**Kendrick Wins Second Place**  
Kendrick scored in the final three minutes of play for a 27-20 Second District Eight-man prep football win over Pierce here Friday evening under the lights. The two teams were battling for second place in league play.

The second touchdown pass thrown by Jim Poindexter of Pierce and Lewis Turcott's throw to Mike Engle for extra point had deadlocked the count at 20-all with four minutes remaining. Poindexter also ran for one tally, Mike Engle and Turcott were his touchdown targets.

Jim Armitage scored the vital Kendrick touchdown from the one, his third tally of the day. The others were a 75-yard scamper and a lateral from Roger Christensen he carried 60 yards — on a play which started with a pass from John Merrick to Christensen.

Pierce had two touchdowns nullified by penalties and Kendrick lost a score the same way.

## Theater Being Remodeled

America's more than five million farmers are being asked to cooperate with Bureau of the Census, department of Commerce, in the 1954 census of agriculture which is now under way. This census is the 16th in a series of nationwide farm canvasses since the first farm census in 1840 — over 100 years ago.

In most states, copies of the census questionnaire were mailed to farm operators in advance of the enumeration, which began early in October and will continue into December. The starting date for the census was set for the close of the normal crop harvesting season in each area. Questionnaires to be used in the different areas have been designed to cover the crops commonly produced in those areas, while a number of questionnaires common to all farms were included in each variation of the questionnaire. In seven southern states where the share-cropper system is followed, the questionnaire was delivered in person by the enumerators to assure the consolidation of reports for multi-unit farms.

The mail questionnaire used in most of the states was accompanied by a letter from Robert W. Burgess, director of the Bureau of the Census. This letter requested each individual farm operator to fill in the answers and have the completed questionnaire ready for the enumerator when he or she calls.

The census-questionnaire is designed to collect information about the number and size of farms, tenure, acreage of land in various uses, crops harvested, livestock inventory and production, expenditures for selected items (labor hire, machine hire, feed, fertilizers and lime, gasoline and other petroleum fuels and oils) inventory of selected facilities and equipment (television, food freezers, piped running water, tractors, harvesting machines, automobiles, trucks, etc), irrigation, conservation practices, farm value, mortgage debt and cash rent. On the average each farmer was asked about 100 questions, most of which could be answered by the simple checking of "yes" or "no".

**You Can Hunt By Permission**

The Idaho Fish and Game department this week reminded hunters that obtaining permission to hunt on private land is more than mere courtesy in Idaho.

"The trespass laws in this state are unusually explicit in regard to hunting on cultivated or fenced private lands," E. Klies Brown, chief of information and education, said. "Hunting by permission is the only kind of hunting that is technically legal on such lands in Idaho." Brown cited two sections of the Idaho code. One makes any person hunting with dog or gun on "cultivated or enclosed lands of another without permission" responsible to the owner for "all damages." The other establishes penalties for hunting without permission on posted lands, but also provides that "if the owner or his salaried employees or tenant is residing upon" such cultivated and enclosed lands, "he shall not be required to post warning

**Overseas Mailing Time At Hand**

The mail-early-for-Christmas campaign was opened at the local post-office this week, when Fred Stedman announced dates for overseas mailing of packages.

"Owing to the long sea transit frequently involved in the transmission of parcels by surface means and to customs inspection and other formalities to which parcels may be sub-

jected in the countries of destination. It is recommended that mailings be made as early as practicable to assure delivery by Christmas Day," Mr. Stedman advised.

"Senders can be reasonably sure that parcels mailed not later than deadlines announced, will reach their destination before Christmas." Deadlines for this "reasonable assurance of delivery on time are: Nov. 1, for mail to Africa and the Near East, and Nov. 15 for mail to South and Central America and to Europe."

**Paul Dammarell Injured**

Paul Dammarell was injured Wednesday morning while working at the Dammarell & McKeever rock crusher, now operation on the Ahshaka grade.

A rock caught under the conveyor belt, and as Mr. Dammarell reached to remove it, his right arm was caught and badly twisted. He also received two broken ribs.

He was brought to Kendrick immediately, where Dr. Christensen administered first aid, and he was then sent to the Gritman hospital at Moscow in an ambulance for X-rays and further treatment.
