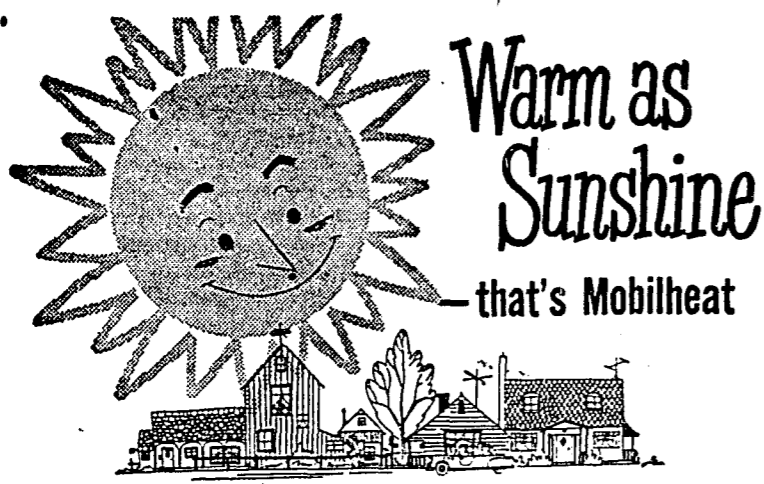

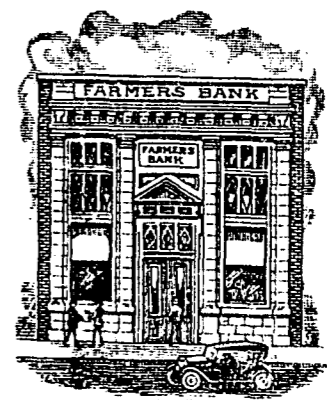

Ask for More Trained Men For Animal Disease Study

Solution to some of the nation's most costly animal disease is being slowed by lack of highly trained research men.
There is urgent need for giving promising young scientists an opportunity to learn the techniques of animal disease investigation.
The only way this can be done is by a long range fellowship program.
Such a program has been sponsored by the AVMA for the past six years. Under this program, which will be expanded as funds permit, research-minded graduates of colleges of veterinary medicine get financial aid to engage in animal disease studies at leading scientific institutions. This gives them background and experience needed for unraveling highly complex diseases.
Many livestock and pet owners who ask for "more research to solve disease problems" have given too little thought to how the job might be done.
Finding out what causes a perplexing animal disease isn't much different from tracking down a dangerous criminal, and neither is a job for anyone but a well-trained person.
The Federal Bureau of Investigation would not put a man on any of its cases without first training him in FBI methods. The same advantage should be given to people interested in disease investigation.
Funds for expanding the fellowship project should come from private sources rather than the federal government "because the nation already has gone too far toward dependence on federal hand-outs."

Mastitis Germs Live 5 Days on Broomstick

Harmless though it may look, that broom in the corner of the barn might be the means of starting a new case of bovine mastitis.
The germ responsible for most cases of bovine mastitis can stay alive for as long as 20 days on objects around the barn, and for as long as 20 days anywhere on a cow's skin. From these jumping-off places, the germ can eventually get into a cow's udder, where it starts the disease known as mastitis.
Survival time of the germ was observed after mastitis-infected milk was poured on manure, hair, wood, bricks, udder cloths, and other materials commonly found or used around dairy barns.
The germ stayed alive for 4 days on rubber boots, 5 days on a broom handle, 7 days on an udder-washing cloth, 8 days on a bucket, 13 days on hair, and 20 days on hay. However, when some of these objects were treated with a disinfectant before being smeared with infected milk, the germ didn't do so well. Enough of the disinfectant lingered to cut down the survival time to a day or less.
This research emphasizes the need for clean barns, clean cows, clean attendants, and prompt disinfection of any object that gets splattered with milk.

