How High Can They Get

Going on down the street this same truck tore down the power wires that serve the Union Oil Service in the west part of town, leaving them unable to pump gasoline, etc., until power was again restored.

J. F. Jordan, deputy sheriff happened to be in town — and took after the culprit, who was lucky enough to "sneak" through Juliaetta. A measurement of his load showed it to be well over the lawful 14 feet, and he was thereupon issued a citation.

We are told by a very reliable source that the Potlatch Telephone Co. and the Washington Water Power Co. were approached by one "gyppo logging operator", who offered to pay the costs of raising all the power and phone lines through Kendrick and Juliaetta in order that he might haul excess loads, in direct and admitted violation of the law.

Herman and Otto Schupfer inform us that all wires now across the streets of Kendrick and Juliaetta are well above the legal 14-foot height, so anything striking them is in excess of lawful height.

## A Time to Remember

I bowed my head reverently with the rest of my classmates during the "moment of silence" in tribute to our soldier-dead, then seeing Old Glory waving from the flag pole on the lawn of our Alma Mater, I stood tiptoe upon a dream and thought, "What a lucky girl you are to be born under that flag, for you can be what you will to be! You are an American."

Then a strange thing happened. The flag seemed to be a living thing with a soul. I heard the silent singing of its stars on its blue of truth, and listening, my soul caught this refrain:

"I am the symbol of America, and America is more than its hills and prairies with their herds and fields of grain; more than its pulsing cities, its mines and its mills . . . America is you and you and you . . . and God.

"I am the symbol of the homes, the churches, schools, enterprises, and the kingly commoners of America.

"I represent your heritage from the past. Look at me and hear the tramping of soldier-feet in the immortal march for freedom; feel within your hearts the 'Spirit of '76'; see the footprints in the snow at Valley Forge; the great, gaunt commoner on his knees in prayer, and the crimson stain, spreading, that meant life was ebbing from his great heart; see the crosses above our youth, martyrs to freedom in recent wars. Look again and behold lilies blooming where men gave life for man; listen and hear the joyous dancing footsteps of those yet unborn.

"Behold the Open Gate, before which stand weary pilgrims: children with eyes empty of laughter; youth burdened with the weight of dead dreams; the elder ones their eyes but burned out embers, their bone-lean hands caressing gaunt throats that too long have felt the choking leash of fear. See their eyes re-light with hope as they view the green acres of democracy and reverently enter the gate of America."

Suddenly I knew: The flag is an emblem of freedom, protection, justice, honor, sacrifice, opportunity to all and love for country, fellowman and God. It is the symbol, not only of our heritage from the past but of the future. I knew that it is up to me to help America continue to mean to coming generations what it means to me today; that every right has its concomitant duty, that I must train myself to be able to choose leaders wisely and judge their performance with honesty and understanding. I must fight oppression, intolerance, injustice and keep the land free of the footprints of communism. I must guard the rights of others as jealously as I do my own, and recognize in every man a brother.

Again I looked at the flag waving serenely beneath our peaceful country sky and reverently I breathed, "How much you stand for!" Was I dreaming or did I hear, "The earth a great DEMOCRACY OF LOVE!"

### BRITISH AND AMERICAN COAL-AUTO INDUSTRIES

A team of British fuel experts recently came to the United States in search of methods whereby utilization of Britain's coal reserves could be improved. They visited numerous U. S. industrial plants. And, their tour concluded, they decided that two of the reasons why American industry's efficiency in the use of fuel

surpasses that of Britain are that American management fosters pride in achievement, and that both management and workers are willing and ready to try new ideas.

A good example of this efficiency is found in coal-burning electric plants. In 1920, it required an average of three pounds of coal to generate one kilowatt-hour of electricity. By 1952, this had been cut to 1.1 pounds and in some plants as little

as three-quarters of a pound. This kind of progress in efficiency of utilization has its counterpart in the coal mines themselves. Expanded mechanization and better methods have sharply increased productivity. In 1934, according to the National Coal Association, output per man averaged 4.4 tons per day. In 1953 it was eight tons — almost double. And, incidentally, that achievement is reflected in the very high daily wages and the many fringe benefits the miners now enjoy.

The coal industry is typically American in its determination to do an ever-better job, to the benefit of all concerned. And, as the British fuel experts observed, this determination "which permeates the whole fabric of life in the United States" comes from the "ambition to achieve a better standard of living." In simple words, it's the old story of the profit-motive. People work best when there is hope of profit — that applies to industries as well as individuals.

Sharing The Production Gains  
A visitor to England tells of an interesting experience while looking through the famous Jaguar Automobile plant at Coventry. When the noon whistle blew a great majority of the workmen continued to finish some operation they were on rather than lay down their tools on the instant. In fact, several minutes after the whistle quite a number here and there were still putting on finishing touches. An air of interest and efficiency was apparent.

In our country the production workers of a major Toledo, Ohio, automobile manufacturer and their UAW-CIO union deserve commendation on the announcement that they have voted themselves a pay cut in order to bring their company's labor costs into a better competitive position with other automobile manufacturers. It is stated that the almost unanimous vote may cost the workers as much as 10 percent of their present pay, part of which may recover later if a new bonus-pay plan can be worked out.

