A. W. JONES, AREA PIONEER DIES THANKSGIVING DAY

Albert Walter Jones, one of the few remaining pioneers of the Big Bear ridge section, passed away at his ranch home there on Thursday, November 26, 1953, after being ill for two weeks, the immediate cause of death being a stroke. He was 79 years and 11 months old.

Mr. Jones was born at Aurora, Nebraska, December 24, 1874, a son of James and Alvira Jones. In 1899 the family moved to Derby, Iowa.

On March 21, 1900, he was united in marriage to Myrtle Horton, at Woodburn, Iowa. She passed away in March of 1949 at the family home in Kendrick.

Mr. and Mrs. Jones moved to New Plymouth, Idaho, in 1907, and to Kendrick, Idaho, in 1909. They farmed on American ridge until 1914, at which time they moved to Big Bear ridge, purchasing a farm there and operating it until 1944, when they retired and moved to Kendrick, purchasing a home in the west part of town. Here he lived until the late fall of 1953, when he moved with his sons Bernard and Ray back to the Big Bear ridge farm.

He was born in a sod house, and when he moved his family from New Plymouth to Kendrick, they came up the Salmon river in a covered wagon — in true pioneer style.

Two children preceded him in death, a son, Fay, passing away as an infant, and a daughter, Dorothy, in 1928.

Survivors include five daughters: Mrs. Agnes Sherbon, Pullman, Wash.; Mrs. Opal Reddington, Salmon, Ida.; Mrs. Lizzie Maynard, Lewiston, Ida.; Mrs. Erma Bennett, Spokane, Wn.; Mrs. Pauline Shoemaker, Connell, Wash., and five sons: Claude, Bernard, Ronald and Ray of Kendrick, and John at Deary, Idaho; a brother, Ernie Jones, Kendrick, and three sisters, Miss Minnie Jones, Kendrick; Mrs. Maud Horton, Osceola, Iowa, and Mrs. Edith Patterson of Charitan, Iowa. Thirteen grandchildren, several nephews and nieces and a host of friends also mourn their loss.

Funeral services were held on Monday, Nov. 30, at the Wild Rose Chapel on Big Bear ridge, with the Rev. F. C. Schmidt of Kendrick bringing the message.

Active pallbearers were Oscar Slind, John Galloway, Ole Kleth, Joe Forest, Bob Clemenahagen and Clarence Morey. Honorary pallbearers were Ed Halseh, Wade T. Keene, Ira Foster, W. W. Eldridge, John Heath and King D. Ingle — all being friends and neighbors of many years standing.

Music was furnished by Mrs. Margaret Cox, Mrs. Helen Leland and Mrs. Betty Jones, who sang: "Will the Circle Be Unbroken," "Sweet Bye and Bye" and "The Old Rugged Cross." They were accompanied by Mrs. Oscar Slind.

Interment was in the Wild Rose cemetery by the side of his wife.

Mr. Jones was a man who took a keen interest in community affairs, and he gave unstintingly of his time to many projects for community betterment. He was never too busy to help a friend or neighbor, and his kindly ways and friendly smile made and kept for him friends.

Watch That Insecticide
U. of I., Moscow — Selecting the wrong insecticide to control pests in field crops, gardens, trees or flower beds can end up by killing beneficial insects and defeating the entire purpose of the control measures.
Says Roland Portman, extension entomologist for the University: "We have to remember that to a large extent we depend on many of our predator insects to keep the harmful members of their family under control. It's the cheapest and easiest control that we have. Spraying with compounds that kill off these friendly insects or doing spraying at a time when we know they are out in the fields and working is sure to end up in our having more insect enemies and fewer of our friends."
Portman's list of beneficial insects include not only those that feed on the insect pests but also the pollinating wild bees, flies of many kinds,

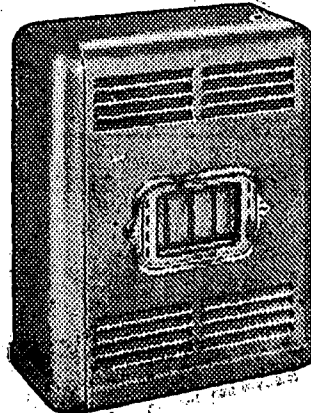


and the common honey bees. Spraying many things while in bloom is sure to kill off thousands of these insects if the wrong spray is used for the job.
The entomologist recommends using harmful chemicals carefully and timing the spray operations for evening, night or early morning when the pollinating insects are not working. If in doubt, consult a reliable chemical dealer or the university.

