JOINT MEETING OF LATAH C. OF C. AND LIONS CLUB

A joint meeting of the Latah County Chambers of Commerce and the Kendrick Community Lions Club was held here Wednesday evening, April 20, with the Grange Ladies serving a delicious turkey dinner to 98.
Following a very brief Lions Club meeting, presided over by Bob Magnuson, president, at which the names of candidates for the coming year were announced, the gavel was turned over to Gerald Ingle, president of the Latah Chambers of Commerce.
Mr. Ingle announced the annual Latah County Blood Drive was scheduled for Moscow May 10 and 11, and if sufficient interest was shown the Blood Bank would remain open one night.
Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved, and then the meeting was turned over to Joe Parker, the subject for the evening being "Highways."

Mr. Parker introduced Jack Phelps, State Highway engineer from Lewiston. Mr. Phelps told of coming road building activities in this section of the state which included: The 28 miles from Potlatch Junction to Emida; Deary to Bovill (rebuilding) 10 miles; Harvard to Deary, six miles; Bovill toward Elk River, a bridge, and four miles from Spalding toward Arrow Junction.
Adrian Nelson of Genesee, who attended the last Legislative session as a lobbyist, reported that under the new system of allocating funds from the state level, that highway districts and cities and villages would receive approximately the same amount as during 1954, but that in 1956 the amount would increase, as the new law did not become effective until May 1st. Increased license fees on all vehicles, as well as a different system of allocation, would account for the increase.

Mr. Nelson, aided by Mr. Phelps, told of the amount of wear that actually occurred on gravel roads, and the cost of maintenance on an average mileage basis. He lauded the work of the last legislature on raising car and truck license fees.
Harold Snow, Latah County Representative, and chairman of the state highway committee told of the great pressure put on for this and that item, not only of road construction, but for wider bunks, higher loads, etc., particularly for logging trucks. Mr. Snow said that none of these requests were granted — that license fees were increased — and the road construction program left to the Idaho State Highway Commission.
There followed about an hour of "open floor" questions and answers — and all agreed that this was one of the best and most enlightening meetings of the Chamber in many months.
The next meeting (May) will be held at Elk River.
Eugene Taylor brought forth round after round of applause from the group when he said it was his belief that the Juliaetta-Kendrick area was the only one so populous in the State of Idaho that could not get to their county seat on an oiled road and stay somewhere within reasonable limits, at least, of the county.

To Install New TV Equipment
George F. Brocke & Sons last week received partial delivery, by air express, of the very latest television equipment for use on their cable system into Kendrick. This new equipment meters the "inflow" of signals at the antenna, automatically stepping it up or cutting it down as the occasion may require, and fits in with various other items to assure proper relaying of signals to all users on the system.
This past week Jack Kuykendall and Paul Lind have been busy moving the big antennas on the hill south and west of town to new locations in order to get away from any reflection interference, installing new poles and wires to the antenna in preparation for the new regulators, which have not yet been installed, as a complete shipment was not made.
Monday night a great improvement was noted in the TV cable reception, due to relocation of the antenna, the new wires and careful regulation of present equipment, but Mr. Brocke says: "It will be as fine as anything you have ever seen when it is finally in place." All three channels, 6, 4 and 2, will be tuned in.

It was parked on the side street between the Kendrick Cafe and the Red Cross Pharmacy. The party or parties kicked in door, panels, side panels and the trunk lid. Then went into the car, smashed out the dome light, glass on the clock face, and inflicted other interior damage.
No clues have been found to the identity of the culprit or culprits.