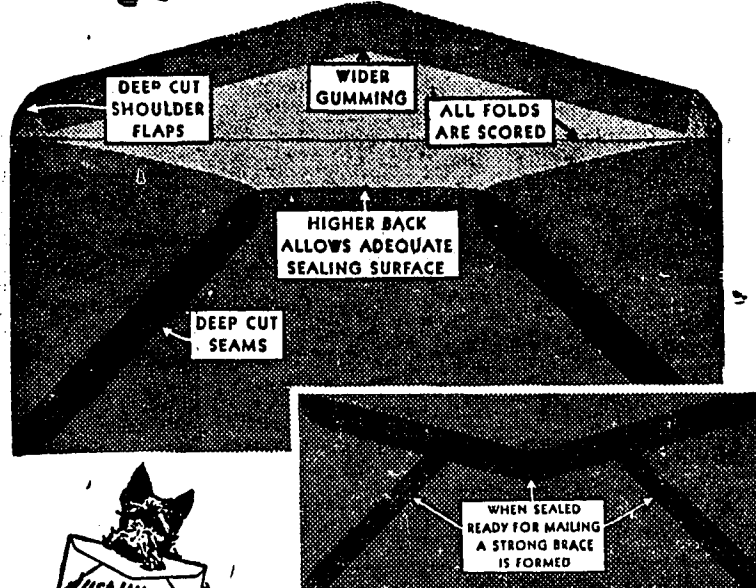
What was observed in England could well result in this plant. It is a healthy sign when labor takes this kind of an interest in management and it is hoped that in this case and others like it, all concerned will gain. — Industrial News Review.

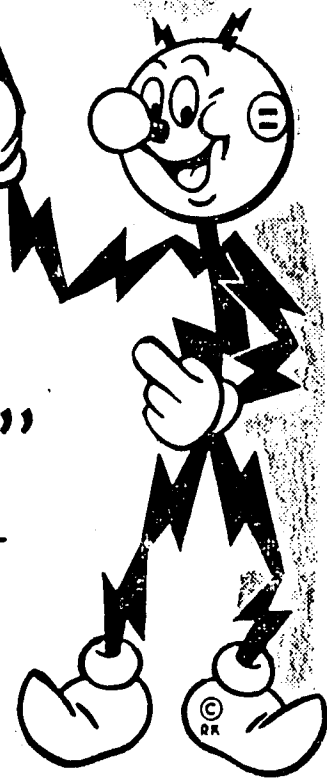

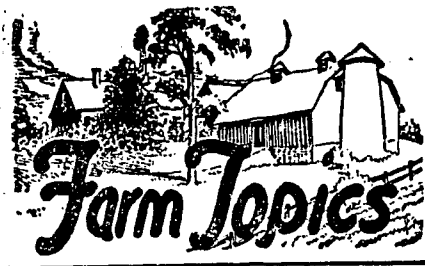

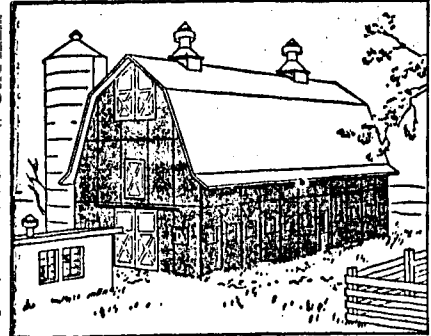

### Building Program Far Behind Schedule All-Purpose Barn Has Priority on Many Farms

Although American farmers have undertaken considerable construction in recent years, the farm building program is still far behind schedule. Farm authorities report that farm buildings have a high average age, with the average all-purpose barn dating back to 1910.

For this reason the all-purpose building has first priority with many farmers who are interested in greater labor efficiency and a



better return on their farm investment.

The building pictured above is 48 feet long, 34 feet wide and 35 high. In addition to being soundly planned—subject to the individual farmer's own requirements—it will make a pleasing addition to most farmsteads.

The floor plan shows six cow stalls on either side of a driveway. Also provided in connection with the dairy sections, and mangers, feed alleys and gutters for each group. The second floor is a hay-mow. Revisions to suit any farmer's particular needs can be incorporated readily by the builder.

### 'Chemical Eye' Reproduces Reactions of Human Eye

A group of scientists has recently created a "chemical eye" in a test tube, in which certain chemicals reproduce all the chemical reactions that take place in the human eye when it sees in dim light. These scientists, headed by Dr. George Wald of Harvard University, have also produced in the test tube electrical changes such as occur in vision.

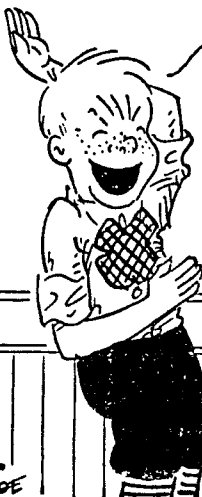
The retina or back-screen of the eye contains two types of nerve ends—the cones, which are used for daylight seeing, and the rods, which are used in near-darkness. The rods contain a rosy, light-sensitive substance called rhodopsin which is necessary for vision in dim light. Rhodopsin is made directly from Vitamin A, and this is normally present in high concentration in the retina. An inadequate supply of Vitamin A causes night blindness.

