



How to Cut the Debt

A simple plan is available whereby the public debt could be cut by 30 billions and the yearly bill for interest could be reduced nearly one billion dollars.

If congressmen had the courage of their convictions they would put it into effect.

The plan is merely to sell the government-owned enterprises connected with the TVA to private investors.

Dr. Clarence Manion, who was fired as chairman of the intergovernmental relations commission because the Republican ad-ministration refused to approve his campaign against socialism, points out that such a step would mean billions of dollars difference in the federal and state budgets for the area involved.

For not only would the debt be reduced, not only would the interest be reduced, but the properties would be put back on the tax rolls and as privately-owned insti-tutions they would pay property taxes to the states involved and would pay federal taxes involved and earnings, probably adding another billion to federal revenues.

Why do congressmen who give lip service to private enterprise hasten to add that they have no intention of abolishing TVA?

Dr. Manion points out that private enterprise is next to impos-sible in the TVA area. It is not creeping socialism but galloping socialism which grips the Tennes-see valley, and the same condi-tions will prevail in other sections of the country if we allow TVA to expand.

Dr. Manion says: "If we are really determined about our worldwide fight against socialistic slavery, the first place to underscore that determination is at home. Lincoln was right. Sooner or later our house will cease to be divided against itself: It will become all slave or all free."



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Investigate Hydroelectric Site Investigation of an 850-000-kilowatt hydroelectric development on the Snake river is planned by Pacific Northwest Power Co., in behalf of its four sponsor utilities, Kinsey M. Robinson, president, announced last week, with the filing of an application for a preliminary permit with the Federal Power Commission to study feasibility of constructing dams at the Mountain Sheep and Pleasant Valley sites in the states of Idaho and Ore-

Cost of the project, including trans-mission lines to load customers, is estimated to be in excess of \$2,000,000 all of which is to be furnished by private investment capital.

The proposed development would serve future growth needs of Pacific Power and Light, Washington Water Power, Montana Power, and Portland General Electric companies, organizers of the generating company.

Application for a preliminary per-mit on the sites were made, Robinson said, in order to authorize the company to make the necessary investigations, including drilling and preliminary engineering, prior to an application for license.

The Mountain Sheep project contemplates a 233-foot dam with installed generating capacity of 250,000 kilowatts. At Pleasant Valley, there would be a 429-foot dam with 600,000 kilowatts of generating capacity. The two Snake river sites are be-

low Hell's canyon and above the mouth of the Salmon and Imnaha rivers. Both are important streams for migratory fish and will be left unobstructed by the projects. The Pacific Northwest Power Co.

He called attention to the state law that makes it unlawful for anyone to sell seed that contains noxious weed seed. All seeds offered for sale must be tagged. The tag on each sack shows the purity of the seed and its germination. Tagged seed has been properly cleaned.

Dogs in the Manger

How sincere are our public, power spokesmen in seeking ample power for the Pacific Northwest and America?

The Hells Canyon dam controversy dragged into its second year because the public power people, in their insistence that only the federal government build dams and powerhouses, tried to put over a project which two Democratic congresses rejected.

1 Sen. Wayne Morse used his solitary vote to deprive unanimous consent for Priest Rapids dam over here on the Columbia and for Cougar dam in Oregon, just because a committee hurt his feelings by rejecting his amendments and because he resists the Eisenhower partnership idea. These projects were ideal examples of the partnership principle using both federal government and local agencies.

Sen. Magnuson sometimes sounds as if he would rather have no dams at all than to use private capital available for projects.

The public power spokesmen are dogging it when it comes to power development. Too many are obstructionists in the real dogin-the-manger style.
