The highlight of the afternoon was an interesting demonstration of "Food On The Job For You," given by Marjorie Eldridge and Irene Milard.

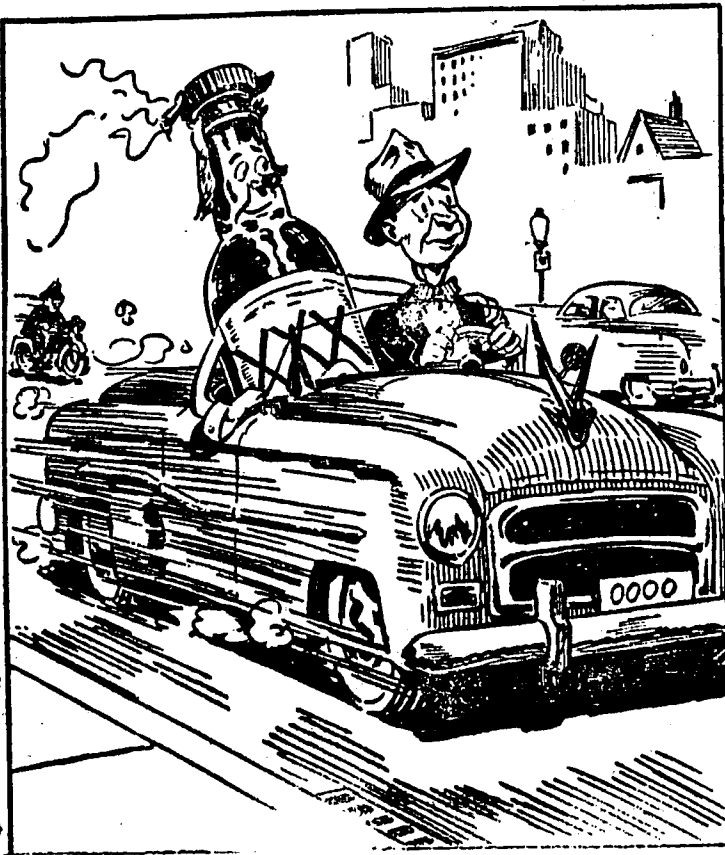
The next meeting has been postponed until May 12, and will be at the home of Ada Cain.

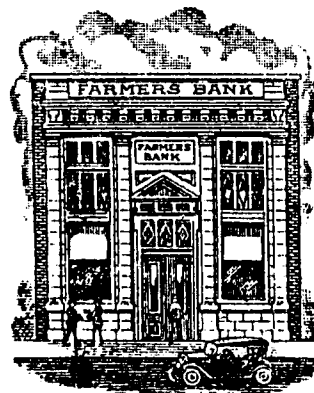

BEN AN IDEAL DRIVER

We all like to point to a person and say: "There's an ideal man because . . ." and then go on to tell why he is an outstanding or unusual person.

In this matter of driving, there are certain requirements to be an ideal. We need more of this type of driver on the road these days, for the accident rate is steadily rising. It is only through the development of these ideal qualities that we will be able to see a decrease in the killings and injuries on the roads.

The first requirement to be an ideal operator is to know the laws and to obey them. Every driver has a slight knowledge of the laws of the state, especially if he has been properly licensed to operate a vehicle in the State of Idaho. However, a brief knowledge of the laws is not enough to become an ideal driver. Every person who wants to become a good driver should study the Idaho Motor Vehicle Law Manual which is available to anyone and can be secured through the department of law enforcement. The manual will explain every phase of the laws of the state which concern your driving.

The next requirement to be an

ideal driver is that you extend every courtesy of the road to all other vehicle operators and pedestrians. It is quite evident that courtesy is very much lacking in a good many drivers these days. The other fellow may not have the right of way, but it will often prevent an accident if you will let him go through an intersection ahead of you. Courtesy includes defensive driving also, and the defensive driver is always ready to let the other fellow get ahead of him in order to keep out of trouble.

The third requirement for an ideal driver is to keep your car under control at all times. Pass other vehicles cautiously, with due regard for everybody's safety. Keep on your own side of the road at all times unless passing another vehicle. This will eliminate curve cutting, which causes so many of our "squappie" accidents. Very little time is gained by cutting in and out, and the danger of an accident is extreme.

The next requirement for an ideal driver is to use your dimmer switch when a car is approaching, or when you come up behind another car at

night. Bright lights ahead and behind are not only annoying, but very dangerous. Another good practice is to pump your foot brakes when stopping, thereby flashing your tail lights and giving an adequate warning to cars following. All signals for turns and stops should be given clearly and well ahead of the point of turning or stopping. These are not only good manners — they are the law.

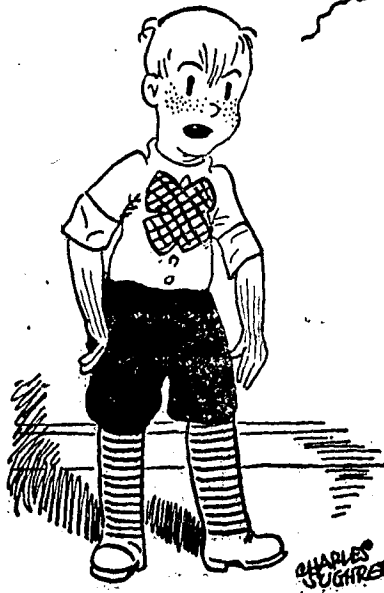
An ideal driver will reduce his speed on wet and slippery roads, and by so doing will keep his car well under control. He will drive according to the road conditions and his visibility, and not according to the speedometer. He will follow other cars at a safe distance, extending the space during bad weather.

It is not difficult to become an ideal driver, but it does take a bit of thinking and common sense. For your own sake and the sake of the other motorists on the road, take time to be safe and extend safety to others. Be an ideal driver.
