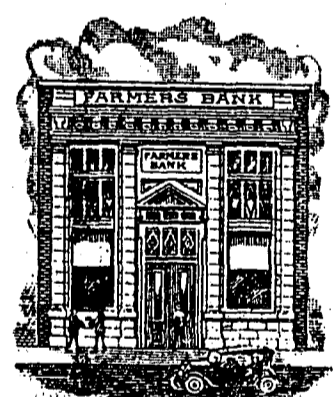

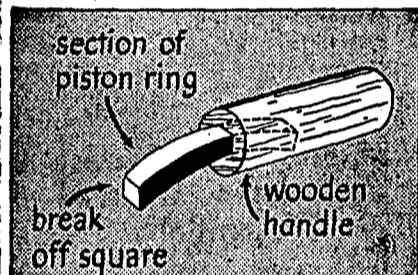
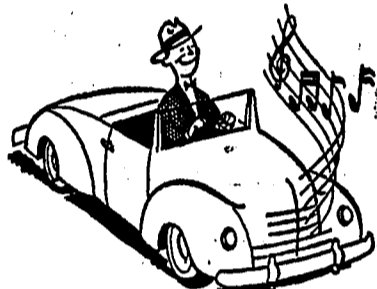

U. of I. Scholarship Gifts

Various new scholarships were among gifts to the University of Idaho formally accepted this week by the board of regents. Mrs. Amos H. Eckert of Boise, president of the Idaho Cow Belles, women's auxiliary of the Idaho Cattlemen's association, presented \$100 on behalf of her organization to be given to a worthy student in animal husbandry.

The St. Maries Lumber company provided tuition scholarships totaling \$136 for Dean Morris and Earl Gleason of St. Maries at the university's summer music camp. Encyclopedia Britannica Films of Wilmette, Ill., awarded visual aids study scholarships of \$32 each for three summer school students. They are Mrs. Alys B. McCadden, Cambridge; Mrs. Ellen R. H. Herminhaus, Payette, and Mrs. Ila Belle Mercer, Moscow.

An additional scholarship by the Idaho State Federation of Women's Clubs was awarded to Tomas Tomason, foreign student from Iceland.

To encourage scholarship among members of the local chapter of Sigma Chi Fraternity, \$500 was provided anonymously for an award fund to be administered by the university. The Bunker Hill and Sullivan Mining and Concentrating Company of Kellogg donated an electron microscope for use in scientific research. To support further study on the effect of hail damage to potatoes, the Western Hail and Adjustment association of Chicago provided \$400.

Two recent speakers at the university donated their honorariums. They were Jack O'Connor, Lewiston author, whose honorarium goes into the University Scholarship Endowment fund, and Gordon E. Reckford, secretary to the Economic Cooperative administration, Washington, D. C., whose honorarium will be added to the Borah foundation.

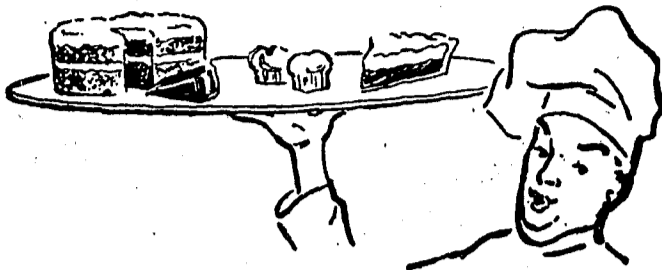
Keep Canning Waste Down

With short crops and high prices almost a certainty for fruits this season, Idaho home makers must make every effort to see that their canning is top grade and that waste is kept to a minimum, says Miss Mildred Haberly, extension nutritionist for the university.

"This is a mighty fine time for us

all to be sure that the fruit we put up this summer is going to be good food next winter," the nutritionist said. "Surely it is not time to take the chances of food spoilage that we take when we use open kettle canning or try to do it in the oven." Miss Haberly stressed again the value of the hot water bath method of canning and the need for following the best directions carefully to save all food. Pre-cooking before the fruits go into the hot water bath, careful adherence to good canning directions, and high quality foods for canning were the three points that she stressed as "musts" for good canned foods.

Reddy Kilowatt Salutes The Man Who Saved 100 Lives

Twenty years ago, one of the unsung heroes of the electric industry perfected a method of artificial respiration that has saved the lives of over 100 linemen who came in contact with high voltage wires.

