## DOROTHY KRUGER BRIDE OF KENNETH SINCLAIR

One of the most beautiful weddings of the season took place at Emmanuel Lutheran church in Cameron on Thursday, December 27, at 2:00 p. m., when Miss Dorothy Kruger, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gus Kruger of Cameron, became the bride of Kenneth Sinclair, son of L. N. Sinclair of Spokane.

Large bouquets of white mums and numerous candleabra made the front of the church a most attractive setting for the double-ring candlelight ceremony, performed by the Rev. Theo Meske of Cameron.

The aisle end of the pews were gaily decorated with cedar boughs and huge white bows, centered with three miniature wedding bells.

The bride was lovely in a white slipper satin gown with long train. It was cleverly fashioned with long, tight-fitting sleeves and high neck-line with peter-pan collar. The front of the bodice was adorned with wide lace insets and tiny covered buttons from neck to waistline. Her finger-ring veil was of imported silk net with French Chantilly lace edging and was held in place by a rhinestone coronet tiara. Her early jewelry was a pair of zircon earrings, a gift from the groom. She carried a white Bible topped with white rosebuds and long ribbon streamers. To carry out the traditional custom she wore a blue garter and carried an "old handkerchief" which once belonged to her grandmother. Her gown was the "something new," her Bible was borrowed, and in her left shoe she had the "good luck penny."

The soft strains of Loehingrins wedding march she was escorted up the aisle and given in marriage by her father.

Miss Elsie Kruger, a sister of the bride, was maid of honor. She wore a coral rose floor-length formal. Mrs. John Blankenship also a sister of the bride and Miss Ida Marie Sillow, a cousin, were the bridesmaids. Their formals were lemon-green. All three gowns were fashioned alike with very full net skirts over satin, and little tight-fitting sateen jackets with mandarin collars. All three carried colonial bouquets made up of gardenias, carnations and small mums with long ribbon streamers matching their gowns.

The tiny little flower girl was Betty Diane Blankenship, the bride's niece. She preceded the bride party up the aisle, scattering rose petals from a tiny basket trimmed with net and ribbons. Her floor-length formal was also coral rose and was an exact duplicate of the bridesmaids' dresses.

The groom wore a light blue business suit and rosebud boutonniere. The groom's father, Neil Sinclair, was best man and wore a dark gray business suit with carnation boutonniere. Wayne Fanning, Clarkston, a friend of the groom, and Harry Wegner, a cousin of the bride, were the ushers and candlelighters.

A reception was held immediately following the ceremony at the parish hall, which had been decorated with evergreen boughs interwoven with white bows.

The wedding party was seated at a large U-shaped table, centered with a huge and beautiful four-tier wedding cake, topped with a miniature bride and groom. Large lighted candles gave the table a festive air. After the bride and groom had cut the first piece of wedding cake, Mrs. Fred Sillow and Mrs. Henry Wendt, aunts of the bride, finished cutting and serving. Two cousins, Mrs. Emil Sillow, poured, and Mrs. Harry Wegner presided at the punchbowl. Table waiters were Mrs. James Whiting, Mrs. Kenneth Wilken and Edwin Nelson's cousins, and John Blankenship, the bride's brother-in-law. Larry Blankenship, the bride's nephew, passed out cigars.

After the bride and groom, assisted by all their attendants, had opened their many lovely gifts, they left for a short honeymoon trip. Mrs. Sinclair chose for her going-away outfit a navy blue suit with red and white accessories. Her corsage was blue rosebuds from her white Bible.

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**MARCH OF DIMES DRIVE RESULTS VERY IMPORTANT**

Boise, Idaho — Idaho's 1952 March of Dimes campaign, which began on January 2nd, must of necessity become a "march of dollars" if we are to keep pace with the march of polio, R. S. Overstreet, state chairman for the January campaign, announced this week.

"The upward surge of polio incidence during the last four years has far out-distanced funds available for patient care, professional education and research. Year-after-year, March of Dimes contributions have moved steadily ahead, but the march of polio has continued to out-distance the March of Dimes," Mr. Overstreet emphasized, adding, "Since 1947 Idaho has experienced unrelenting attacks of the epidemic disease which have left in their wakes nearly twice as many victims as had been stricken over the entire previous quarter of a century."

Idaho county chapters of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis have been trying to do a one hundred per cent job with considerably less than 100 per cent of the funds needed to do it. Since the inception of the Idaho March of Dimes campaign in the late '30's, our county chapters have raised and retained \$612,516.55. During this same period the individual county units were forced to request financial assistance from the epidemic aid pool of the national March of Dimes organization in an amount in excess of \$1,705,130.00 to assist them in meeting the financial responsibilities imposed by patient care.

Mr. Overstreet pointed out that maximum success in the January campaign is necessary if we are to continue the very vital humanitarian services now made available to Idaho by the National Foundation. He added, "These not only include financial assistance for patient care, and professional education, but will also include the essential continuation of the extremely important polio research program. It is here, he stated, that the final victory will be won against the crippling, infantile paralysis."

Mr. Overstreet further urged all county March of Dimes chairmen to develop well organized and integrated campaigns. He pointed out, "the success of the campaign depends entirely upon the efforts of these key people."

March of Dimes chairmen in this three-county area are: Clearwater John Crockett; Latah, F. N. McCowen; Nez Perce, G. C. Gale.




