**Watch For Moths**

Winter provides no immunity against the common clothes moth in its attacks on woolen garments and costly rugs, furs and upholstery.

"Letting the guard down on moths or other household insects during the colder months is unwise," says H. C. Manis, entomologist at the university of Idaho. "When the moth larva finds warm quarters inside the folds of an inviting mohair chair or in the nap of the living room rug, damage results regardless of the outside temperature."

The cause of all this household misery is the larva of a tiny yellow moth about a quarter of an inch long. Clothes moths lay their eggs on substances which will later be used as food by the larvae. These offspring cause an estimated \$500,000 damage annually. Clothes moth larvae are somewhat less than a quarter inch long with creamy white bodies and brown heads. Only the larvae cause damage.

Spraying the closets, baseboards, drawers, upholstered furniture, rugs and hard-to-get-at corners with a deodorized insecticide containing either 5 percent DDT or chlordane once or twice a year is more than half the battle of control.

The finishing touches come by lightly dusting furs and other susceptible clothing in storage. Liberal dusting under the carpet on top and pad is another. Running a vacuum cleaner over the rug pulls some of the powder up through the nap, offering still further protection.

**Troy and Genesee Unhappy**  
Basketball is warming up early in the season with Troy showing some resentment over reports of games, and undoubtedly rightfully intended and accepted. The question is, "What shall Genesee do?" Most local sports enthusiasts have one answer, and that is to toss Genesee back into the Valley conference where it has played almost since the year one, and until some of the big-wigs of basketball in the Second District decided to switch the Bulldogs into the White Pine circuit. Genesee has been playing its B team against several of the White Pine A teams. This year the local boys have lost two games, and their losses go into conference standings as games lost by Genesee. Wins and losses, however, have no bearing on the final outcome, as the champion is decided at a sub-district playoff with all of the teams participating. Genesee has been affected financially since it was moved into the White Pine league. The old-time Valley league rivalry is missing and so are the cash customers, who are necessary to keep the athletic coffers supplied with funds. If a coach plays his second string against another school's first team there is complaint, both from the opposing school and from sports fans, and if he plays his first string and wins by large scores, cash customers seem to stay away in droves, although it takes a winning club to bring the best in a fan to the surface.

Troy News Editorial — The Troy News comments editorially as follows:  
"It's funny how whenever the Trojans whip Genesee, the Idahoan sports writer says it is the Genesee

"B" squad, but when Genesee wins we don't hear anything about the "B" part of it. In last night's Idahoan is a story about the game last Tuesday between Troy and the "Genesee B" team.

"The same thing happened last year when Troy beat Genesee in a conference game. It was claimed that Genesee was playing its B squad. Then at tournament time the Idahoan credited Genesee with being undefeated.

"Surely any sports writer should know that a conference loss cannot be cancelled out by claiming use of a B squad. It must be concluded then, that the publicity was an intentional attempt at deception. Furthermore, since it was not corrected, it must be concluded that Genesee condoned the statement.

No distinction is officially recognized between A, B or C players. Any team which represents a school in league play is that school's team and if the coach uses too many B squad members and his team loses, it is a loss on the official scoreboard.

"If the Genesee team isn't playing conference basketball in the White Pine sub-district, it should not be permitted to play in the White Pine tournament, nor should it be host to the tournament." — Genesee News, Dec. 15, 1950.

Our comment: Yes, Genesee, used to be in the Valley conference. We suggest local fans thumb the leaves of their memory just a bit. They will come up with the answer.