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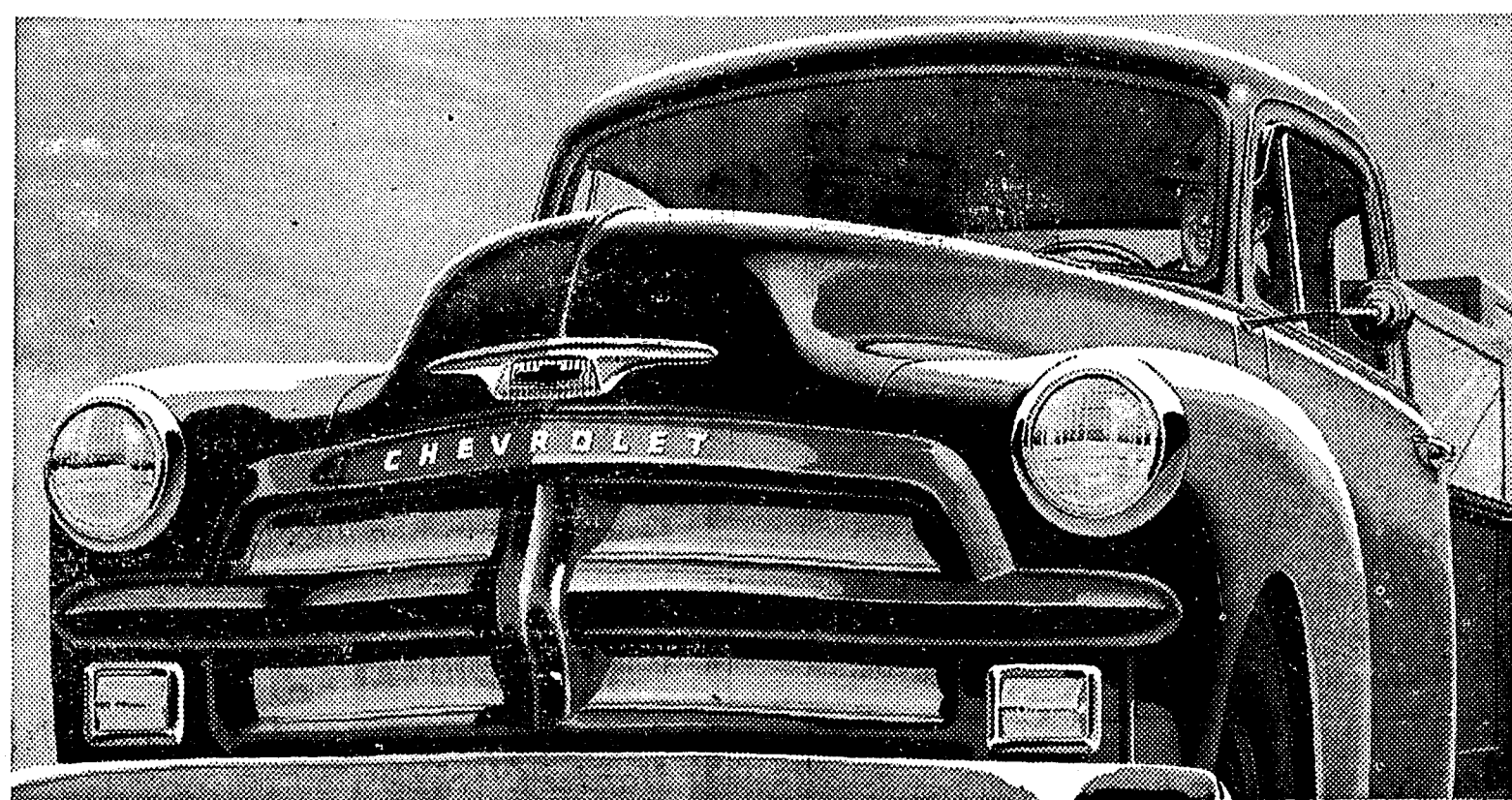

Life Insurance Funds Going To Nation's Defense Plants

Life insurance funds are moving to the aid of the defense activities of the country in increasing volume, and loans made by the life insurance companies in support of the defense program may reach \$3,500,000,000 for 1951, according to the Institute of Life Insurance.

"In keeping with the usual policy of directing new funds into channels where they may be most useful for the national economy, the current trend in life insurance investments is towards meeting the capital needs of the preparedness program," Holgar J. Johnson, Institute president, commented. "This is in line with the voluntary credit restraint program under which defense needs have precedence over all other elements in the economy. Defense financing now accounts for the greater part of the life insurance company placement of policyholder funds in business and industry."

More than \$1,000,000,000 has been loaned by the life insurance companies so far this year to defense plants and indications are that a like amount may be loaned in the remaining months of the year.

In addition, some \$800,000,000 has this year been invested in loans to utility companies and railroads, which are basically involved in all defense activities. This amount may be nearly doubled by the end of the year. Thus, the total of financing made available during the entire year for defense industries or defense-supporting activities may come to \$3,500,000,000.

The loans for defense or defense-supporting purposes represent two-thirds of all loans made in the first six months by the life companies to business and industrial concerns, and the ratio has been increasing since mid-year.

Pruning Trees On Forest Land

Pruning trees on forest land is proving to be one of the best economic investments which can be made by farmers owning woodland, according to Lonnie Williams, Latah county farm forester.

As an example of what different log grades might bring, Williams cited the example of an area in western Oregon, where the top grade peeler quality logs were purchased for \$185 per thousand and the lower grades ran down to \$20 per thousand.