Bright light bleaches rhodopsin, so that the eye loses its ability to see in dim light. But darkness reforms the rhodopsin, and sensitivity is regained. The "chemical eye" demonstrated how this continuous cycle works: In the dark Vitamin A is converted into retinene, which combines with a substance called opsin to form rhodopsin. In the light, rhodopsin bleaches back to retinene and opsin, and the retinene again becomes Vitamin A.

The "chemical eye" studies are expected to bring about a better understanding of how vision works, and consequently better means of preserving it. They include experiments which seek to solve the mystery of how the bleaching of rhodopsin stimulates the retina's nerve cells electrically so that vision is transmitted to the brain by way of the optic nerve.

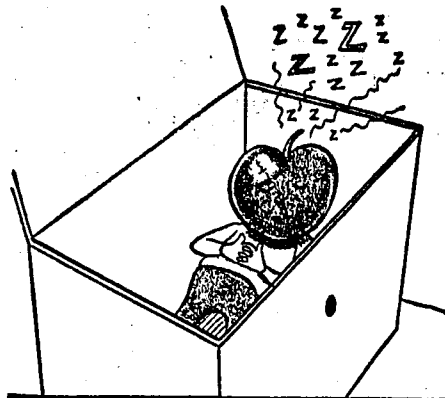

### Controlled Storage Keeps Apples Prime Regulated Atmosphere System Is Recommended

The answer to whether apples will taste as good in May as they do in September is "yes"—if they are apples from specially constructed controlled-atmosphere storage. That is the opinion of Prof. R.M. Smock, of Cornell university's agricultural experiment station.

More than 100,000 bushels of apples are in 15 such storages in New York state, the first of their kind in the country. "When they come

out in April or May or June," Smock says, "the apples are expected to be of prime quality."

Results of 10 years of experiments show that controlled-atmosphere storage will double the ordinary storage life of McIntosh, provided the rooms are properly constructed and operated. Good results also were obtained with Delicious and Northern Spy when the varieties were stored separately.

### Sweet Potatoes Make Valuable Farm Crop

Many North Carolina farmers who have never planted sweet potatoes for market should be able to increase their farm income this year through the cultivation and sale of this root crop, according to H. M. Covington, extension horticulture specialist for the state college extension service.

The U.S. department of agriculture has requested farmers to increase their production of sweet potatoes by 12 per cent. Even if such an increase is planted, production would still be about 10 per cent under the 1937-46 annual average.

Farmers who plan to increase their sweet potato acreage this year to have some for sale, should consider market outlets before planting, Covington states.

### Automatic Defroster



A household device which automatically defrosts the refrigerator and is a fine electric clock has been put on the market.

The defroster, the company stated, eliminates the housewife's periodic, usually messy defrosting chores which are so often put off until she finds time and a thick, insulating coat of frost has accumulated on the freezing unit.

Automatically, the defroster turns the refrigerator off at 1 a.m. each day, and then, again automatically, switches it back on after the thin skin of frost is removed from the unit.

During the shut-off periods, moisture created by the melting film is circulated through the box.

With the defroster, which is a precision timing instrument, any electric refrigerator, old or new, easily can be made self-defrosting.

### Chlordane Is Effective Ant, Cockroach Killer

The newest and most effective insecticide against cockroaches and certain kinds of ants is "chlordane."

Two-per cent chlordane sprays, with oil or water base, now are for sale in many department, drug and hardware stores.

These sprays leave an invisible, odorless film on surfaces to kill pests which come in contact with it.

### Bridges Nearing Completion

On the Kendrick bridge and approaches all work is complete with the exception of placing concrete curbs, gutters and catch basins and the placing of the oil pavement. Concrete work is now well under way and the oil pavement awaiting the coming of warmer weather.

On the Julietta bridge and approaches grading operations are still under way. The bridge itself is complete. Grading should be completed this coming week and the placing of crushed rock surfacing will follow. Oil pavement will be laid, but must await more suitable weather.

Potlatch Creek Very Low  
Potlatch creek is very low for this

season of the year. As an indication quite a number of the Juniors and Seniors who took part in "Hill Day" activities last week waded it just above the mouth of Bear Creek rather than take the long-way back to town. It is seldom that this can be done at this season of the year.

In contrast, the Clearwater river is rising rapidly, backed by a heavy snow pack in the drainage of that stream, and some fears are felt that it may reach flood stage should the hot, dry weather continue.

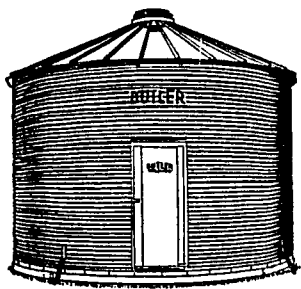
