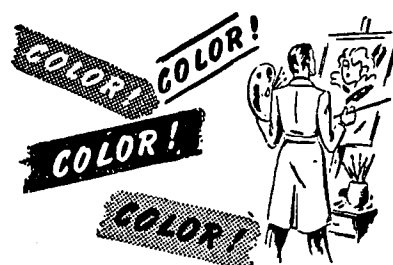
### Farms Fewer In Number

A report by the bureau of the census shows there are 40,253 farms in Idaho. In 1945 there were 41,520. Canyon county has the largest number, 3,987.

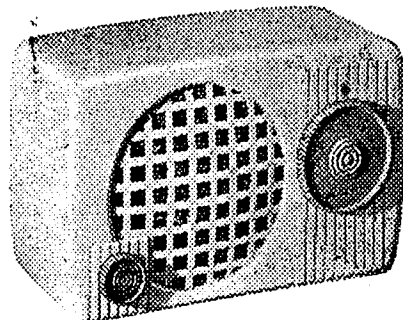
