Many polio cases in Idaho, stricken in former years, still require medical treatment so that they may be able to return to a near normal life. Polio patients' needs range from complete hospitalization to out-patient visits at clinics or treatment centers."

Mr. Imhoff pointed out that polio is one of the most expensive diseases to treat, medical expenses for a respirator patient sometimes go in excess of \$20,000 in one year - a financial burden that cold only be afforded by the extremely wealthy. The

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


