SHORT NEWS ITEMS FROM OUR LOCAL SCHOOLHOUSE

Letter To The Parents:

Dear Parents — Tuesday of last week I had occasion to sit in on a meeting with several ladies of our local P.-T. A., who form the canning committee for the school lunch program — and who have been appointed to head the summer's canning program, by Mrs. Margaret Racicot, local P.-T. A. president, with the assistance of the executive committee.

In attendance at this meeting were Mrs. Inez Armitage, vice president of the P.-T. A.; Mrs. Ruth White, who has been named general chairman of the canning committee; Mrs. Walter Silflow, Mrs. Wm. Carlton, Mrs. Helen Cowger, Mrs. Rose Ann Holt, Mrs. Jesse Mizer, Mrs. Gerald Ingle, Mrs. Frances Peters, Gerald Ingle, chairman of the school board, and Robert Meserve, incoming superintendent of schools.

Each of the ladies mentioned above represents a certain area in the district, and with the help of the general chairman, will organize each area and schedule the day certain foods will be canned, and name the ladies who will be asked to assist with the canning of certain fruits and vegetables on those days.

This is the fourth summer the P.-T. A. has undertaken this project and it has proven a tremendous success. The food provided by the ladies of our district has helped to provide a more nourishing and well rounded meal. This has also helped to cut costs in two ways: First, by keeping the student participation high; and secondly, by providing the food itself, thus lessening the cost of our wholesale supplies. It has also been successful in helping to keep our student morale high and keeping the sickness rate lower.

In comparing our school lunch program with others around the state I seriously doubt if another school in Idaho provides the quality and quantity of food that our program furnishes — for the price we charge. Only a few schools charge less, and they do not attempt to provide the full meals that we do. I mention this because I feel that our ladies, who have sacrificed their time, energy and foodstuffs have added that "extra special something" to our school lunches to make them especially appetizing and delicious.

As the canning is completed, each summer it is carefully counted and divided between the Kendrick and Juliaetta schools. Lockers have been rented at minimum cost from Blewett's, where they are labeled "Juliaetta" or "Kendrick," and when counted, the food is placed in the lockers provided. One or two lockers are also rented at Juliaetta, where food there can be placed temporarily.

The Southwick unit provides its own canning program, and though the ladies in that area are busy with their own program, they will contribute whenever possible to the Kendrick-Juliaetta endeavor. For example: This year they produced some one-act plays in the Kendrick gym, the proceeds of which were turned over to the summer canning program for Kendrick and Juliaetta.

Each of the ladies who respond to the telephone calls for help with the canning program may feel that she has contributed much to the success of this year's effort and her reward will be the satisfaction she receives in knowing that her children are healthy and getting the nutrition necessary to keep them that way.

LATAH COUNTY CHAMBERS OF COMMERCE MEET HERE

Wednesday evening of last week the Latah County Chambers of Commerce held their regular monthly meeting in Kendrick, with Wayne Rausch of Troy, president, presiding.

Preceding the meeting the ladies of the Kendrick Grange served a delicious turkey dinner to the 46 assembled for the session — a vote of thanks being extended the Grangers for the splendid meal.

At the opening of the meeting two songs were sung by a quartette composed of Ann and Donna Kanikkeberg, Jane Racicot and her mother, Mrs. Dennis Racicot. Their numbers were "Kentucky Babe" and "Sentimental Journey."

Eibert McProud, county agent, announced the annual agricultural tour for Latah County, which will be held on June 17, the caravan assembling at Polatch, with dinner to be served by the Grange near that town.

J. Adrian Nelson, Genesee, explained the proposed consolidation of highway districts in the Genesee and Moscow areas — or the western portion of Latah county. Mr. Nelson said that preliminary petitions, looking toward the holding of an election by the county commissioners were now being circulated. He went on to explain the expected advantages, and answered a number of questions.

Eldon Strom, Troy, gave a talk on the "Television Co-operative" that had been formed in that town, for the "piping in" of television. Mr. Strom said that 2,600 feet of cable had been put in to date, and that a very good picture reception had resulted. Cost of this installation was \$100 for each home or place of business "hooked on," and that maintenance or service fees were expected to run \$3.00 per month.

In the absence of the expected speaker, a film, "The Atomic Bomb and You," was shown. This film depicted a mock bombing raid on the city of New York, and "photographic bomb" pictures taken proved that the three planes taking part could have destroyed a large portion of downtown New York, with a huge resultant loss of life and property. The picture concluded with a plea for operation of "Ground Observer Corps" listening posts.

After some discussion on future meetings, it was decided to hold no more until the end of the fall busy season then to be resumed at the call of the president.


