**Improving Fish Hatchery**

The fish and game department announced today the completion of 32 new concrete raceways at the Mackay fish hatchery. The department stated, however, that the ponds will not be placed in full operation until 1952.

The new ponds, each 100x3 feet in extent, were approved and accepted on September 26 by department director T. B. Murray. Supplied by waters of Warm Springs creek, flowing 22 cubic feet per second, the new facilities include installation of 500 feet of 30-inch pipeline to handle inflow from the springs. The two concrete diversion dams, headgates and weirs, and 8,000 feet of irrigation canal also were constructed.

It is expected that productive capacity of the ponds, when put to maximum use next year, will be in the neighborhood of 50,000 pounds of fish annually. A constant temperature of 52 degrees makes these waters ideal for trout production.

Future construction plans for the station include a new house for personnel, cold storage unit and additions to the hatchery building.

**Blood Donors Needed**

More than 2,100 pints of blood have been donated by naval installation personnel in the Thirteenth Naval District (headquarters, Seattle) during the last 20 days of September, an official dispatch states.

The Thirteenth Naval district has set a goal of 5,000 pints of blood a month, now that their blood donation program has been put into operation.

There has been an almost unbelievable lack of civilian interest in the call for blood donors for our fighting men — and the Armed Forces are doing their best to "take up the slack."

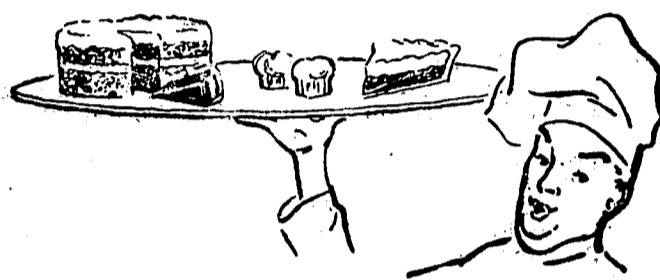

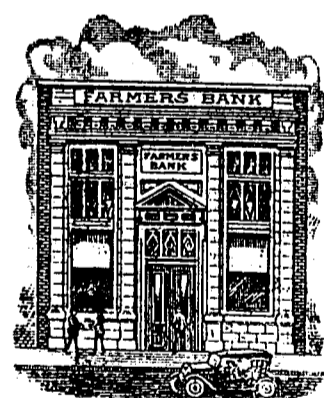

**MODERN FARMING METHODS AIDED BY ELECTRICITY**

"Push-Button Farming Is Here," is the title of a feature article written by Arthur Bartlett in a recent issue of *Colliers*. And it has to do with the amazing revolution worked by electric power on the farm.

Mr. Bartlett describes specific cases in which electrically driven machines and gadgets do everything from drying rice and sizing lemons to automatically feeding chickens and sorting the eggs. The result is greater production, at smaller cost, with less manpower — a factor which is of the utmost importance now, as the defense program begins to strain at the labor supply. Mr. Bartlett writes, "The poor old farmer toting

water from the well, and relaxing with a mail-order catalogue under a flickering kerosene lamp is a figure in history.

Today's farmer lets the electric pump bring in the water, and more than likely does his relaxing in front of a modern radio or television set. He still has chores that won't get done by switch-flipping, but pretty soon somebody is going to put the "wires" to those too. Then things will really begin to move — for push-button farming is here to stay.

This would be of small significance if only a relatively few lucky farmers had access to the power lines. But just the opposite is the case. To quote Mr. Bartlett again: "In the last year or so, power companies all over the nation have been completing the job of getting power out to the farms in their territories. It has taken time, but as of this year approximately 95 percent of American farms have either been electrified or are within tapping distance of power lines. Except for a few impossible cases, the job of getting electricity to the farms of America is virtually finished.

Naturally, the job of making full utilization of power on the average farm has only begun. But it is going ahead with remarkable speed, as the farmers discover for themselves the miracles that this "invisible servant" can achieve at an amazingly low operating cost.

There has been a great deal of whoop-da-doo over the government's activities in farm electrification — but as the record proves, it was private enterprise that pioneered the work, that pushed it forward, and that still leads in the complex task of providing farmers with all the power they can use at the lowest possible price. Without private enterprise, near-universal rural electrification would still be a dream — instead of the splendid actuality it now is.

Farmers are using electric power to pump water, light homes, many of which contain all the modern electric appliances available to the city dweller; grind feed, power electric welders, turn the fanning mill, light the chicken house, barn and other outbuildings, and a host of other labor saving devices.
