Wonderful Winter Weather
This section of the Potlatch could not ask for finer winter weather than has been our lot to date. Of

course we have had light snow falls, hail, rain, sleet and fog, as well as brilliant sunshine — but the snow has never remained longer than a few hours — and the temperature has only been below freezing a couple of times to date.

Tuesday, rain began falling in torrents in the canyon, and a wet snow carpeted the ground to the depth of about three inches on the ridges — and for the second time this year the state snow plow was called into action.

License Sales Up

Idaho residents purchased 3,938 more licenses during 1950 than during the previous year, the Idaho Fish and Game department reports.

Resident fish licenses showed the greatest gain in sales, with 2,626 more purchased than in 1949, while resident combination license sales showed a decrease of 688.

During 1950, 34,377 resident game licenses were issued, an increase over the previous year of 2,000.

Non-resident sales were also up for the year, with an increase of 1,667 over the 1949 sales figures; tourist five-day fishing licenses made the greatest gain with 1,259 over the 1949 figure. However, non-resident license sales showed a decrease of 82 in big game; 194 in bird, and 5 in trophy from last year's total.

License clerk Fay Whitson noted that deer and elk tag sales reached a high with 11,770 more sold during the year than for the 1949 hunting seasons. Deer tag sales reached 71,251, an increase of 8,777, while elk tag sales were 26,786, an increase of 2,983 over 1949.

Refreshments were served in the banquet room following the close of the business session.

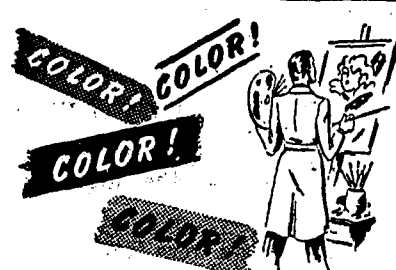
