### FORMER KENDRICK RESIDENTS PASS AT LEWISTON

#### John F. Waide

John F. Waide, 81, retired Kendrick grain dealer, died Monday at the St. Joseph's hospital, Lewiston. Death was due to the infirmities of age.

Mr. Waide, who had been living at Lewiston Orchards with his son, Kermit, was born May 21, 1871, at Troy, Ohio.

After spending his youth in the east, Mr. Waide moved west to Portland in 1900. He moved to Kendrick in 1902, and went into the grain business at Kendrick and later in Deary, retiring in 1924.

He married the late Mary Edna Davidson at Kendrick in 1904. She preceded him in death, passing away in 1943.

Mr. Waide was a member of the Lewiston Orchards Methodist church, and of the Bovill Masonic lodge.

Besides his son at Lewiston he is survived by another son, Darrell, of Potlatch; a brother, Nelson Waide, Langlie Prairie, B. C.; and a sister, Alice Dunnebeck, Hillsboro, Oregon. Several grandchildren also survive.

The body was taken to Short's Funeral Home, Moscow. Services will be conducted there at 2:00 o'clock Thursday afternoon, with the Rev. Truman Cotten, Lewiston Orchards, as officiant. Burial will be in the Moscow cemetery.

#### Mrs. Vera Stewart Dies

Mrs. Vera A. Stewart, 55, lifelong resident of north central Idaho, died at the St. Joseph's hospital in Lewiston at 9:30 Monday evening, after suffering a heart attack.

Mrs. Stewart was born Dec. 14, 1877, at Whitebird, and had lived in this area all her life. She was the widow of the late Ray E. Stewart, who was killed in a logging accident in 1939, while the couple were making their home at Kendrick, where Mrs. Stewart operated a beauty parlor for a number of years.

Mrs. Stewart was a member of the Christian church and the Rebekah lodge, and resided at 926 9th Ave., Lewiston.

She is survived by a daughter, Mrs. H. E. Potter, Lewiston; two brothers, Fred Poe, Horseshoe Bend, Oregon, and Claude Poe, Peck; and two sisters, Mrs. Nels Qualey, Peck, and Mrs. Earl E. Rice, Roseburg, Ore.

Funeral services will be held at 2:00 p. m. Feb. 26, at the Vassar-Rawls Funeral Home. Burial will be in Normal Hill cemetery, Lewiston.

Lapwai — Kendrick and Winchester took first-round victories in the Valley Elimination Basketball tournament at Lapwai Saturday night.

Kendrick stopped Reubens 37-30 in a cautious contest and Winchester subdued a last-half Culedeas rally for a 52-43 decision.

Finals are slated for Friday and both teams in the championship match will enter the Second District playoff March 2-7 at Lewiston, in the NICEE gymnasium.

Kendrick held the lead at all the quarter stops against Reubens, but the score was close until Kendrick picked up 16 points in the third frame. That spurge equaled its entire first-half point-making and left Reubens 32-17.

Kendrick began hitting from the corners in the third quarter, with Ronald Craig leading the attack. The winners also got the ball to Ira Havens in the post for jump shots in that frame.

Meanwhile, Reubens was able to score but four points and Kendrick played a control game much of the last stanza.

Craig led game scoring with 23 points, and Lloyd Stolte topped the Reubens line-up with 12.

Lapwai got the scare of its basketball life Monday night when it tangled with the tough Kendrick hoop squad. Winning, 50-47, Lapwai saw the score tied 11 times before finally stopping the losers. There were no more than three points separating the teams at any time during the game.

Both teams were on the move all of the time and the crowd was on its feet most of the game. Both teams were connecting with long shots, but Lapwai proved most effective off the boards.

**Fish And Game Commission**  
Highlights of the State Fish and Game Commission meeting in Boise this week and last included the appointment of Commissioner George Moody, Calder, as chairman, to succeed Oliver W. McConnell, Grangeville; hearing of recommendations from James C. Simpson, fish culturist, and sportsmen's groups with the commission subsequently passing the 1953 fishing seasons and regulations and four special fishing orders. The commission approved and submitted to the senate fish and game committee the following proposed bills: To abolish compulsory trapper

reports, the Rock Creek, Deer Creek and Big Lost River game preserves, and alien licenses; to change the wording of the law enforcement section of the game law to substitute "conservation officers" for "game wardens"; to allow sale of more than one non-resident tourist fishing license; to permit the commission to determine the form of fish and game licenses and permitting the use of game tags made of material other than metal. The House committee received the following proposed bills: To abolish the St. Maries, Soldier Mountain and Salmon River game preserves, and the Ada County bird

sanctuary; to repeal the section of the law closing to fishing the area 300 feet below dams; to permit the commission to regulate the number of upland game birds that may be taken, and to eliminate private parks for elk and the sale of bear and elk. They also established a retirement policy for department employees reaching age 65, and after meeting with supervisory personnel approved a rating system for employee efficiency and an operations manual for conservation officers. The commission held a special Sunday session with representatives of the Idaho Wildlife Federation discussing proposed legislation new in committee, and recommendations made in the Wildlife Management Institute's survey of the department.