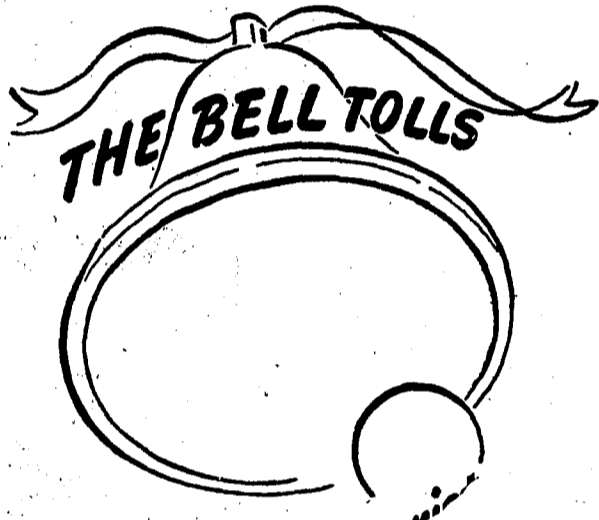

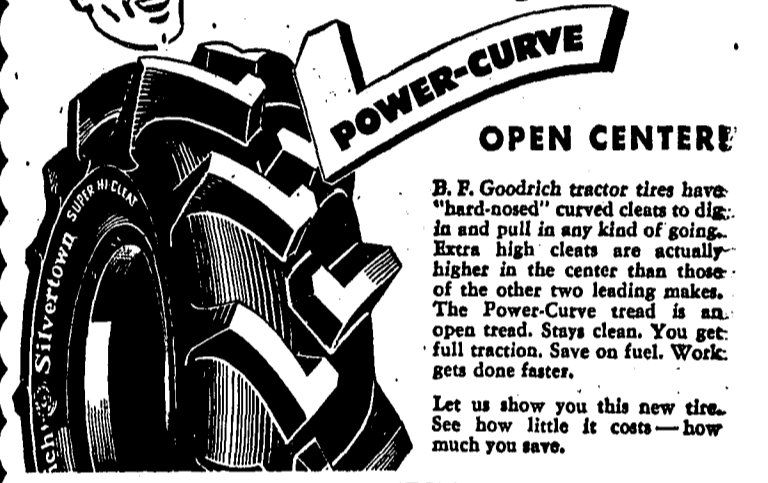

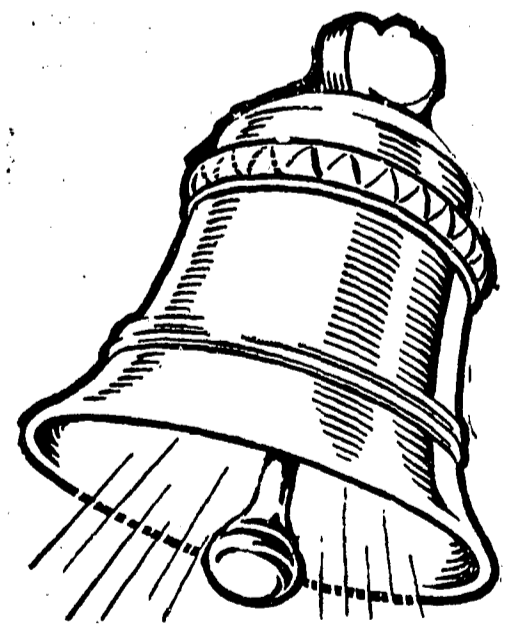

**Visual Training Important**

Present day educators generally agree about audio-visual training. If you want to teach about cows, they say, it is only logical to bring the cow into the classroom. The navy goes along with this line of reasoning but is faced with problems of even greater magnitude than coaxing Bossie into the classroom.

Navy midshipmen at the University of Idaho ROTC unit must learn the elements of effective anti-aircraft fire. A maze of projecting and electronic equipment supplies the answer.

Installed at the university is an anti-aircraft gunnery trainer that will put any known shooting gallery to shame. The trainer projects to a motion picture screen a battle scene consisting of wave after wave of "enemy" fighters attacking a navy patrol bomber on a combat mission. The angle of photography is such that the man behind the "gun" faces the same situation as an aircraft gunner protecting his plane from heavy fighter attack. In the background he hears the characteristic drone of planes, and when he presses his trigger, the reassuring heavy rhythm of machine guns.

One thing is lacking. No matter how good the student gunner is, the enemy fighter always comes through unscathed to appear on the screen again a few seconds later. But there is a compensatory feature. For every shot that "hits", a bell rings and an automatic counter makes a record of the gunner's progress.

