Orren Needham Passes

Lewiston (April 21) — Orren Ed-gar Needham, 78, retired Juliaetta farmer, died yesterday at his home. Death was attributed to cancer.

Born at Easton, Wis., he moved to Potlatch ridge in 1903 and lived there for several years before moving to start operations the 15th, but Bill to Juliaetta.