### Medina Mosque Is Younger Building than White House

According to tradition, Mohammed journeyed north from Mecca to the region of Yathrib's oasis, where he loosed his camel to wander unguided until it stopped and knelt. There the mosque was built. Disciples renamed Yathrib Madinat-al-Nabi, meaning City of the Prophet, now varied to Medina. The original house of worship has been rebuilt several times. No existing relics of previous structures bear proof of use earlier than 1308. The present Great Mosque is actually newer than the White House in Washington and replaces an earlier mosque which was destroyed by fire only a century ago.

Though somewhat crowded by other buildings on its south side, the mosque stands out gracefully from most angles of approach. Its minarets are shapely, its dome a restful, dull green. Dominant construction material is a locally quarried crystalline rock of pinkish hue, with occasional elaborate inlay and facade decoration.

Pilgrim trade is easily the chief business of Mecca, Medina, and Jidda, the Red Sea port by way of which nine-tenths of the worshipping tourists now travel. The two shrine cities each have sacred areas where unbelievers are not welcome and subject to trespassing fines or jail terms.

Date growing is the second industry around Medina's oasis, which is larger than Mecca's and can support more population. Under Turkish rule prior to World War I, Medina counted 80,000 people and was the southern terminus of a railroad from the cities of present Jordan, Syria, Turkey, and Iraq to the north.

Not until Mohammed moved from Mecca to Medina, did his creed begin the expansion that now encompasses 250,000,000 followers.

### Drug Given By Mouth Said To Relieve Pain In Cancer

A chemical compound which can be given by mouth is reported by seven New York doctors to be useful in bringing temporary relief to patients suffering from fatal cancer-like diseases of the white blood cells and tissues.

The oral use of triethylene melamine on 58 patients is described by Drs. David A. Karnofsky, J. H. Burchenal, George C. Armistead, Jr., Chester M. Southam, J. L. Bernstein, L. F. Craver, and Cornelius P. Rhoads. The doctors are all associated with the Memorial Center for Cancer and Allied Diseases, New York.

Triethylene melamine is a valuable addition to the small group of drugs now known to be effective in relieving pain in these types of disease, according to the doctors. This is due primarily to the fact that it can be given by mouth, releasing the patient from his dependence on a doctor for administration of the drug. All the other drugs, they point out, have to be injected intravenously, which almost always makes hospitalization necessary.

Clinical trials with the drug are now being widened to include a greater variety of tumorous conditions, they said.

### Cleaning Up

In the Smithsonian Institution's laboratory of vertebrate paleontology, six tons of fossil bones belonging to the extinct gigantic ground sloth, *Megatherium*, are being cleaned and repaired. The skeletal remains of this grotesque animal were collected in western Panama by Dr. C. Lewis Gazin, curator of vertebrate paleontology of the U. S. National Museum, assisted by Dr. Theodore E. White, paleontologist of the Smithsonian's River Basin Surveys. The Smithsonian Institution paleontologists will attempt to reconstruct for exhibition in Washington a complete skeleton of the giant sloth. A large part of the collection will be returned to Panama for exhibition there.

