RAISING "THANKSGIVING DINNERS" IS NO CINCH

Mr. and Mrs. Raleigh Albright, at their turkey farm below Juliaetta, will tell you that playing nursemaid to 2,000 turkeys is no picnic. When they are small they will stay around the feeding stations, but now, in the "adolescent stage" the wanderlust is strong in them. The Albrights have to keep a close watch as to train time so they can be on hand to herd them off the train tracks, for they are ever wandering there

after an elusive grasshopper. Then, when night comes and one could reasonably expect things to be quiet when they are off to bed such is not the case. For these birds are a scary lot and the least noise is apt to send them into a stampede in the middle of the night. So Mr. Albright sleeps with the big chicks and keeps a steady vigil "all through the night." For, should they stampede and start squaking, their fright is transmitted to the whole flock and some start flying into trees and buildings, often breaking a leg or wings. Another reason for watching them at night is to reduce

the loss by predatory animals.

Mrs. Albright tells us some varmint has been preying on the flocks, and only due to quick action on the part of Mr. Albright was the animal scared away, and dropped his stolen bird in his flight.

The government trapper was 'called in last week and traps were set, one in the sand, as signs pointed to a bob cat, but to date the trap has yielded: 1 .rabbit, 2 skunks, a magpie, 2 house cats and 1 coon.

Getting a flock of turkeys ready for the Thanksgiving table involves more than meets the eye. For, from the beginning, when the poults are shipped to the ranch, the battle begins — to keep them from killing each other by piling up in the brooders, and waging the fight against disease that ever attacks them is a job that takes skill, years of experience and lots of good old

But the Albrights are equipped to meet any emergency, for through the years, as they have operated this turkey ranch, they have accumu-lated a storehouse of knowledge and tricks that enable them to hurdle the usual pitfalls that beset turkey raisers new at the business.