Use of Columbium
John Winthrop, Jr., who supervised the construction of America's first successful blast furnace at Saugus, Massachusetts, in 1643, found an unidentified rock fragment near his home. About 150 years later, an English chemist, Charles Hackett, saw this fragment in the British museum, analyzed it, and thus discovered the element columbium. Today, this element is playing an increasingly important part in the manufacture of stainless and heat resistant steels for such uses as jet aircraft engines.
Columbium is one of the most recent elements to find use in the steel industry. It was used commercially as an alloy in the 1930's, although experimental work had been done with it as early as 1920. Last year 632,000 pounds of columbium metal was consumed in the manufacture of steel.

Origin of Camouflage
The origin of the word camouflage has, it seems, been lost in the shuffle. One of the stories told in connection with it is that, during the Indian troubles in the Southwest, one Jacques Camou built a circular mud fort. This fort had large square openings at regular intervals around the walls. Through these, the garrison of the fort would fire. As the Indians' shots also found their mark through these openings, Camou painted the entire fort like a checkerboard—with large black squares on a white field. This confused the Indians so they were unable to determine at which dark squares to aim.

Thermal Snow Removal
Thermal snow removal from sidewalks and driveways by means of embedded piping is a new and interesting development in the heating industry. The snow is removed automatically and without effort by the heat from pipe coils installed under the surface of the pavement. Hot water, circulated through the coils, transfers its heat to the pavement, thus melting the snow and keeping the surface dry. Automatic snow removal is economical. There is no necessity for using snow shovels or chemicals. All the owner does is to turn the switch to start the system in operation when the snow begins to fall.

Ethiopia's Imperial Guard Fighting War in Korea

The first Ethiopian combat force to fight outside Africa in 12 centuries is in action in Korea.

Under the green, yellow and red flag of one of the oldest Christian nations on earth, black-skinned riflemen from the elite Swedish-trained bodyguard of Emperor Haile Selassie—King of Kings of Ethiopia, Conquering Lion of the Tribe of Judah, by legend the descendant of Solomon and the Queen of Sheba—are now in the U.N. fighting line.

In battalion strength, Ethiopia's volunteers landed at Pusan only this month. The date, May 6, must have meant much to men charged by their king "to pay a debt of honor for your homeland," the National Geographic Society notes.

It was 15 years and a day after Mussolini's mechanized legions rolled into Addis Ababa to found an abortive African empire, ten years and a day after the capital was retaken by British and Ethiopian liberation forces in 1941.

Not since before the rise of Islam, however, have Ethiopians fought beyond their own continent. Italy's conquest was the only break in the continuity of a sovereign African kingdom more than 2,000 years old.

Once the masters of Yemen (southern Arabia) across the Red Sea, Ethiopia's early Christian kings built a fabulous empire and a rich, Greek-founded culture. Their traders roved all the way to the shores of the Persian Gulf. Their Coptic Church, linked to Orthodox Catholicism through the Patriarch of Alexandria, laid the foundations of a faith which has held Ethiopia together as an independent nation ever since.

Kaesong Has Been Important Korean Commercial City

Commercially, Kaesong ex-tracts site in Korea has been important for the weaving of coarse cotton cloth, as well as for the making of crude pottery and earthenware. The city, which is just south of the 38th parallel, about 50 road miles northwest of Seoul, is also in normal times a popular market place for produce of near-by fertile valleys.

One of Kaesong's principal offerings has been the medicinal herb ginseng, prized in the Orient for magical strengthening and curative powers. Carefully cultivated, this crop has had a value estimated at times close to \$1,000,000 a year.

In 1930, Kaesong's population was registered at 49,520, and in 1940, at 72,062. While this represented an increase of about 45 per cent, it is far less than that counted for other Korean cities, such as Seoul, 137 per cent rise, and Chongjin, 450 per cent.

Kaesong is situated about a third of the way along the railroad that runs between Seoul and the North Korean capital of Pyongyang. It is surrounded by granite hills which supplied much of the stone for necessary railway tunnels. Villages dot the neighboring valleys, splashed in season with colorful wild iris.

