To Travel And Speak In Europe

Friends of Dr. Dwight J. Ingle, Kalamazoo, Mich., but who grew to young manhood here, and later attended and graduated from the University of Idaho, will be glad to learn that Dr. Ingle is to travel and lecture in Europe this spring. The following information has been received, sent by a mutual friend:

"I will leave here on March 18th and will spend a day with Dave (Dr. and Mrs. Ingle's elder son) who is in his first year at Harvard. I leave Boston on the evening of the 19th and will arrive in London the next morning.

"My first lecture is to the Endocrine Society of London; two days later I address the Royal Medical Society; then the Ciba Foundation on Bioassay. The Department of Physiological Chemistry at the University of Cambridge is my last lecture in the London area.

"The first of April I go to Bristol to attend a conference sponsored by the Colston Society and will speak to this group. On about the 6th of April I go to Stockholm to address the Swedish Medical Society and the Swedish Endocrine Society. On the 11th of April I address the Denmark Endocrine Society in Copenhagen. On about the 19th of April I address the Dutch Endocrine Society and a day or so earlier a seminar at the Department of Medicine at the University of Lieден. I have been invited to speak at Brussels but have not yet been able to arrange a date.

I return to England on April 20 and will spend a few days at Leeds, and then go on to Scotland. I give a MacArthur Lecture at the University of Edinburgh on April 28th, and a post-graduate lecture at the Dundee Medical School the following day. I expect to arrive home on May 2nd.

ANNUAL CANCER DRIVE IS SET TO BEGIN APRIL 1ST

Boise (Special) — Gov. Len Jordan today called on all Idahoans to join in the annual Cancer Crusade, which starts April 1, saying that it was the duty of every person to participate in the fight to control the disease.

Instead of the traditional proclamation calling attention to the Crusade, the governor issued a statement in keeping with his proclamation of several weeks ago declaring April "No Proclamation Month."

Reminding that cancer last year claimed the lives of 750 persons in Idaho and more than 220,000 in the nation, Gov. Jordan's statement went on to say:

"Science has made remarkable strides in the cure and prevention of many diseases. Yet there remains a great need for further research in the field of diagnosis and treatment of cancer.

"This research calls for the untiring effort and sacrifice of a few hundred scientists who specialize in this field. Funds are required to carry on this work. It is the duty of each one of us to join in this worthy effort so that the death toll may be reduced and that the disease may be brought under control."

The governor praised the volunteers of the Idaho division of the American Cancer Society who give of their time to "spread information about cancer and to raise funds for research, education and service."

Approximately 5,000 cancer workers will participate in the Crusade in Idaho during the month of April.

Interesting Letter From Son

Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Dammarell have kindly allowed us to use the following interesting letter received from their son, Cpl. Frank Dammarell, U. S. M. C., who is now on the front lines in Korea:

Dear Mom and Dad — All's quiet on the front today, a little noise, but a person gets used to it. This weather is sure funny — first it snows, then blows, then the sun will shine a little while, and then it starts in snowing again. I'm going down for a bath sometime this week. We have about 20 more days on the front lines before we get to go back to the rear.

The other night when I was standing on watch I heard the gooks blow those darn bugles of theirs — there were about 20 of the gooks down in the valley talking away in the early morning. We thought they were going to surrender, but they took off sometime before dawn. We had a patrol get hit hard yesterday morning, but there were only three injured and they are O. K. now. When the new draft comes in, we rocket men will be pulled out of the lines and be put back at the company, which is about 50 feet back of the lines, but under the hill in a draw. About all we have to do is take turns running the coolies up and down the hill for supplies. Well, I can't think of much to say, so I'll close for now and write later.

I sure wish we had "Tommy," for the rats are taking our food away by the truck load. The other night I had a candy bar in my helmet, hanging on the ceiling. A rat took it and took off, dragging the helmet across the ceiling. Well, everybody be good — Your son, Frank.

Therefore, we think of each member of the community who attends the games, yes, or even is interested from the outside as being an important part of the program and perhaps few people realize how their words and actions regarding the individuals participating affect them either for better or for worse.

From the standpoint of the school we feel that our basketball season this year has been quite successful, not only from the standpoint of games won and lost (8) but because some of the objectives for which we have been working have been achieved, principally better citizenship, attitude, character and group participation. While the immediate aim in any sport is winning the game, and naturally the incentive of entering the contest is winning, we hold that winning in itself avails only one small part of the educational value of the activity. Just how we won, lost or played the game is of far greater importance.

As we criticize our effort either constructively or destructively (and may it always be constructively), we realize in spite of the success achieved that there was much room for improvement. Perhaps the players were at fault at times in their training, attitudes, or down-right desire to win.

Perhaps we as adults gave them the wrong type of counsel, or perhaps their interested followers at times expected a little more than seemed possible and the "let-down" caused them to do and say things on the spur of the moment that seemingly hindered progress. Some of our boys have mentioned this as a fact.

Be this as it may, we are very proud of our following and you have helped us in many ways to make our program successful. If by chance you happen to be critical, perhaps you can do more to help than you think by encouraging remarks to the students or participants and avoiding enlarging on the importance of winning or criticizing officials. All these factors are due some criticism but our methods of criticism can be very harmful at times.

Let us throughout the summer months remember our 1952 basketball team for what it has accomplished rather than for what it has not accomplished.

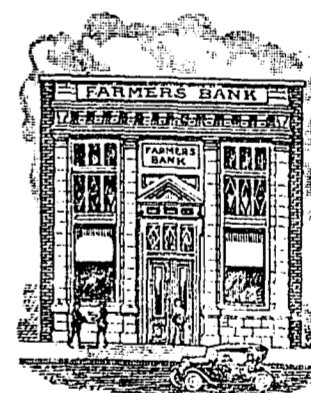

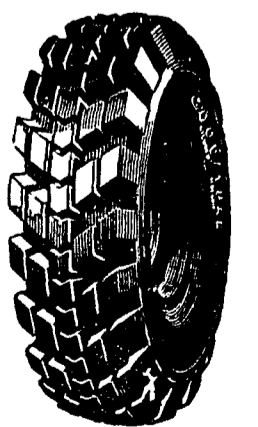
