MJR. REX BLEWETT, KEND-RICK, RECEIVES BRONZE STAR

Moscow -Mjr. Rex Blewett, former assistant professor of military science at the University of Idaho. has been promoted from captain and awarded the Bronze Star Medal for valor, according to word received Saturday by Mjr. Kenneth J. Woods of the university's Army ROTC staff. Blewett, a Kendrick man whose brother, Lt. Col. Aaron E. Blewett. was Idaho's professor of military science until last June, was cited for

"heroism, decisive leadership and kowledge of combat operations." The action resulting in the valor award took place near Changhang, Korea, on Nov. 21, 1952. When his company was brought under heavy enemy bombardment, the then Captain Blewett organized a rescue party for the wounded, and led it to the scene of the attack. After being severely wounded himself by mortar fragments, Blewett refused medical attention though unable to walk. Remaining exposed to enemy fire, he directed the efforts of the rescue party and then supervised restoration of communications. His efforts, according to the citation, enabled the evacuation of all wounded per-

After hospitalization in Japan, Major Blewett returned to Korea as an aide to Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, commander of the Eighth Army.

The 32-year-old Regular Army of-ficer, who served on the Idaho ROTC staff from 1949 to 1951, will return to the United States early in October. - Lewiston Tribune.

A wind-whipped fire burned over about 300 acres of brush and pasture land near Arrow Saturday afternoon before it was brought under

Henry Jones, fire warden of the Kendrick Forest Protective district, said the fire started near the Raleigh Albright turkey ranch about 1½ miles above Arrow, toward Juliaetta, about 3:40 o'clock.

It spread very rapidly up the steep canyon side from the valley, fanned by the strong winds that prevailed over the area.

Eighteen firemen from the Genesee Rural Fire department came in over the hill from that side and succeeded in blocking off the blaze, and 20 men from the Kendrick district, including volunteers, worked to Kellogg, on Saturday, to spend on the fire below and from the sides. The blaze was under control that night, but two men were left on patrol duty.

Henry says that as yet he has been unable to determine the cause of the blaze. Luckily, the wind carried it away from the Albrights' homes and other buildings - not to mention their turkeys.

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
