HOLDUP ATTEMPT FAILS AT ANTELOPE INN, KENDRICK

Leland Hays, battered and wounded father of five children, was charged with assault with intent to commit armed robbery Friday, at Moscow Friday morning in connection with a holdup attempt of the Antelope Inn here last Thursday night between 11:00 and 12:00 o'clock. The charge was read to Hays, 27, in his room at the Moscow hospital, and he asked for time to consult a lawyer. Justice William Black set bond at \$2,500.

The bandit entered the Inn with a handkerchief across the lower part of his face, evidently believing Charles Candler, who was tending bar at the time, was alone, but such was not the case, there being some 15 or more patrons sitting in the booths in the main room of the Inn.

Mr. Candler, whom the bandit called by name, at first pretended not to believe him serious when he demanded the money, but took a bit of time, awaited the second demand, and seizing a presented opportunity, grabbed Hays gun arm, and grappled with him. Hays fired the gun, the bullet going between the legs of the struggling men, creating one of Mr. Candler's shoes, and imbedded itself in the floor. By that time the two men were almost across the room when the bandit fired the second shot. This struck the floor, glanced off the tile, ricocheted from the heavy iron pedestal of a small table, and imbedded itself in one of Hays' legs.

By that time members of the V. F. W., who were patrons, had reached the front room. Otto Rauschke, armed with a pop bottle, proceeded to "conk" Hays with it, and Neil Craig, who had picked up a heavy ash tray, finished the process of laying the bandit out.

The sheriff's office was then called and Hays transported to the Moscow hospital, where he had his wounds treated and was later booked for the armed robbery attempt. Police said the gunman used a Belgian made .32 caliber automatic. Hays automobile, with its motor running, was found in the driveway of Bob's Garage, adjoining the Inn. Charles took the whole matter very calmly, and did not even tell his wife about the robbery attempt until the following morning.

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

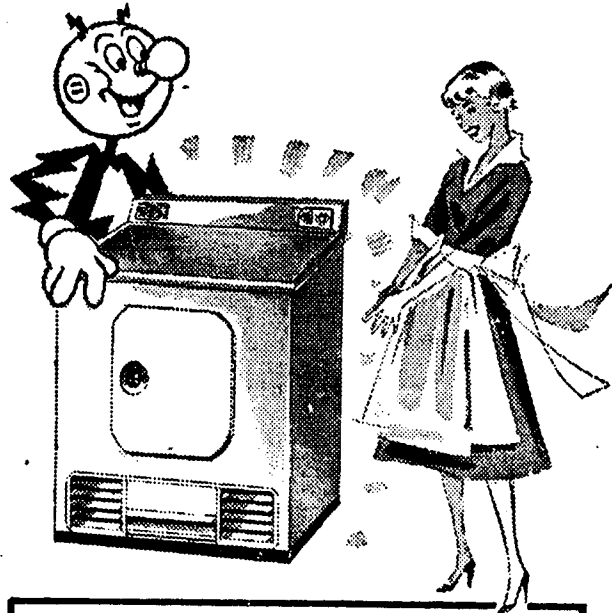

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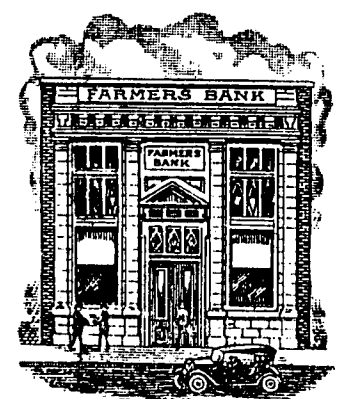