HEAVY TOURIST TRAVEL IN NORTHWEST THIS YEAR

As predicted by travel authorities, and as worked for by the Pacific Northwest Travel Association through its participation in travel shows and travel editor tours, the Pacific Northwest is getting heavy tourist trade this summer. The PNWA is supported by the Spokane and other Chambers of Commerce of the northwest.

"Everybody is getting into the record-breaking act—even the tourists," says the Bureau of Reclamation at Hungry Horse Dam, one of the northwest's newer travel magnets.

Bureau figures show that the 1951 visitor count to July 5 at Hungry Horse had passed the 77,000 mark, an increase of 53 per cent over the record of 50,200 set during the same period of 1950.

A total of 43,200 persons made the trip to the Hungry Horse dam vista point on the July 4th holiday, and other Chambers of Commerce tourists will visit the dam this year as compared with the record of 220,000 in 1950.

At Mt. Ranier, the story is the same.

"Record travel is being enjoyed at Mt. Ranier," reports John C. Preston, Park Superintendent. "During the month of June, 120,450 people in 33,721 cars visited the park, the greatest month on record. The previous high of 81,984 visitors was recorded for June, 1934.

"This brings the travel year total to 287,662 people through June 30. For the corresponding period during the 1950 travel year, only 126,589 people had visited the park. This is an increase of 111 per cent. Records of other national parks in the west also indicate that travel trends are upward."

This upward trend is confirmed by the report from Yellowstone Park through June 30 where by the end of June 216,134 visitors had been recorded for the month as against 193,339 for June, 1950—an increase of 11.79 per cent. Including the pre-season travel to Yellowstone with the June totals, the increase is shown to be 12.01 per cent over 1950.

Hot Weather Hints

"A sensible summertime diet is the most important aspect of healthful hot-weather living," according to Miss Viola Fisher, State Health Department nutritionist. "The human body takes a lot of summertime punishment because we fail to realize the importance of eating proper hot-weather foods."

"In warm weather we wear lighter clothing and we should also eat lighter food," Miss Fisher said, pointing out that fats and starches should be held to a minimum in the summer.

"Green vegetables and fresh fruits should be washed several times, but never soaked for any length of time before eating. The vegetables, eaten raw or cooked only until they are tender, provide an excellent source of vitamins and minerals. Fresh vegetables eaten now will help build up a vitamin A reserve to offset winter cold," according to Miss Fisher.

"Cool, pasteurized grade A milk is an excellent item for the summer daily diet, but leave heavily iced drinks alone," Miss Fisher warned. She said they hinder digestion and are sometimes responsible for stomach cramps.

"Particular care should be taken in storing foods, for during hot weather some foods spoil quickly, especially custards and meats. Meat should be kept frozen," she said. She cautioned against leaving milk stand on the doorstep as some of its food value will be destroyed by sunlight.

Cuts Arm In Woods

Parker McCreary received a deep gash on his right arm below the elbow Monday afternoon while working in the woods for Whittum.

The accident occurred when a choker with which he was working slipped, slashing his arm. He was brought to town and Dr. Christensen dressed the wound. Several stitches were taken.

July 22-28 Farm Safety Week

BOISE—Governor Len Jordan today proclaimed the week of July 22 to July 28 as Idaho Farm Safety Week. Governor Jordan pointed out that health and safety of the rural population are vital to the prosperity of the state and said that constant practice of safety is the surest method of reducing the toll of accidents that annually cause great human suffering and loss of farm production.

Idaho is joining with the nation in observing the last week in July as a special period for attention to safety.

"I urge farmers to observe this week," the Governor said, "as the occasion for a thorough examination of their premises and operating habits to the end that hazards will be removed and that safety first will be a basic commandment throughout the year."

Owen K. Brown, agricultural engineer of the University of Idaho extension service, and state chairman of farm safety activities, said that the slogan for the week would be "Remove a Hazard—Save a Life."

"This is a real opportunity," Brown said, "to reduce the toll of lives, suffering and expense caused by needless accidents. The effectiveness of the campaign will depend upon the cooperation it receives. It deserves the support of every individual interested in his own welfare and the progress of agriculture."
