss of the spring hatch in heavy rains, and the depredations of coon.

Adding to the report Frank Abrams stated that he had been informed the trash fish in Atwater Lake were to be poisoned, and then it would be planted to trout or bass.

Reporting for the Boy Scout Committee, Henry Jones said that he was just getting started with the troop, but that interest appeared high and attendance was increasing. However, school night activities were interfering somewhat with regular meetings.

For the Fire Committee Dick Cuddy stated that regular drill was being held and a steady improvement noted in the length of time taken to be at the fire station and ready to answer an alarm. Efficiency in the handling of equipment was also noted.

Adding to the fire report, Henry Jones, district deputy fire warden — stated that this area had been extremely lucky, despite a dangerous fire season — with only 14 fires reported. He thinks much of this is due to the fire prevention campaigns put on by various organizations — which has greatly increased the public awareness of danger. He went on to say that an assessment of 3c per acre is now being made on timber land to further fire protection.

A. O. Kanikkeberg then brought up the matter of the local playing field — now the school district property of the village and school district — stating that it was badly in need of a turf or sod surface. He suggested that a fill of about 4 inches of clay, topped with 4 inches of black dirt be used, and then seeded. He added that fencing was also needed, as some car drivers apparently thought the field a wonderful "playground" on which to circle. After some discussion, H. C. Schupfer, president, appointed Ross Armitage and Frank Abrams as a committee, they to pick a third, and then gather figures on the cost of the necessary clay and dirt, and fencing — then report back to the club, or to solicit donors as they saw fit.

Reporting for the Merchant's Committee Tom Keene stated that the date was too late for Flower and Agricultural displays, and instead all area 4-H Clubs were being asked to display their work and projects — believing that this would prove of greater interest to all than the type of display previously used. Tom added that nearly every business house was planning a Special of some sort for October 21 — Sales Day — and that, combined with the free show, auction, football game and dance, there should be something for everyone all day long.

Mr. Michaelson of the Lewis-Clark Council, Boy Scouts of America, was then introduced. He gave a talk outlining the Scout work, and their needs. He said that in this Council or district were 2,000 Scouts, and that the cost of maintaining the office in Lewiston was \$26,000 per year. He suggested a finance drive locally. The chair then appointed the Commercial Club Finance committee, Jack Travis and Ed. Nelson, who were asked to pick and third member, and conduct such a drive.

Mr. Michaelson reported on the Boy Scout Council Swimming meet held at Kendrick this past summer, and told how much the boys had enjoyed it.

### Wonderful Indian Summer

The regular monthly meeting of the Joint District P-T-A was held Monday evening of this week at Juliaetta, with 59 members present. Mrs. Gerald Ingle, president, presided.

Business of the evening was taken up by calling for committee reports: A report was given by Manning Onstott and Ross Armitage on the activities and accomplishments of the local Club Scouts.

A report was received from the Boy Scout committee, the new Scoutmaster, Henry Jones, reporting that he would be working as Scoutmaster during the winter months, following the resignation of Jud Lee.

Mr. Mabbutt, reporting from Juliaetta, stated that they had 16 in their troop, and it appeared to be a successful group.

Mrs. Abrams, reporting on the Girl Scout Troop, and told of their need for financial aid.

Mrs. Elmo Eldridge reported on the completion of the P-T-A. A canning project, stating that 275 chickens and 1,704 quarts of fruit and vegetables had been processed for the coming term.

Asa Calvert reported for the By-Laws committee, reading those prepared for the local organization — and they met approval.

Mrs. Robert Magnuson reported on the Fair booth prepared by this P-T-A, stating that it had won a second prize and received \$12.50 as an award.

A discussion was then opened on proposed projects for the coming winter. After due discussion it was decided that 50 percent of the money raised would go to playground turf at Kendrick — and 50 percent for playground equipment at Southwick and curtains for the Juliaetta school.

Everyone was asked, as P-T-A members to support the Cub Scouts, Girl Scouts and Boy Scout activities, and the football team, on Sales Day.

Mr. Nutting reported that the American Red Cross First Aid, Beginners Standard and Home Nursing Classes would be started soon, and all civilians are asked to have their blood "typed" because of the danger of war at home.

Asa Clavert invited everyone to hear the program by the 4th grade next Friday afternoon at 2:30. Each room at Juliaetta is to have a program one month of the year.

