**SEN. TAYLOR RAPS FRAME-UP OF '12'**

DETROIT, Aug. 1 — Sen. Glen Taylor, vice presidential candidate of the Progressive Party told newsmen yesterday that he does not believe the Communist Party is guilty of a conspiracy and that the indictment against its national leaders is a new tack by the warmongers.

Taylor referred to the constitution of the Communist Party as a document available to all, and states the party's aims and objectives and advised reporter to read it.

Taylor pointed out that the deplorable situation in Berlin was the U. S. government's fault. Supposing, he said, the Russians occupied part of Paris, France, and our country occupied the remainder and they dumped in money and saboteurs from Fund X. What would you do?

And that's exactly what our government is doing in Germany. They are setting up a government of cartellists, they are dumping money and saboteurs into Germany and then they blame the Russians, Taylor said.

"I am also convinced that the so-called Communists of China are rather mild socialists with a program of agrarian reform; that they make a sincere effort of honest government in the areas they hold, and that they have the confidence of the Chinese people."

**TAYLOR SAYS U. S. 'MOST DESPISED' OF NATIONS**

14,000 CHEER BLASTS AT MILITARY LEADERS

(From Citizen News — Hollywood, California)

Sen. Glen H. Taylor of Idaho, Henry Wallace's running mate on the communist-supported third party ticket told 14,000 persons last night that the United States has become "the most despised nation on earth."

Our generals and admirals, he told the cheering audience, are provoking a war with Russia to save their jobs. They have the support, he said, of Wall Street and the Truman administration.

"I don't believe that Russia wants to fight anybody," Taylor shouted. "They have no big corporation boys that get rich off of war. I believe that they are convinced that we want to fight them. I don't mean we who are here tonight; I mean the big corporation boys that get rich off of war."

**The Blue Flashing Light**

Once again the winter season has arrived. No doubt you have felt the chilly winds, seen the snow fall, and maybe you have skidded upon icy roads.

We, of the Department of Highways, have a serious message for you which we feel you should read.

The department has a job to do during the coming months of snow and ice. We need your cooperation as a motorist in order that we may get the job done without hazard to you and to the department employees.

As you drive down the road this winter, you will often come upon

snow plows and sanding trucks operating during bad weather to make your trip safer. These trucks will be equipped with a blue flashing light, which is to inform you that there is snow removal equipment operating along the roadway. The department has equipped these vehicles with the blue light. It is standard throughout the nation. These snow plows are a type of emergency equipment in many cases, but we have not installed red lights as they are confined to ambulances and police cars and to fire equipment.

When you see a piece of equipment with the blue flashing light operating along the roadway, you should decrease your speed, for they are not out there unless there is a hazardous condition existing. Pass with caution, for these heavy trucks can be stopped very quickly by a snow drift or they can skid more readily than you in your car.

If you are following one of our snow plows or sanding trucks, stay a safe distance behind them. They may have to stop and back up to take another run at a drift, or they may have to take another swipe in order to properly clear the road. Last year we had ten accidents because the cars following the plows were too close and hit the plow when it stopped suddenly. We also had eight accidents last winter when our plows backed into cars that had pulled right up behind them when the plow stopped and the driver found it necessary to back up to hit the drift again.

We are encouraging our operators to use every precaution and safety measure to protect the public; still there are many times when the accidents have been caused by the carelessness of the motorists. We do not want these accidents to happen. We feel that there is a responsibility on your part as well as ours.

There are many sections of the country that conditions make it necessary for the snow plows to operate on both sides of the road. These locations are posted with signs, and it is necessary that you drive

with extra caution and care in these areas. Also, every driver should be extra cautious when he comes into a canyon section. Poor visibility conditions and only a slight distance may conceal a snow plow — perhaps on the wrong side of the road, until you are right on it, if you are not alert. — Dwight Crofford.