CAMERON POSTOFFICE TO CLOSE APRIL 30; ERA'S END

The Cameron Post Office, one of the oldest in the State of Idaho, closes its window Saturday evening, April 30 for the last time, thus marking the passing of an era that holds many colorful memories.
The decision to close the Cameron Post Office was brought about by the recent changes made in the Postal department regarding the consolidation of routes, etc., in an effort to give the best service at a reduced cost to taxpayers.
Back in 1881, the first post office was established at Cameron, when a Mr. and Mrs. Edward W. Cameron of Colusa, Calif., who had been in the merchandise business, came north to this area. Here they built a log cabin (where Ed Mielke now lives) which served as a post office and small store. He filed homestead rights, and as near as can be ascertained, theirs was the first family to settle in this area. The community, of course, received its name from the Camerons.
Soon after the Camerons arrived other families started moving in, and the community grew fast. A log school house was put up, which also stood on what is now the Ed Mielke ranch. With a school, postoffice and store, a trading center was thus established and flourished until the village of Leland was founded. Mr. Cameron was a public spirited man, and also served as sheriff of Nezperce county at that time.
Wm. Freytag and Henry Wessels are two other families known to have been living in the area when Cameron first came into being.
The post office has been moved from place to place during the years it has served the people of the Cameron area. It used to be on the Otto Sillflow place, both as a store and post office, and was later moved to the August Brammer ranch, where between Mrs. Brammer and her husband, it has been operated since January 2, 1928.
In those first struggling frontier days mail came in from Moscow once or twice a month on horseback. Imagine the thrill of getting a letter then! The reason for this longer route was that Moscow had a railroad before Lewiston. In 1891 the railroad was in through Kendrick, and mail was going to Cameron twice a week, as well as other supplies. It was a long and arduous trip, however, as the "road" wound up the creek bottom, turning and twisting, crossing the little stream many times in an effort to find the "smoothest way."

A deed was granted for the first road right-of-way in 1891, and construction was said to have started immediately. Business in the area was flourishing, and people were on the move. The rich, virgin soil on top lured many a family, and the number receiving mail at the Cameron post office grew to 30. It has now dwindled to 15.
The Cameron post office has been in constant operation the past 70 years with the exception of nine months resigned, and was re-opened through the efforts of the late A. H. Blum, a loyal Cameron booster, who operated a blacksmith shop there for many years.
That first little log cabin stood on the Mielke place long after the store and post office moved, and was used by the family for a time as a root cellar.
Mrs. Brammer tells us they have seen many changes. At the time they took over, mail was brought in by team and later by cars, and the so-called "roads" of that era were mud quagmires in the spring and fall, and during winter months sleds were the mode of transportation. Living in the community, however, had its rewards in a close-knit fellowship. Then, too there was the school, which held the community together.
After consolidation the school was closed, which was, of course, reflected in the store and post office, and trade dropped off.
"Yes," mused Mrs. Brammer, "We have seen many changes. We went through the depression and two wars, sent two sons to serve their country and saw them return safely." The Brammers also have a daughter who is a student at P. L. C. They have had a very busy life, combining farming with the duties of the post office, and to be "on duty" almost seven days a week for 36 years, is quite a record.

When asked what she will do with her spare time after so many years of this confining schedule, Mrs. Brammer's eyes twinkled as she replied: "I'm going to enjoy my grandchildren."

Whidby Patrol Coming Home
NAHA, Okinawa, April 18.—(Official)—A self-sustaining flight over most of the globe will begin here tomorrow for 12 long-range United States Navy bombers.

Rear Adm. R. N. Kivette, commander of the United States Formosa Patrol Force, said he was sending Navy Patrol Squadron 1 on the 16,000-mile hop.

Carrying their own spare parts and repair crews, the twin-engine Neptunes will fly via the Atlantic to their home base at Whidby Island, Wash., Naval Air Station. They expect to arrive May 5.

Stops en route will include Sangley Point in the Philippines, Singapore, Ceylon, Naples, Port Lyauutey, the Azores, Quonset Point in Rhode Island and Hutchinson Point, Kansas.

"Patrol Squadron 1 will be the first Navy patrol squadron to complete a flight around the world," Kivette told reporters. He added it is a "routine redeployment" to test the unit's mobility.

Our Note: Lt. John A. Wallace, U. S. N., son of Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Wallace, is a member of this group, and is a wing commander. Shortly after his return to the states he expects to be stationed at Denver, Colo.

Radioactive Fallout At Moscow
U. of I., Moscow—During the recent nuclear weapons tests at Yucca Flats, Nevada, radioactive fallout in the Moscow area increased significantly but never reached levels that could be regarded as hazardous, report J. V. Jordan, Associate Agricultural Chemist, and W. R. Schell, technician in the department of Agricultural Chemistry at the University of Idaho.

