It has now dwindled to 18.

The Cameron post office has been in constant operation the past 70 day, visiting his parents. years with the exception of nine months in 1919-1920, when the post master resigned, and was re-opened through the effors of the late A. H. Blum, a loyal Cameron booster, who operated a blacksmith shop there for