The cost of pruning the lowest 16-foot log on a tree has been found to

run from 8c to 20c per tree. Since the lowest log in the tree contains about one-third of the total volume, you can increase the return on that portion of the tree.

The trees which are pruned are normally pruned to a height of nine feet or to 17 feet. This allows for an eight-foot clear log above the stump cut or for two 8-foot sections. In pruning the trees, at least one-third of the total height should be left in a growing crown. This would mean you should never prune a tree to 17 feet that is not at least 26 feet tall. Pruning can best be done on trees which are six to 12 inches in diameter.

In northern Idaho there still is no log grading commonly practiced. In all other major forest producing areas there are accepted log grades, and they are widely used. There can be

little question but that the time will come when specific log grading will be in use in this area too, Williams stated.

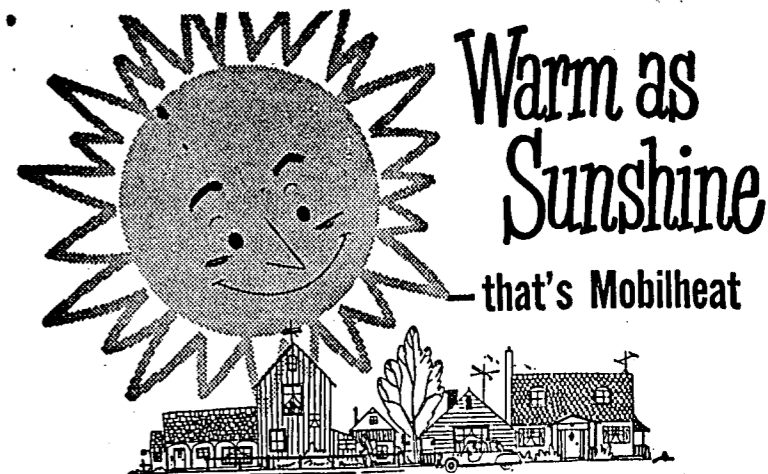

Contrary To Superstition, Oysters Edible Year-Round

Contrary to superstition, oysters are edible in all 12 months. Hot-weather shipping problems helped to build the R-month legend. The taboo remains appropriate even with modern refrigerated transportation, however, since May to August is the natural spawning season. The adult female oyster's feat of discharging as many as a half-billion eggs in this season leaves her a bit too thinned down for prime succulence.

Shad were surpassed only by cod and salmon among U.S. commercial fisheries before the turn of the century. Overfishing, industrial pollution, and high dams barring the way to upstream spawning grounds have forced shad far down on the list now. Although the Chesapeake Bay still accounts for one fish out of three, the total catch is less than one-fifth that of 19th century peak seasons.

Crabs, alewives, rockfish, croakers, sea trout, and menhaden all figure importantly in Chesapeake Bay commerce. Like oysters and shad, they are studied for rehabilitation purposes by such organizations as the Chesapeake Biological Laboratory at Solomons, Maryland, and the Chesapeake Bay Institute, Baltimore.

Pearls and Pipelines

Iranian nationalists have laid verbal claim to Bahrain, oil-rich island across the Persian Gulf where Arabian dhows put in bearing huge milky pearls from the sea floor. Persia has been claiming Bahrain without avail since 1783, however. An independent sheikdom under British protection, Bahrain is the site of an American oil field and refinery. Saudi Arabia's oil wells were joined with the Mediterranean coast in 1950 by the competition of Tapline, a 1,068-mile, 30-inch pipeline across the burning Arabian desert. American and British engineers proposed to build next an even bigger "Middle East Inch" (34-36 inches in diameter) from Abadan to the Mediterranean. Iran's oil would thus be linked by a tunnel of steel with the Western world—if the hot desert wind from Tehran does not blow the project away.

Turbans

In a survey of "fashions down through the ages," made by The Book House For Children the turban was found to be a favorite head covering of many ancient peoples, among them, the Armenians, Babylonians, and Phoenicians. Today's favorites include variations of the cloche, beret, and "beanie," a small disc of felt or straw that is anchored to the head, usually with hatpin or veiling.

Color Blindness

Most common in color blindness is the confusion of red and green, which may affect as many as 80 men and 5 women per thousand population. One person out of several thousand has trouble with yellows and blues. Very rare is complete color-blindness, in which everything is seen as black, gray and white. Not more than a hundred such cases have been reported in the scientific literature. Even a partially color-blind person usually learns to name colors properly a great deal of the time. For example, one with red-green deficiency may learn by experience that what he sees as dull dark yellow is really red, while a light yellowish-gray is what other people call green.

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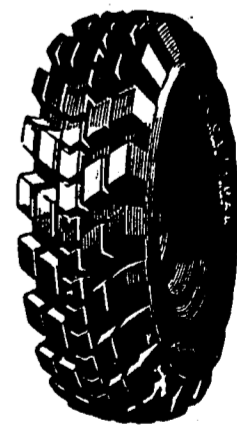
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