'Tree Of Water'

The Aztec word "ahuehuete" (pronounced "ah-we-we-te" and meaning "tree of water") is the Mexican name for the cypress species of which El Tule is far-and-away the mightiest individual. Twelve feet above the ground, the Tule cypress bears a wooden plaque, largely overgrown. Spanish words carved on it still are partially decipherable. The board reportedly was placed in the trunk in 1803 by the famous German geographer and traveler, Alexander von Humboldt. An earlier Spanish explorer, Juan Bautista de Anza, suggested that the Tule cypress was not a single tree but a fusion of three separate trunks. Some botanists feel this must be so, since the tree is a freak, with no other competitor in size among survivors of its kind.

Civilian Uses

The farm implement known as the flame cultivator, which traces its development to the Army Chemical Corps' World War II flame thrower, originally was designed to weed cotton but was adapted for other types of row-planted vegetation. Other civilian uses of the flame thrower are clearing weeds from highway shoulders and railway beds as well as destroying alligator grass and water hyacinths which impede river navigation.

Distant Star

No one can say which is the most distant star. With the new 200-inch Hale telescope at Mt. Palomar Observatory in California it is possible to see great clusters of stars, called "galaxies," that are so distant that their light takes about a billion years to reach us, so they are said to be a billion light years away. This distance would be about six sextillion (six followed by 21 zeros) miles. No doubt there are other galaxies at still greater distances, which will become visible when more powerful telescopes are built. Of the brightest (first magnitude) stars, the most distant is Deneb, in Cygnus the swan, about 650 light years away. A faint star just visible to the naked eye on a dark night might be at a distance as great as several thousand light years.



Good Pasture Program Means More Profits

Over-Grazing Can Kill Out Pasture Growth

Now is the time to plan a "complete pasture program" that will give your dairy cattle an abundance of high quality, low cost feed at all times next year, says the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee. The Farmer who has an all-season supply of succulent forage, grass silage or hay is the farmer who will have bigger milk checks, lower feed costs and more overall profits, the committee points out.

Earl Jones, Ohio State University extension agronomist, says that a well-rounded pasture plan should include: (1) Seeding well adapted leg-



ume-grass mixtures; (2) The use of lime and commercial fertilizer; (3) Good grazing management.

Jones recommends alfalfa, ladino clover and grass for summer grazing. Where alfalfa does not thrive, ladino clover and grass will do a good job. Timothy, brome grass or orchard grass may also be used.

He cautions farmers to avoid killing out pasture growth by over-grazing and to provide palatable and nutritious pasture by avoiding under grazing. Jones suggests dividing pasture areas into lots. Cattle are allowed to graze down growth in one lot and then are moved to another.

Along with good legume-grass mixtures and managed grazing, Jones emphasizes the benefits from adding lime and fertilizers carrying nitrogen, phosphate and potash.

Poultry Industry Expects To Boost Production

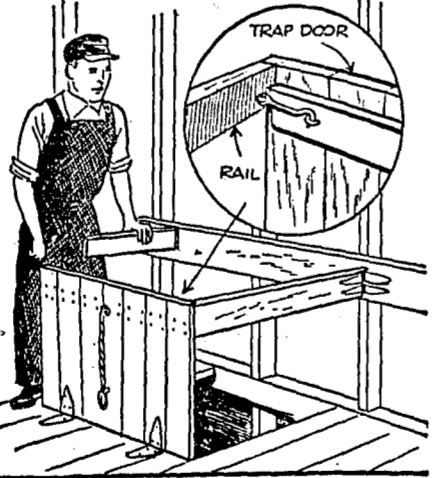
One of the nation's newest agricultural industries is expected to boost the value of poultry products beyond the four billion dollar mark this year.

