

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

## Silly? Of Course

We can sympathize with the Citizens For TVA.

It's nice to get cheap electricity when the taxpayers of Maine, California, Nevada (and Kings-

port) are helping pay for it.
So long as TVA can get Congress to dun the taxpayers of the 47 states to pay for power for Tennessee (excluding Kingsport), it's a dandy arrangement.
So small wonder the Citizens

For TVA are almost hysterical in their demands that more and more federal funds be poured into the system. Small wonder they don't want private enterprise getting into the act.

But they're going a bit too far when they suggest that Governor Frank Clement advise the 1955 Legislature to find ways and means to ban any Dixon Yates power from Tennessee.

Banning private power from a state because it would supplant state owned or socialist power is

bad business indeed.

Actually, the Dixon-Yates Combine is going to build a steamplant (in Arkansas, not Tennessee) which will help rev up TVA's power for use in Kentucky.

But the idea of a private power company getting a foot in the door at all is repulsive to the 'Citizens.'

Let's extend this reasoning to other things besides power.

Suppose the federal government had taken over the railroads in Tennessee. Passengers would ride cheap because Congress would be helping pay the costs.

Then suppose the system needed to expand. They wouldn't dare raise the fare because it was sup-

posed to be a "yardstick."

So Congress would be called upon to pour in more of the taxpayers' money.

But suppose the President decided to call upon the private rail-roads to help out and gave a contract to a private road.

A "Citizens For Public Rail-roads" would call upon the Legislature to ban the private railfoad from furnishing any service at all within Tennessee.

Silly, isn't it?
Of course it's silly but it's no more silly than what the Citizens For TVA are trying to do.





#### TVA Has Been Bottle Fed Too Long

President Eisenhower's budget shows a reduction of \$100 million in the public funds appropriated to the Tennessee Valley Authority. The only trouble with this cut is that it should have been made several years ago, because TVA is supposed to be "self-liquidating" in forty years. More than half the 40 years have passed, but this agency has not even begun to liquidate itself and still demands appropriations from Congress

every year to keep it going.

The apologists for TVA are continually harping on the piddling \$80 million that the agency has recently paid back to the Treasury In no single year, however, has TVA paid back as much as it got in new appropriation's of the taxpayers' money. Over the whole period the government has spent more than a billion dollars on TVA and has got back only a small part of that amount.

In the early days of TVA it was natural that the government should appropriate more money than it got back. But now that the agency has had twenty years to establish itself, and now that 60 per cent of its power is generated by steam plants, it is time for these annual handouts from the Treasury to stop. If TVA is ever going to pay its own way, it should be starting now.

If a private power company could go to Congress and get a slice of public money every time it needed a new steam plant, it would have no financial worries. Anybody could make a profit on a deal like that. Yet TVA complains that it can't balance its books even when it gets its steam plants free at the expense of the taxpayers. If it can't, there is some gross mismanagement.

President Eisenhower is not trying to kill TVA. Few responsible people are trying to kill it. Even the power companies generally agree that it would be impracticable to try to sell it to private industry. All that President Eisenhower is asking, all that the general public is asking of TVA is that it pay its own way.

If it can't pay its own way after receiving almost the whole of its capital investment as a free gift from the taxpayers, a thorough housecleaning should be made of its management, from top to





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