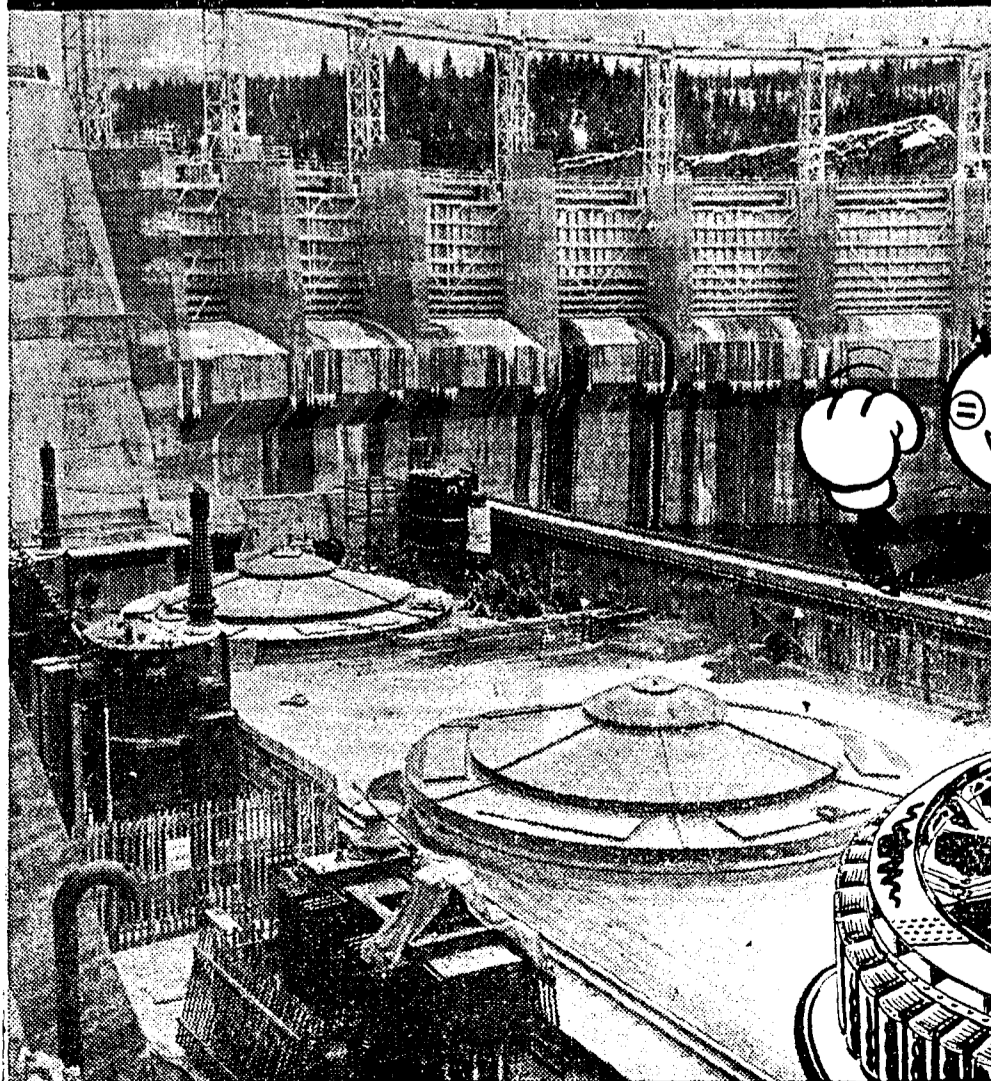
### Forming Pearls

Although some pearls are formed in fresh-water clams and oysters, the most valuable come from the marine pearl oysters of eastern Asia. They occur when some foreign object—perhaps a tiny grain of sand—gets between the shell and the body. The animal then secretes around the object successive layers of a material called nacre, which consists of calcium carbonate. This is the same material as the "mother of pearl" lining of the shell. The Japanese make "culture" pearls by deliberately introducing small particles of graphite into the oyster and keeping it for several years as the pearl is formed.

### Infrared Rays

Infrared rays are similar to rays of visible light, except that the length of their waves is greater than those of red light, which are about 1/40,000th of an inch and are the longest that the eye can detect. The longest infrared waves are about 1/65th of an inch long. Any hot object—the Sun, an open fire, a red hot poker, a warm radiator, an electric lamp, etc.—sends out infrared radiation, often with visible rays as well. Special electric lamps to generate these rays, used for applying heat, have a filament which operates at a lower temperature than is used in one designed mainly for purposes of illumination.

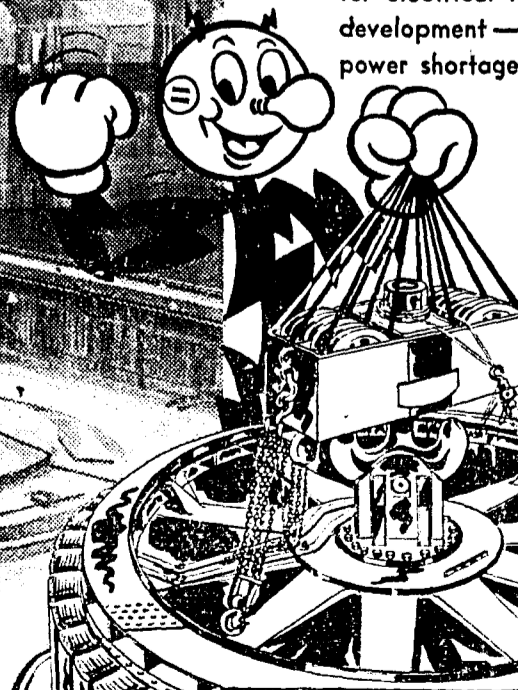

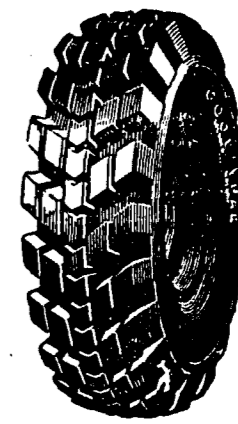