This new industry—known as the broiler industry—is expected to account for almost half the chicken meat consumed in 1953, compared to an almost negligible amount 15 years ago. Poultry breeders have succeeded in developing chickens that eat less and still grow from two to three weeks faster to reach marketable size.

H. H. Alp, Director of Commodity Departments for the American Farm Bureau Federation, recently credited the success of the new industry to the nationwide Chicken-of-Tomorrow program sponsored since 1945 by A & P Food Stores.

Only a few years ago, according to U.S. Department of Agriculture reports, most of the chicken meat consumed in this country came from so-called "backyard flocks." Records of specialized broiler production in 1934 show that these chickens accounted for only 3 per cent of total consumption of 18.8 pounds of chicken per capita. In 1951 broilers are expected to account for 51 per cent of a per capita consumption of 29.7 pounds.

Hayloft Door



If you have a trap door in your barn loft, here is an idea that could possibly save you a dangerous fall. Fit it with guard-rails as shown above. The rails, which are hinged to the barn wall, swing outward and are hooked to the trap door when it is in the upright position. When the door is closed the rails are folded flush against the wall.

Frozen Foods Show Huge Gain During Past Year

A record percentage of farm produce is moving to consumers in frozen form. Figures compiled by A & P Food Stores, operator of 4,500 markets in 37 states with six million customers daily, show an overall increase in frozen food sales of 38.9 per cent. Leading this list of foods are citrus juice concentrates orange and grapefruit juice, a blend of the two, and lemon mix. Peas, and strawberries also increased.

Request Resignation

Four representatives of the "Latah County Tax League" appeared at a meeting of the Board of County Commissioners on Monday morning, Jan. 19, and requested that E. Dan Pederson resign as County Assessor. The "Tax League" made the appointment with Pederson for a meeting and he appeared at the Commissioners' office. The "League" has been threatening the assessor with recall on the grounds that "he has adopted a system of assessing property which is unfair to the taxpayer."

According to the Idahoanian, Moscow daily newspaper, the delegation from the Tax League read the statement to Pederson in the presence of the county board. The statement: "We are the committee from the Latah County Tax League. Let us understand in the beginning there is no vindictiveness or personalities involved. But due to the fact that we want to maintain harmony in the county, will you consider resigning?" Pederson replied: "I want to thank you for your courtesy. But I will not resign. The voters of Latah county elected me to two successive terms and I feel the charges on the recall petition are improper." — Genesee News.

Our Note: We believe that regardless of whether or not you voted for Mr. Pederson, and whether or not you are satisfied with your present tax assessment — recall, with its attendant turmoil and expense is not the answer to the problem. Unless we have been misquoted the law — Mr. Pederson's hands are tied. He did not make the assessments! The so-called "State Tax Commission" is responsible!

For a moment, let us suppose that Mr. Pederson is recalled. Where will a man of as much experience in the office be found to take his place? What could he do to right the inequalities that we all know exist?

Far better, we believe, if the money the so-called "Tax League" wishes to force the county to spend in an election — were spent in a suit against the "Tax Commission" to force equalization, or in a re-survey of values! If one of these petitions is presented for your signature, think well before you sign.