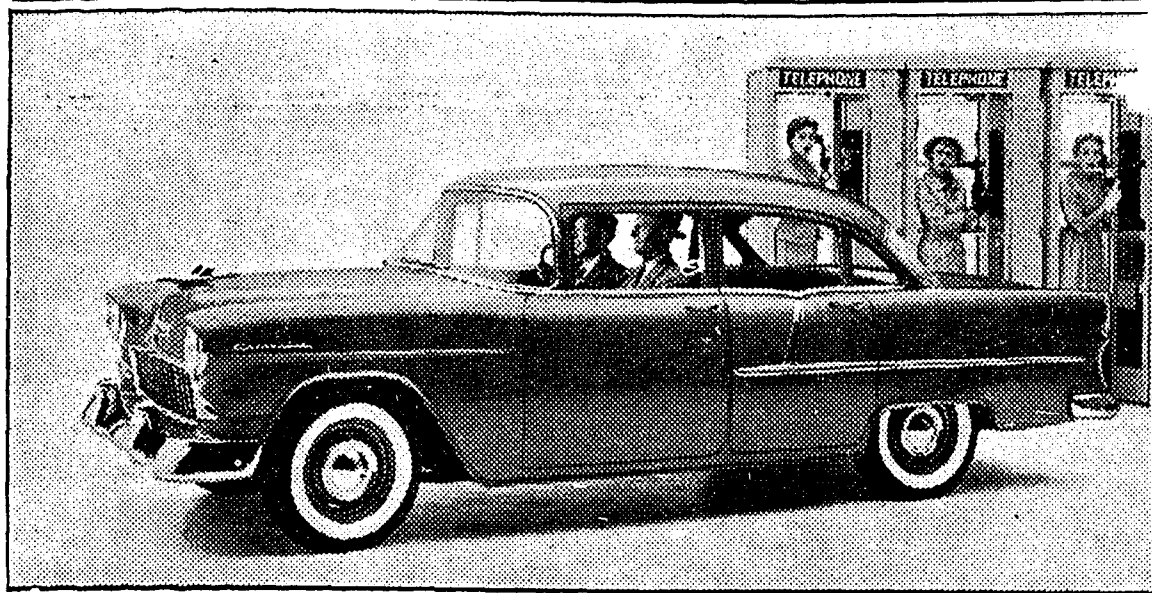

## Longer, Lower Lines Grace Latest Chevrolets

### WHERE HIGHER FEDERAL INCOME TAXES WOULD HIT

Some cold statistics on income and taxes are playing an important part in dissuading Washington from imposing any further Federal tax increases on the American people this year.

These statistics, prepared by the staff of the Joint Committee on Internal Revenue Taxation of the Congress, show that if the government intends to extract substantial new revenues from the people for federal spending, it must look to sources other than the upper income groups to obtain them. The figures reveal that the steep tax rates now in effect have just about dried up these once abundant sources of revenue.

The statistics go far to corroborate the recent statement of Chairman Walter George of the Senate Finance

Committee, who said: "I am convinced that we have already reached the point of diminishing returns, so far as the income tax is concerned, and that any further revenue to be raised must come from an entirely new form of taxation."

Here are some of the striking facts revealed by the Joint Committee's statistics:

If the Federal government were to confiscate all taxable income earned by individuals in excess of \$100,000 a year — that is, if the government were to impose a 100 percent tax on all taxable income any person receives over that amount — it would yield a total of only \$34,000,000 of additional federal revenue. With Uncle Sam proposing to spend \$85.4 billion next year, the \$34 million would be enough to run the government for only 3 1/2 hours of a single day!

If the government were to confiscate all taxable income earned by individuals in excess of \$26,000 a year, the increase in revenue would be only \$637 million. This additional sum would be enough to finance barely three days of federal operations under a \$85.4 billion budget!

If the government were to confiscate all taxable income earned by individuals in excess of \$10,000 a year, the additional tax revenue would amount to \$3.1 billion. This would be enough to run the government for two weeks under the proposed 1953 spending program.

If Uncle Sam were to confiscate all taxable income earned by individuals in excess of \$6,000 a year, the revenue increase would be a little less than \$6 billion. It would only pay for about half of the \$10 1/2 billion which the president proposes to spend for foreign aid alone in 1953.

Let these figures strain the credulity of some, here is the way they are arrived at, taking the \$100,000 income figures as an example:

Current estimates indicate the total taxable income over \$100,000 received by individuals is \$387 million. The combined normal and surtax liability against this \$387 million under the present tax law is \$353 million, which means that only \$34 million is left for further taxation!

These figures help to make one thing clear, that any substantial increase hereafter made in individual income taxes will come from the source where the bulk of the remaining taxable income is to be found, namely, the 42 1/2 million people reporting incomes of less than \$10,000.

Estimates of the Joint Committee on Internal Revenue Taxation show that those earning \$10,000 or less account for 74.8 percent of the \$70.7 billion in taxable income left after taxes under present rates.

That the millions of income earners

in the lower and middle brackets are already feeling the pinch of high taxation is demonstrated in a recent study by the economist, Dr. Rufus S. Tucker. His study showed that, on the basis of 1948 figures, persons earning between \$2,000 and \$2,999 were paying out 23.9 percent of their income in federal, state and local taxes combined, both direct and indirect. Persons earning \$3,000 to \$3,999 were paying 25 percent, persons earning \$4,000 to \$4,999, 26.3 percent; persons earning \$5,000 to \$7,499, 28.3 percent; and persons earning \$7,500 to \$9,999, 31.1 percent. Social security taxes were included in these computations.

Suffice to say, the greatly increased Federal tax rates now in effect boost all these percentages.

What the foregoing statistics show above all else is that the large population of Americans in the lower and middle income brackets have an important stake in the federal economy-versus-spending issue, because it is they who will inevitably bear most of the burden of increased Federal taxation from here on. With Federal rates on high incomes now running up to 92 percent, little remains to be taken from that source.

