BEVERLY SCHUPPER WRITES MORE INTERESTING LETTERS

Continued from Last Week — This was New Year's Eve and we went out to watch the celebration in the streets. Everyone had balloons, noisemakers and paper hats and there were hurdy-gurdys with their tiny piano music boxes on nearly every street corner. Also the beggars were out in full force, and there were a lot of them, because Valencia isn't a very rich city. Some of them are very pathetic and I think that most of them are really poor. We celebrated the New Year with a glass of orange juice in a crowded lunch and soft drink fountain, and left the celebration behind. But not the noise, however, because we could hear that until almost dawn.

The next afternoon we did some sightseeing, and went to a circus in the bullfight arena. We thought it would probably be a little two-bit affair, but were surprised to find it was really good and we stayed for the whole performance. It had only one ring, more like a stage, and it seemed to be more vaudeville than real circus acts. They had trapeze artists, jugglers, a strong man, monkeys that did tricks, acrobats, dancers, etc. It was one of the best circuses that I have ever seen. It was from South America.

At 9:00 in the evening we boarded the ship for Majorca. Since we didn't know what the conditions on a Spanish ship would be, we bought first class tickets, because it was quite cheap anyway. First class was about \$4.00, and we had a trip of 17 hours. We found that the accommodations were very nice and everything clean. Of course we didn't get to enjoy the ship much until the next day because we left at night. But I didn't enjoy it too much the next day, either, because for the first time in my life I got seasick. We were all up on deck, the ship wasn't pitching very badly, but there was a bad smell of heat and grease from the engine room. That brought it on, and I went downstairs to our cabin, which only aggravated it all, because the pitching was much worse down there. But after I laid down I felt fine and wasn't very sick, only I missed the fun of being on a ship again.

At 2:00 in the afternoon we entered the harbor at Palma on Majorca and it is really a beautiful harbor. I can't remember which card I sent to you, but I think it was of the harbor. The big Gothic cathedral dominates the city and on the hill to the west is a castle just like a picture out of a story book. At the dock we were again besieged by the hotel men, and found out that the one we had chosen had raised the prices out of our reach, so listened to one of the less noisy and violent, who had some good looking pictures and quoted a very reasonable rate. It turned out to be the wonderful hotel I told you about, for 70 pasetas a day, everything included. That is really about \$1.50, still cheap. Ruth and I had a very nice room, overlooking the harbor and the city and the food there was the best that we had anywhere in Spain. It was a family hotel and the people were very friendly and good to us, and since there were few guests we had the place practically to ourselves.

We did a little sightseeing that first evening, but since it was dark, we didn't really learn much about the city. The next morning I woke rather early, and since no one else was up yet, I took a walk close down along the harbor and as far as the cathedral, and just fell in love with the place right away. There were palm trees and flowers everywhere, lots of little shops on the water, and since it was early, the fishermen were mending their nets, with them spread out all over the broad sidewalks. I went back and had breakfast with the others, and we sat on the balcony and stuned ourselves. It was so warm there that we didn't even need a sweater and later, when we took a walk around town, we all overestimated the temperature and were cold. In the afternoon we walked up to the castle on the hill, which is really a fortress, perfectly preserved and just like it was a long time ago. We were up there until almost sundown, and after the sun was gone it was almost chilly. We passed a little coffee shop on our way home where they had ice cream, a treat in Europe, and stopped in to get warm. It was such a nice little place that we made it a regular stopping place every day that we were there. They had a tiny fireplace with comfortable chairs in front of it, and that was the only heat that we had when we were cold. Every evening after dinner we took a walk to the Monaco and had chocolate or hazelnut ice cream in front of a toasting fire.

There was an American woman at our hotel and we soon got to know her very well. Her husband is with (not in) the army at Heidelberg, and she brought her kids and dog to Majorca to spend the winter because it is so cheap. She arrived the morning of the same day as we. She had two little boys, Billy, 9, and Claxton, 7, plus a huge St. Bernard dog bigger than both boys put together. The family is from Berkeley, where her husband taught at the university there, but they had been in Europe since 1947, off and on, and the boys have crossed the Atlantic five times. She had brought an old Mercedes-Benz (big German car) and offered to take us on sightseeing trips around the island, and of course we jumped at the chance. We had read in the guide books that there was a beach at Soller, about 20 miles from

Palma, and wanted to see that, so we left the poor dog at home and all piled into the car with the top down. It turned out to be a rather chilly day, and I caught quite a cold, but it didn't last long. We found the would-be beach, which was nothing but stones, and a big disappointment. The hotel had packed us lunches, so we found a little coffeehouse in the small town and ate there. On the way home we took another road and visited the ex-monastery of Valdeleusa, where Chopin lived for a while. They had his piano there on exhibition and some letters and manuscripts that he had written. It was very interesting. Also the ride across the island was beautiful, and we had to cross a mountain range, enabling us to look down on the city and harbor behind us. The countryside is all terraced with stone walls and there are olive trees everywhere, with a few almond trees that were just beginning to bloom. It was just like something out of a book.

The next day was overcast and cold and I spent the day in the room, wrapped in a blanket, trying to keep warm and get over my cold. In the evening there was a big celebration in Palma, because it was the eve that the Three Kings from the east come — January 5. Most of the European countries celebrate the arrival of the Three Kings, but in Spain it is the day when they exchange their Christmas gifts. About 6:00 in the evening a small ship belonging to the kings glided into the harbor, all decked with colored lights. We watched it from our hotel balcony. When the kings alight at the dock a parade forms and goes through the streets of the city. We had time to walk to town and get in line along a sidewalk. It was a wonderful parade and the Three Kings were on horseback, dressed in very rich robes, with servants carrying the gifts for the Christchild on little platforms. There were bands and horseback riders and everyone in colorful oriental costumes — really a nice celebration.

The next day Mrs. Taylor took us to see the famous rich resort on the northern tip of the island, Formentor. It was beautiful, and the setting reminded me of Carmel in California. The hotel is very nice and luxurious, with a private beach, very beautiful gardens and walks, bridal paths, tennis courts, etc. We inquired about the prices there and learned that it would be about \$5.00 per day, including room and three meals! And I'm sure that it would be comparable to one of the nicest resorts at Carmel or Palm Beach.

Ruth had to go back to Madrid on Monday evening, so the last day at Majorca there were only three of us. We finally tracked down a beach, and spent the entire day, Tuesday, perched on some warm rocks above a little cove where the waves whooshed in the caves below. It was so warm that I got my face a little bit tanned. We took books to read and had a lunch packed for us, and Bob insisted on swimming, but the water was ice cold and he didn't stay in for long. It was actually so hot in the sun that I had to move up on top in the shade after a while, and we had to climb on the rocks like mountain goats. Late in the afternoon we had one last dish of ice cream at the little coffeehouse, the Monaco, and that ended our last day on the island, and I was so sorry to have to think of leaving it. It is really a paradise and everything that I ever expected an island in the Mediterranean should be. I don't see how Capri could be any better. And the prices made it so reasonable to stay there. We were living much more cheaply than if we had been in Austria. I certainly want to go back to Majorca before I leave Europe, but not by train next time. I've learned my lesson and will advise everyone not to go near a Spanish train. We had read that warning in the guide books, but didn't really believe it until we experienced the beastly system for ourselves. However, one can fly to Majorca from southern France and that would be a nice trip.
