Dean Theophilis offered no panacea for present situations, but told, rather, how they had been brought about. His talk was strictly "down to earth," and enjoyed.

A motion was introduced approving the "Bruce's Eddy" and "Penny Cliff Dams" on the Clearwater rivers, and asking that they be allowed to be built by private enterprise. This was carried without a single dissenting vote.