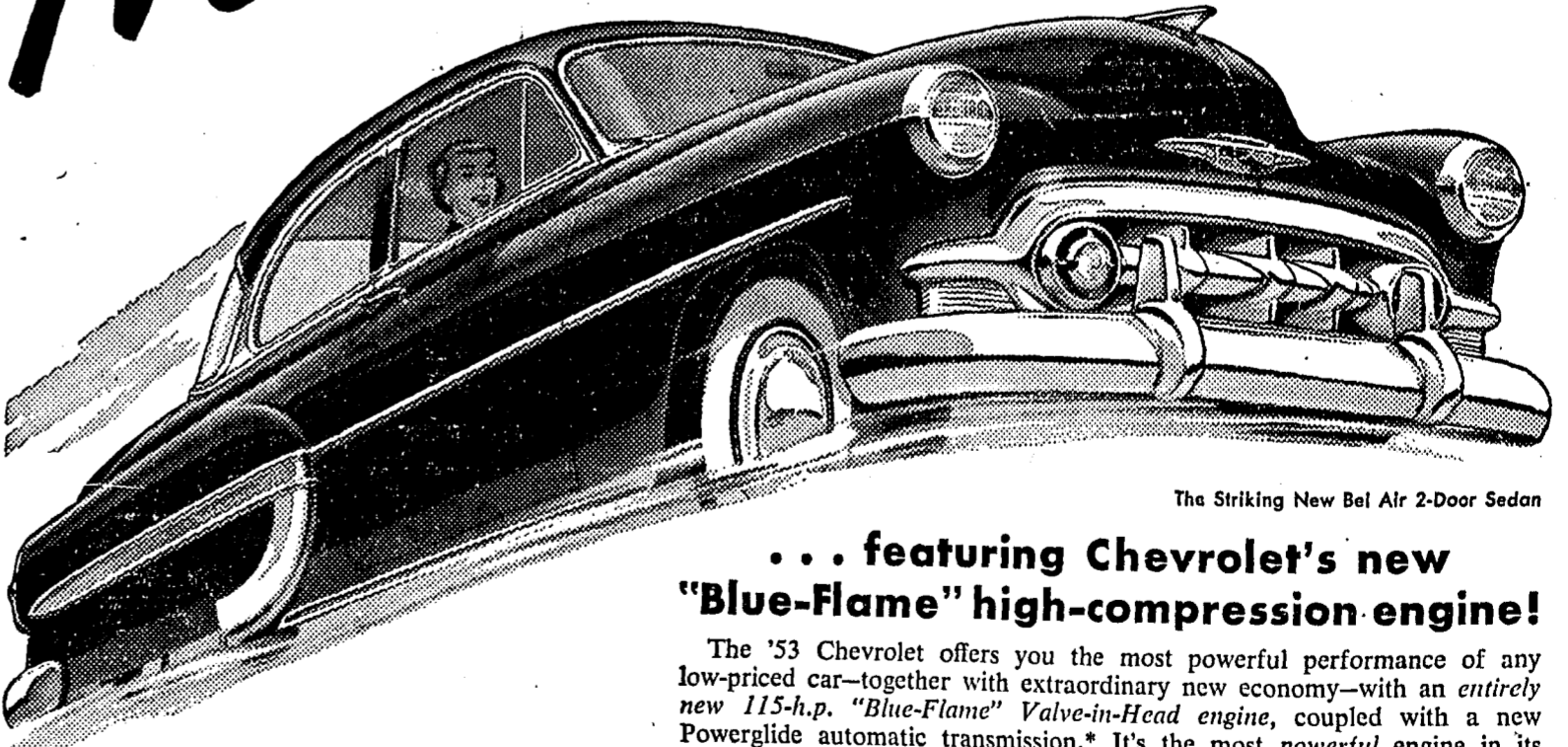

Following many days in which 38 above was the low point, the weather took a turn for the chillier side Sunday evening, when it dropped to a low of 28 above — and it was still colder Tuesday morning, when a low of 25 above was recorded.

This rather chill snap will set back the early flowers and shrubs, which were about to burst into leaf and bloom, and will undoubtedly be a very fine thing for it was too early to expect spring. However, it is highly possible that damage will be done to many early plants.

Farmers say that unless it gets much colder, wheat will not be injured, despite the lack of snow covering. But a long series of freezes and thaws could "heave" it from the ground.

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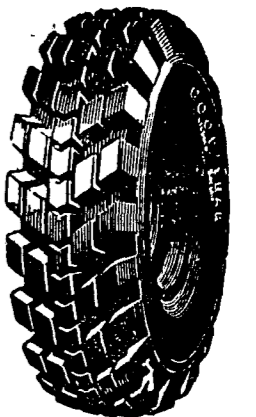