Mrs. Joyce Brammer had charge of the program: "His School and Education."

In line with the above topic Mrs. Eleanor Hammond gave a talk on the courses she has taken at N. I. C. E., and how she applies that learning in her class room.

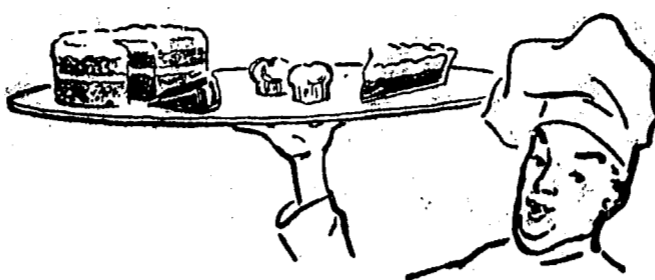

**To Teach Russian**

U. of I., Moscow — A former U. S. army intelligence agent will teach Russian at the University of Idaho this term. Joseph Zelenak, 34, of Scranton, Pa., was appointed an instructor last month by J. E. Buchanan.

"In peace or war, we feel it is vitally important for more Americans to know the Russian language, as we are at a distinct disadvantage without this knowledge," said President Buchanan. "Russian was introduced at the university in World War II when the Soviet Union was our ally. We plan to give the language more emphasis under the altered circumstances. In World War I we burned German language books, then had to scurry for interpreters. With World War III a possibility, we are finding more effective use for Russian language books than bonfire fuel."

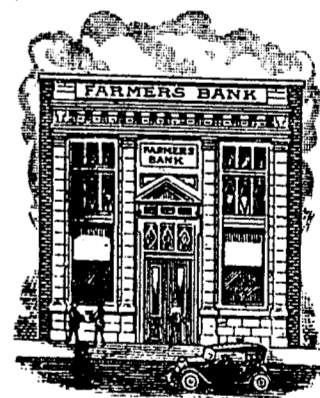

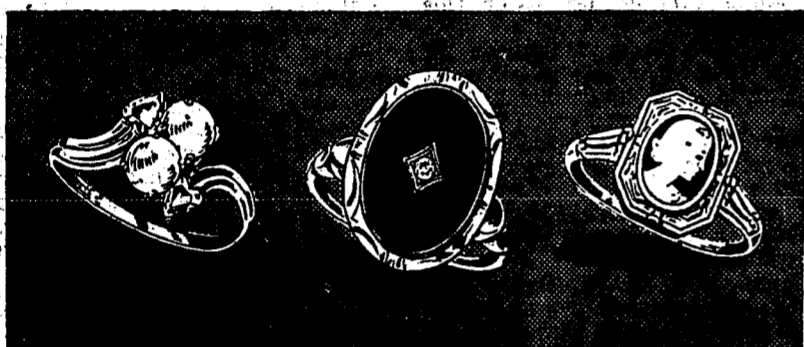

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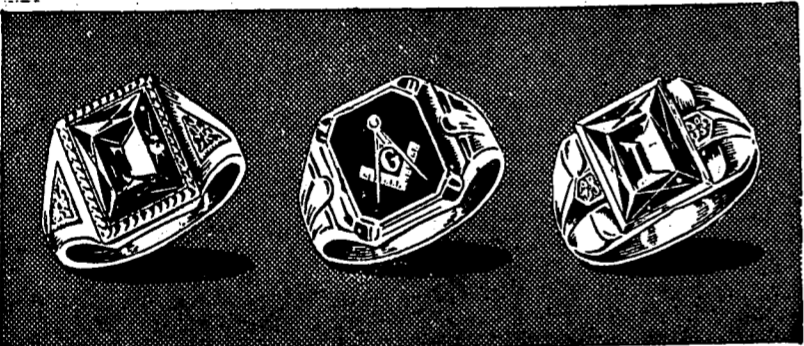

**4-H Clubs Receive Support**

Chicago (Special) — Ten years ago only a handful of industrial concerns were supporting 4-H Club work nationally. Today — through the National Committee on Boys' and Girls' Club Work — nearly 50 industries, businessmen and women, are backing up their faith in two million 4-H Club members with incentives valued at \$400,000 annually. This amount is distributed for awards and leader training funds in 4-H programs which range from canning to tractor maintenance.

