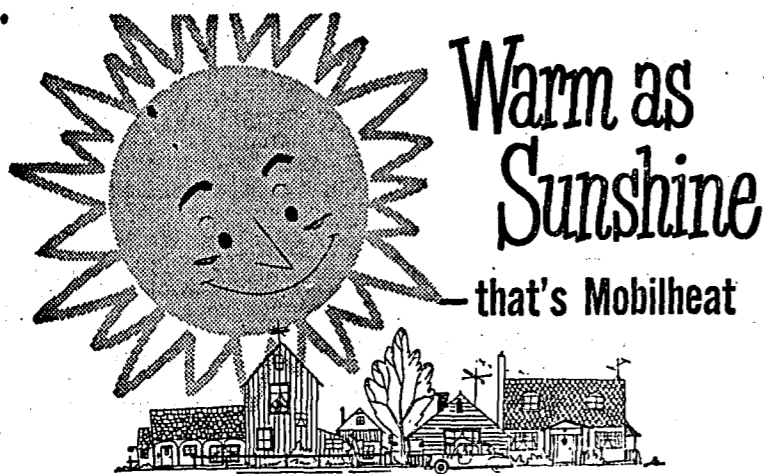

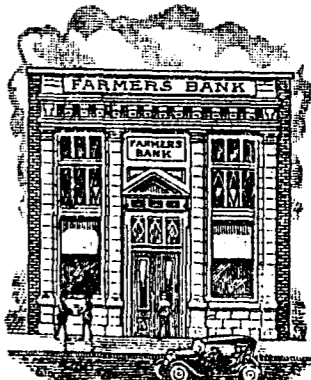

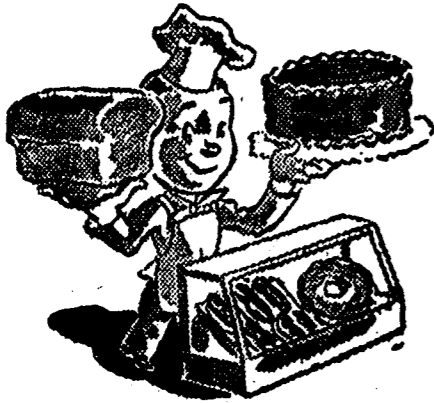

Air Watchers Needed
 M. R. Vincent, who heads the local "Skywatch" operations at Leland is a firm believer in being prepared, and is attempting to bring that unit up to full strength. Below we give excerpts from a letter and article received by him from headquarters:
 "Dear Supervisor: Occasionally there appears in print an exceptional article concerning air power. We recently received a copy of such an article, 'Soviet Polar Potential,' which was published by the Fairchild Aviation corporation.
 "The author of this article, William Key, is the editor of the Pagasus magazine published by Fairchild, and is well known in aviation circles. He is respected for his opinions and his ability to analyze the world picture with reference to Military Air power.
 "The USSR may be considered a potential enemy; she now has intercontinental bombers and 'A' bombs. The first factor represents a possibility, while the latter establishes a fact."
 Gen. Omar Bradley, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, has said he does not know the "zenith point of danger," but he has told a congressional committee that today's estimates give the Soviet Union a capability which she may well consider adequate to warrant the risk of a major aggression — now.

General Bradley's statement is only one of many made recently by government officials and USAF commanders which analyzed the x-ray of this information concerning Russian long range attack capabilities, take on a vastly greater significance than has been attached to them in the past.

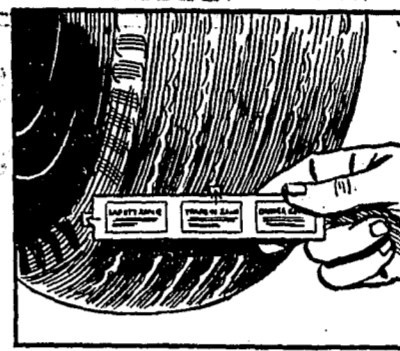

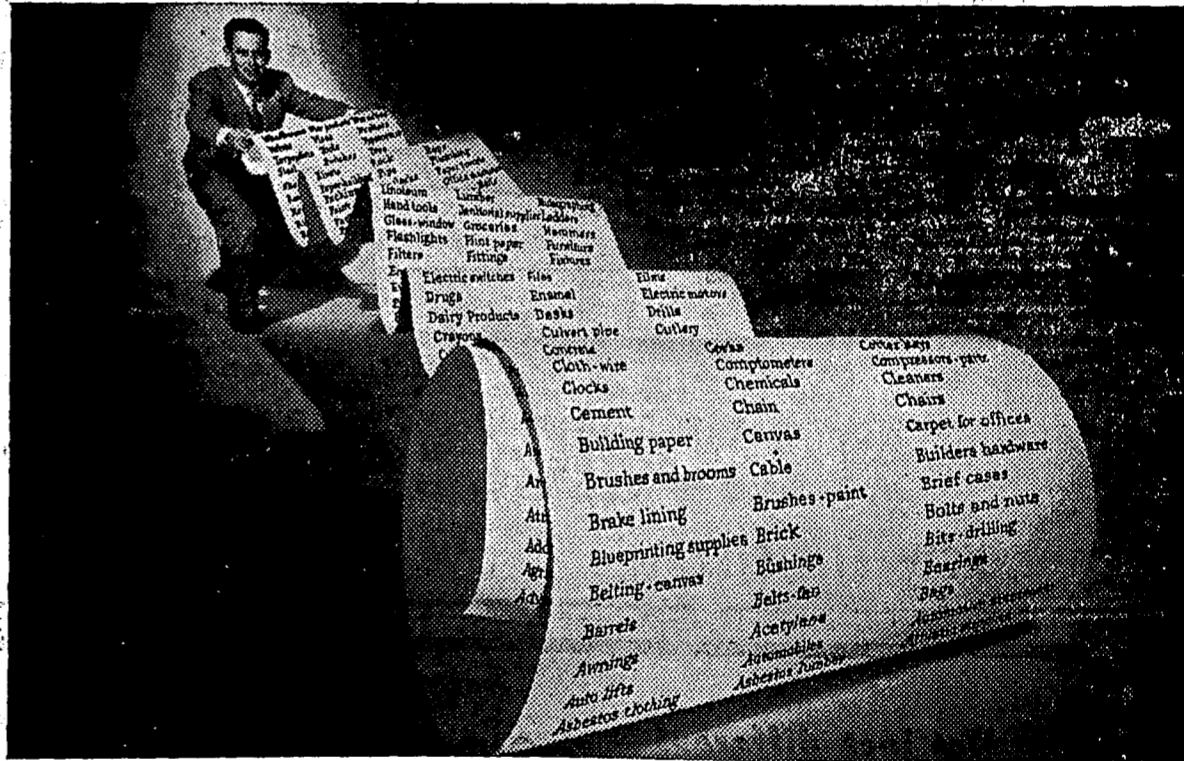

Short story of a long shopping list



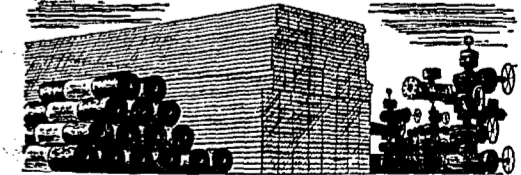