It must be kept in mind that all taxes are paid by the people. They may be paid directly, as in the case of income taxes, or indirectly, as in the case of levies on corporations. Corporation taxes are passed on to stockholders through reduced dividends and to the consuming public through increased prices. In any event, people in all income brackets share the ultimate burden of all taxation.

Let us take a look at the road along which Federal income taxation has taken us since the income tax amendment was made a part of our Constitution in 1913. Here are a few pertinent observations:

Under 1915 tax laws a family of four had to have a net income as high as \$58,000 before being required to pay a Federal income tax of \$1,000. By 1930 the rates had increased to a point where \$1,000 tax was paid on a \$25,000 income. By 1940 a \$1,000 tax was paid on an income of \$14,200. Under 1952 tax laws a \$1,000 income tax is paid on an income of \$6,850.00.

In 1915 a family of four with a net income of \$5,000 paid \$10 Federal tax. In 1940 the tax on the same income was \$74.80. Under 1952 laws the tax is \$577.20.

On a \$10,000 net income the tax liability for a family of four was \$60 in 1915; \$83.25 in 1930; \$449 in 1940, and will be \$1,773.60 in 1952.

If the inflationary trend since 1940 is taken into account, one comes up with these additional startling statistics:

In 1940 a family of four with a \$5,000 net income had \$4,925.20 left for the household budget after paying its federal income tax of \$74.80. But in 1952 the same family with the same income will have only \$4,422.80 left after paying its \$577.20 income tax, and this \$4,422.80 will be worth only \$2,344 in 1940 dollars, since the current dollar is worth only 53c as compared with the 1940 dollar.

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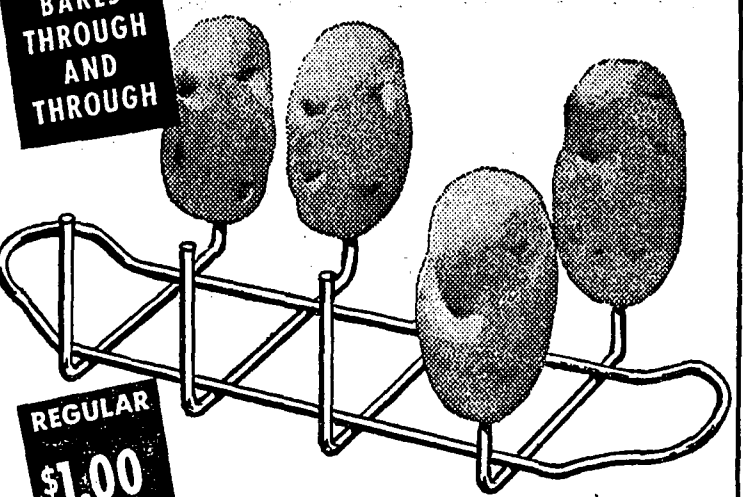

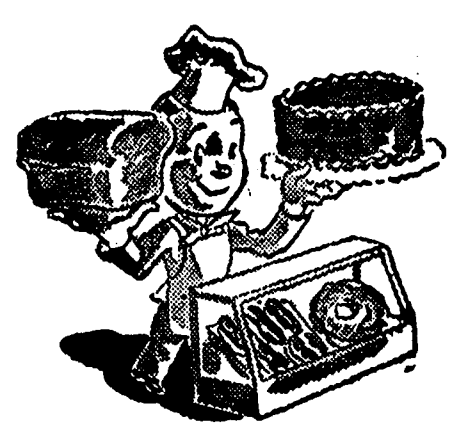

**State Highway Report**

Lewiston, Oct. 16 — Fifty-nine miles of roadwork has been started in District Four by state forces, using some rented equipment. These projects are: Kooskia to Syringa Creek, 16 miles; Pierce to Headquarters, 14 miles, and Potlatch Junction to Elmida, 29 miles. The work to be done on these projects is to widen and stabilize the road bed, resurface with crushed rock and place a twenty-four-foot oiled surface on the roadway. It is planned to do the grading and surfacing of the projects during the winter months and have them ready for oiling as soon as weather permits next spring. This is one more step by the Highway department to reduce the mileage of gravel roads in the district and to eliminate dusty conditions on our secondary highways. At the present time we have 305 miles of gravel roads in this district and when these three projects are completed it will reduce the mileage to 246. It is proposed to continue with this program every year until there will not be any graveled roads on the highway system within this district.

Construction work continued on seven projects throughout the district the past week. On the Ahsahka-Kendrick project grading continued at a slow pace due to equipment breakdowns. Surfacing is being placed on the Kendrick end of the project, and a multi-plate arch culvert is being installed at Louse Creek. The project is 44 percent complete. The Lewiston-East project is nearing completion. All items are com-

plete except the oiling and cleaning up.
