



# Government Ownership Opposed

It is just a little over 75 years ago that a small gathering of observers focused their eyes on a little glass bulb which an inventor had devised after many trials, says National Geo-graphic News Bulletin. Suddenly the bulb gave off a glow. The inventor was Thomas A. Edi-

son. The bulb was the first incadescent lamp. During the first succeed-ing year, 35,000 bulbs were sold. During that time, a 60-watt bulb cost \$1.25. Remember, that was a time when \$1.25 was a lot of money.

Humans today take as a matter of course the great boon the incadescent lamp brought them. They pay homage to the wizard brain that brought that lamp into being. A little more than two months later, on Dec. 30, 1879, a public demonstra-tion of Edison's light was held at his Menlo Park, N. J., laboratory. Visitors came by the thousands. Railroads ran special trains to ac-comodate them. Edison had become famous for his incadescent lamp alone. There is, however, another feature Humans today take as a matter of

There is, however, another feature of the advent of the revolutionary lighting system frequently overlooked by our present generation. Edison was not a man of great means. Funds in large quantities had

to come from other sources if the people across the nation were to have

people across the nation were to have the new light's available. That's where "big business" step-ped in. J. Pierpont Morgan, the famed financial wizard of those days, organ-ized the Edison Electric Light com-any to manufacture Edison's new light. The company was organized in 1878. The following wear Edison's inven-

The following year Edison's inven-tion had been further perfected and was ready for the type of use it has

was ready for the type of use it has today. The political spellbinder is wont to attack "Big Business" simply be-cause it is big. What is overlooked is the fact that it takes mammoth enter-prizes to do the mammoth job of fill-ing the wants of a huge population— at prices they can afford to pay. The Edison Elictric Light company made huge profits for those who had ventured their money in an untested field. By mass production, however, the company vastly reduced the cost to the public and, equally important, made it possible to supply the public's demand. demand.

Power begets power, in the eco-nomic field, political field, or any other.

It is the duty of government to regulate powerful business enterprises to prevent unfair trade practices and to prevent the public from being

sighted than to strangle "Big Busi-ness" as we know it and turn the task of providing for the public's wants over to men and women trained in political maneuvering but neo-phytes in practical business organi-zation — as are most government of phytes in practical business organi-zation — as are most government of-ficials, regardless of party affiliation. That's why we are so dead set against Socialism, even greater gov-ernment ownership or the centrali-zation of industrial power in the bands of government as a means of hands of government as a means of seeking the much-touted "cradle-to-

the-grave' security. Despotism, higher and higher tax-ation and monumental inefficiency is bound to be the price we pay for such a starry-eyed venture. --- FS. Grants Pass (Ore) Courier.

Listen closely, my friend: Have you ever had to walk to a door and ring a bell and say, "Your husband has been in an accident, he is unconscious -I'm sorry." Have you ever stood by and watched the face of a person who has just realized that he has killed someone in the other car? Have you ever picked up the limp form of a child from under the wheels of a vehicle? A child who, just a few moments ago was full of life and energy, with a bright future ahead picked up the scattered lunch and books? Have you ever heard the cries of pain and agony from the crushed body as it waits for death to relieve the torture? Have you ever looked stark, naked tragedy in the face? 
# Ice Skating Threatened