According to the University of Idaho research men, who have been checking atmospheric radioactivity daily for the past several months, their air filters indicated the eight-fold increase in radio-activity in the few days following the underground detonation at Yucca Flats. Previous to the Nevada tests the air monitored between 20 and 30 counts per minute. One snowfall following a test in Nevada registered a nine-fold increase.

"Harmful gamma radiations, dissipated rapidly following a nuclear detonation, were not detected in any of the samples taken in the University of Idaho tests," Jordan and Schell report.

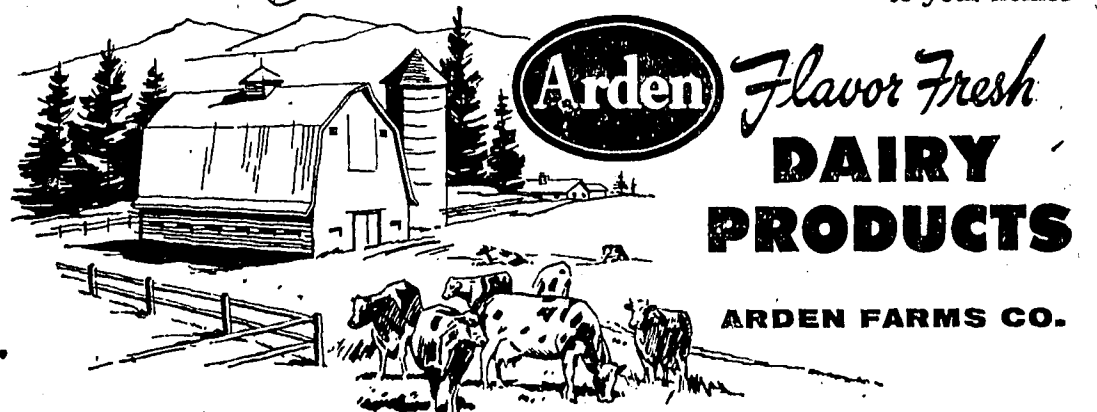

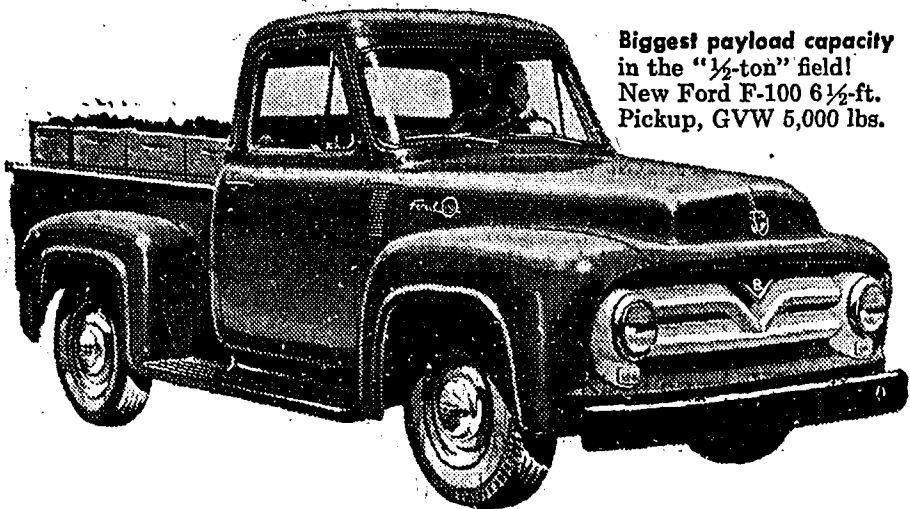

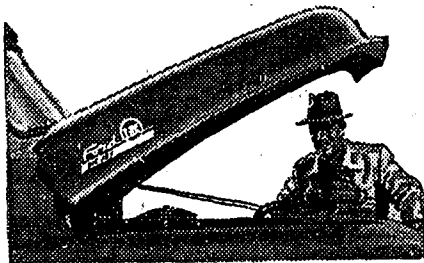
