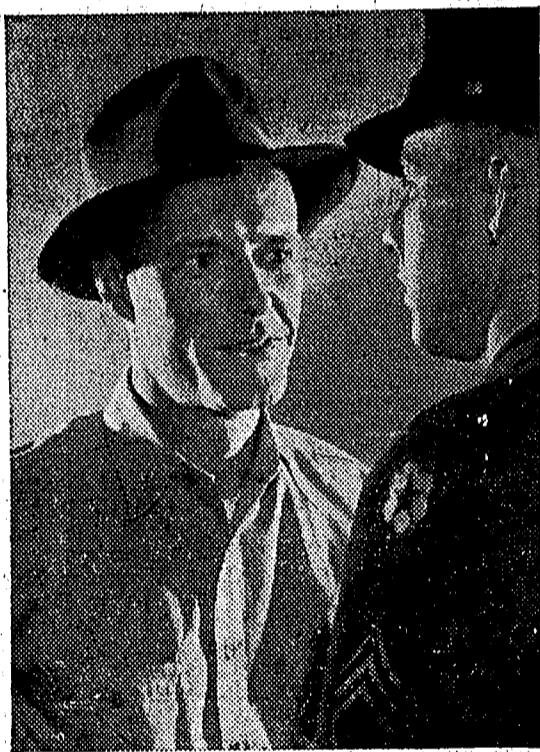

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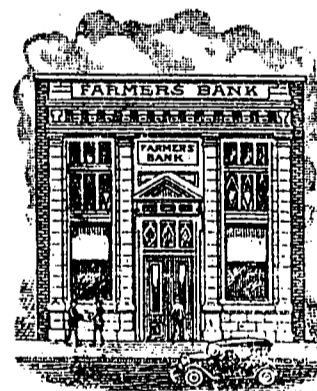

To Attend Cancer School
 Boise (Special) — A Kendrick physician will attend the sixth annual post-graduate cancer course at the University of Oregon Medical school this month under the continuing program of the Idaho division, American Cancer Society, to make every doctor's office a cancer-detecting center. He is Dr. D. A. Christensen. Dr. Christensen is one of a group of 29 Idaho physicians who will engage in the highly-concentrated, intensive post-graduate work at Portland, Ore., Sept. 24-28, inclusive, it was announced today by Dr. Raymond L. White of the Idaho division's executive committee.

The Idaho division and the State Department of Public Health are jointly sponsoring the program, paying travel costs and tuition expenses for the Gem state physicians. Dr. White said that the program is designed to help doctors to better serve the public in the fight against cancer. In the past five years, 141 Idaho physicians have been through similar post-graduate courses, and Dr. White said the latest group will bring the number of doctors taking the special work up to about 40 per cent of the state's medical population.

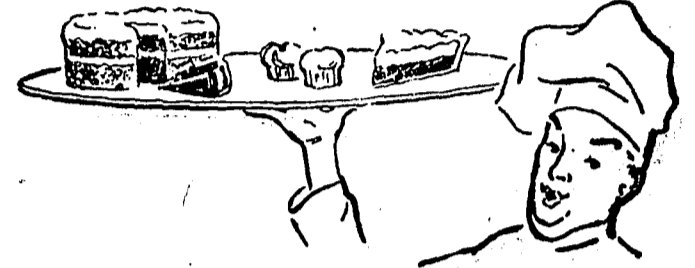

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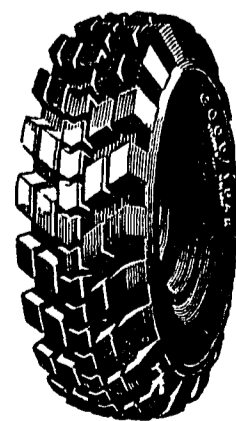


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