Capt. C. A. Chappell, U. S. N., professor of naval science at the university, points out that this type of synthetic trainer has come into wide use in the military service as the practical answer to inexpensive, yet effective, anti-aircraft gunnery training.

Midshipmen, at the navy unit, on first seeing what appears to be a product from an elegant penny arcade, seem surprised that there's no place in which to put a nickel.

**Study Under \$1200 Fellowships**  
U. of I., Moscow — Big game studies predominate in the 1950-51 research schedule of the new group of graduate students in wildlife management at the University of Idaho, reports Dr. Paul D. Dalke, leader of the Idaho cooperative wildlife research unit.

Five of the eight graduate students will carry on their research under fellowships of \$1,200 a year awarded by the wildlife research unit, which is financed by the Idaho fish and game department, the federal fish and wildlife service, the wildlife management institute, and the University of Idaho.

Two elk studies are on schedule. Leonard W. Hoskins of Wendell, a University of Idaho graduate, will do his research on the elk winter range south of Pocatello. Clay Y. McCulloch, who comes from Colorado A & M college, will study the elk herd in the Selway primitive area of northern Idaho.

White tail deer studies will be carried on by Phillip O. Dickenson, of Oregon State college, and James W. Peak, a university of Texas graduate. Peak will study winter survival in the Coeur d'Alene national forest. Dickenson's project will be in the 500-acre deer enclosure on the university forest near Moscow, and adjacent territory.

Paul E. Steels, who comes from the University of Minnesota, will continue waterfowl studies at Gray's lake in eastern Idaho. Edwin B. Caswell, university of Massachusetts, will carry on his research either in game birds of furbearers. Robert A. McHugh, who comes from John Hopkins university, will look into the beaver-trout relationship in Idaho streams. A fisheries project has been selected by David L. Wilder, University of Missouri.

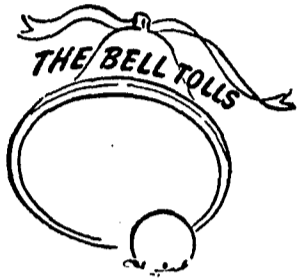
**Gulch Road Now Complete**

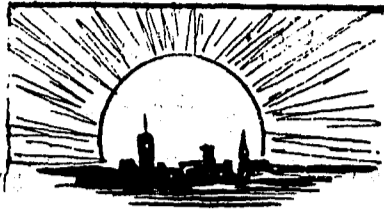

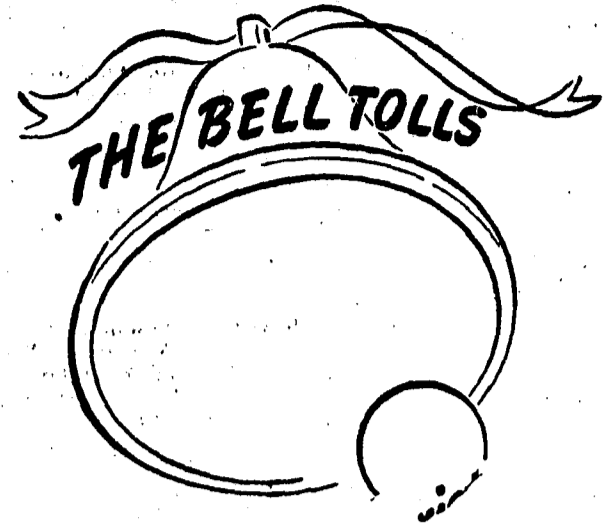

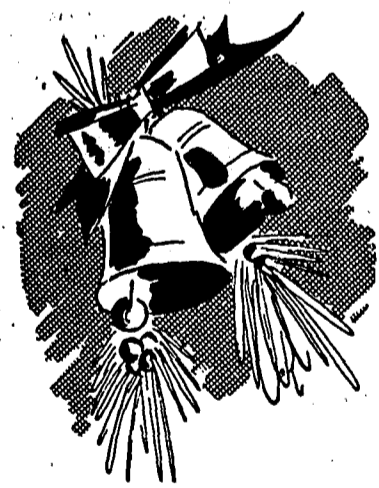
