The Senior High Girls' chorus presented a musical program that drew unanimous favorable comment.

The main topic of business centered around the recent legislative changes as they affect education.

**Trustees Meet**  
Last Friday Wilbur Tarbet, A. O. Kanikkeberg, Darwin Tarry, Gerald Ingle and R. D. Meserve attended a School Trustees meeting at the university. This meeting was called by the State Trustees association and the State Board of Education. The morning was devoted to a general meeting with talks by Elvon Hampton, Representative, Latah county, chairman of the Appropriations committee; Merle Stubbs, State Trustees association; Dr. Herman Snider, vice president, Idaho Congress of Parents and Teachers, and William Eimers, Idaho Education Association.

The afternoon was spent in sectional meetings, devoted to the following specific problems: "Local, State and Federal Relations," attended by Mr. Tarbet; "Administration of School Personnel," attended by Mr. Meserve; "School District Financial Administration," attended by Mr. Kanikkeberg; "School District Public Relations," attended by Mr. Ingle; "Improvements in School Transportation," attended by Mr. Tarry. These were "round-table" discussions where specific problems were presented and possible solutions discussed by all trustees present.

These meetings are held annually and all who attended agreed that they gained considerable valuable information concerning the best possible operation of our schools.

**Elementary Supervisor Visits**  
Miss Gertrude Eastman, State Elementary Supervisor, spent all day Monday in our schools. She spent the morning observing the Junior High school at work, and praised the smooth operation. She complimented the teachers and administration for the scheduling of allotted amounts of time to the various subject fields. Miss Eastman was particularly glad to see the more than average time that is allotted to the Language Arts.

In the afternoon she observed all six rooms at Juliaetta and then met with the teachers as a group after school. She pointed out the need for more materials to work with and urged that they be purchased as soon as the money was available. Miss Eastman emphasized that the students were getting a good foundation and that she was glad to see the emphasis on reading.

**Use Care In Pruning**  
One of the causes of poor fruit in the home orchards is lack of pruning. Good pruning is fairly easy, Elbert McCroun, county agent, said, if a few points are followed. Some of the fundamentals suggested by Tony Horn the horticulturist at the University of Idaho Extension Service, include:

Make close cuts so wounds can heal rapidly. Saw off water sprouts. Cut out crossing branches. Cut out drooping limbs rising from framework branches on the inside lower third of the tree. Remove outside branches that will lie on the ground due to weight of fruit at harvest time. Give entire tree a general thinning by removing some larger branches and thinning outside branches on others.

When thinning, take out the weak braches, leave the heavier ones. Take out branches near the center where fruit is difficult to reach with spray and color is generally poor. You can lower the tops of very tall trees by cutting back terminals to the outside side branches.

**Aid Came Too Late**  
Bonners Ferry — A hurried dash by truck, railroad speeder and boat saved a whitetail doe from drowning in the icy waters of the Kootenai river. Great Northern employes spotted the deer struggling in the water and notified Conservation Officer Paul Flinn. With the aid of a railroad crew, he managed to get a rope on the animal and get it into his boat. The men carried the exhausted animal to the speeder used to bring Flinn to the scene, and turned the deer loose in a sunny field.

A search next day by railroad men revealed the deer had died, apparently of exposure.

**Wind Takes Off Roofs**  
It seems some damage was done locally by the high wind of Tuesday morning. A portion of the roof was blown off the Hedler Building, adjoining the fire hall in the west part of town, and a portion of the roof on the Everett Fraser root cellar on the school house hill.

**Home From Hospital**  
Claud Jones was brought home from the St. Joseph's hospital at Lewiston Friday afternoon, where he had been a patient for several weeks, following surgery for a ruptured appendix.

He is reported as getting along fine, and is now able to be up and around the house.

**Regulations Ready**  
The license office of the Idaho State Fish and Game department has shipped 100,000 copies of the new fishing regulations out to authorized license vendors around the state. These regulations go into effect on April 1, and may be obtained without charge on request either to vendors or to the Boise headquarters of the Idaho Fish and Game department.

The Kendrick Highway District last week took delivery of a new 4-wheel-drive International truck from the Kendrick Equipment Co.

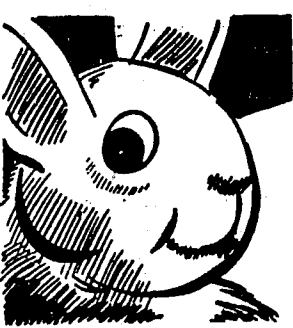
The new machine was immediately fitted out with a dump body and put to work hauling gravel into spots where the roads are breaking up.