"The money is considered a sound investment in the nation's future by encouraging these rural boys and girls who have pledged their head, heart, hands and health to make the best better," declared Guy L. Noble, director of the National 4-H Committee, a non-profit citizen's group. "4-H youth learn by doing," he stated, "and guiding their efforts are 225,000 volunteer club leaders who work under the direction of the Extension Service of the state agricultural colleges to carry out 4-H program objectives."

The teen-agers do a man-sized job in their projects, according to Noble, and by the time they reach 21 many are well on the way to becoming independent farmers, while others have substantial bank accounts.

**Now "Flying Fish"**

Aerial transportation of eyed fish eggs from spawn station to rearing hatcheries has been completed for the 1950 season, according to a report of operations submitted by Joe Monaghan, pilot, to the Idaho fish and game department.

Monaghan reported moving 10,620,876 eggs during the period April 28 to July 15. They were carried in refrigerated cases and the usual load was 250,000 eggs. Monaghan reported 1,000,000 eggs moved to the Whiskey creek hatchery near Grace in one day's operation.

Hatchery superintendent report the eggs received were in excellent condition after the short time aloft. Rapid transit and freedom from jarring has resulted in improved survival, the hatcherymen said.

Approximately 7,000,000 were cut-throat eggs and 3,000,000 rainbow. Longest trips were north to the Mullan hatchery near Wallace, and Sandpoint and Clark Fork hatcheries on Pend Oreille lake. Twelve hatcheries were supplied during the aerial operations.

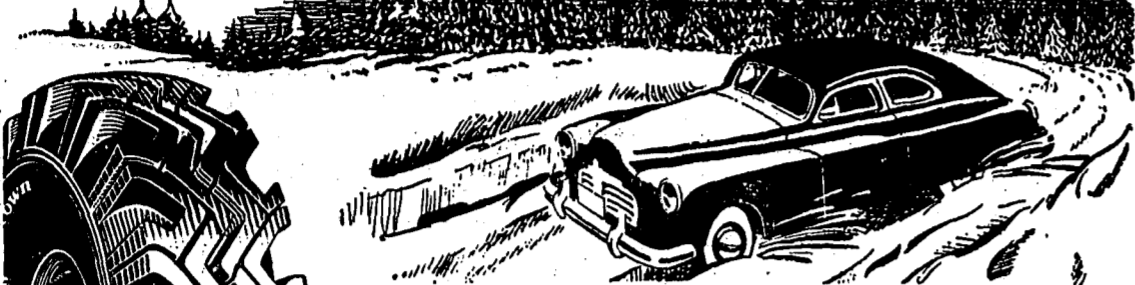

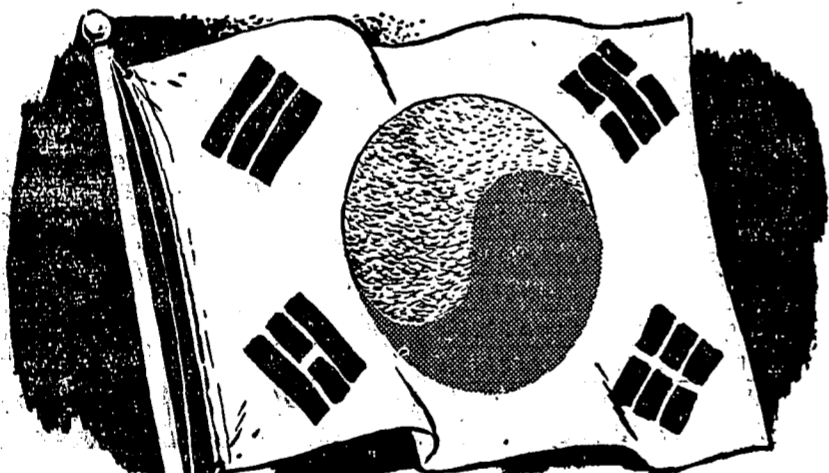

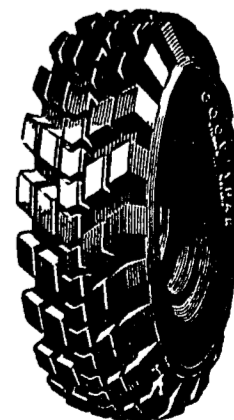
